Students Have First Aid Lesson

J. A. Jamison of Wichita Falls fire department gave a demonstration of the various methods of resuscitation for pupils of the fifth grade at Kidwell school Tuesday afternoon. Greg Clary, faculty sponsor of the School Safety Patrol program, was in charge of the meeting. Thirty pupils were present and responded with active interest to the demonstration.

Jamison brought out many practical aspects of what one must do in this area of first aid. He said the tongue, which becomes like a piece of flabby liver when one is unconscious, must be removed from blocking the breathing passageway. He showed that the nose must be pinched closed and the mouth completely freed by the mouth of the resuscitator in order to force air into the lungs.

In case of an infant, the adult mouth can cover both the nose and mouth of the victim, thus doing away with the necessity of pinching the nose. The head of the victim must be tilted backward as he lies on his back so as to open breathing passages.

In case the victim is suffering from electrocution, the fireman said the first problem encountered is that the teeth are clinched, which makes a complication difficult to overcome in resuscitation. He described the proper rate of breathing by the one administering aid averages 2 times per minute.

A dummy was used in the demonstration. At the conclusion of his lecture Jamison invited pupils to practice what he had taught. A crowd was around the "victim" immediately and each student had opportunity to see how well he could restore breathing to an unconscious person.

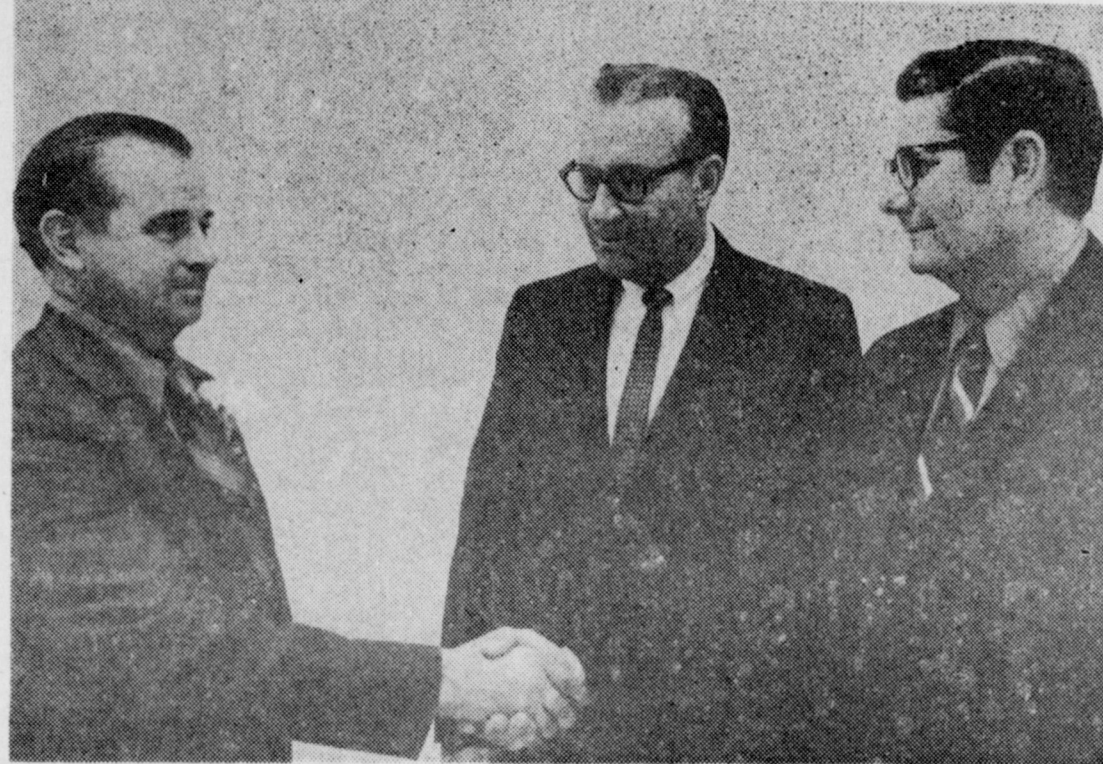

Chamber Names Mrs. James Outstanding Citizen

Mrs. H. R. Walters and Daughters Made Home Here after His Death

When word got around that Carl Catlin was planning to open a large service station on the east end of the 800 block of East Highway, there came to mind the many years Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Reed Walters lived here and the interesting part they have had in making Iowa Park a bit nicer place in which to live.

Harvey Reed Walters was born in Roger Mills county, Oklahoma Territory, in Sept. 1, 1895. Hazel Johnston was born in Navarro Mills, Texas, Feb. 11, 1891.

Harvey and Hazel were married Aug. 19, 1920, in Purdon, Texas, and moved that year to Burk Burnett to take part in the Burk Boom. He worked in the oilfields.

Their first daughter Helen Ruth, now Mrs. Kenneth Washington of Hurst, Texas, was born in Purdon on Dec. 13, 1926.

Mr. and Mrs. Walters moved to Rock Crossing south of Vernon. He worked in the oilfields there six years before moving to Iowa Park.

Frances La Vern, now Mrs. Billy Joe Harrington of Iowa Park, was born at Purdon on Aug. 5, 1932. It seems Mrs. Walters went home each time for the birth of her children.

Mr. Walters bought 10 acres of land west of Iowa Park and built

a filling station with living quarters at the back. Mr. and Mrs. Walters operated the station and he delivered gas and oil to the farming community and up to the Clara community.

In 1940 the US Highway 287 was routed away from the front of their station, so Walters bought lots in town and built a rock station in the early spring. In July 1940 Mr. Walters took sick and had a heart attack. He died on his birthday, Sept. 1, 1940, in a Veterans hospital in Amarillo.

Mrs. Walters and her father-in-law took over running the station. She continued to sell gas and oil, candy, pop, cigars, cigarettes, milk and bread until 1950.

During the past 20 years the small rock building has been used in various ways by different business men. Now Carl Catlin has leased the location and will operate a Gulf station with wash and grease racks.

Mrs. Walters lives at 109 North Penn. She and all her family are members of the Baptist church.

The daughter Helen has two children: Charlotte and Marvin Reed Washington. La Vern has two children: David and Renea.

Vocation Building Planned

A vocational building for Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District was the subject of much planning by the school board in their meeting Monday night.

This is a major project and something must be done before next school year to allow expansion for classes. A building seems the most practical and feasible solution for the interests of both the pupils and the patrons.

Plans are being processed to obtain a structure for less than \$60,000 that can be built without a bond issue. Figures are being gathered to determine if masonry wall to match the high school building will be possible rather than metal walls like those in the Blue Building near Junior High.

Pupils in the Building Trades classes will be used to reduce costs of building while at the same time giving them supervised practice in their trade.

Blue prints call for a building at the northeast corner of the high school campus bordering on Johnson Road and Highway 287. The initial structure will be 100 by 150 feet and will provide room for classes in vocational agriculture, auto mechanics and building trades. Included in the vocational agriculture will be a hothouse to be used in teaching ornamental horticulture. Jimmy Howell is teaching that course this year.

Demand for the course in ornamental horticulture seems to be such that two classes will be necessary next year. At present the school leases the hothouse owned by Virgil Woodfin. Howell conducts a two-hour class there each afternoon. It is outfitted with an electric soil sterilizer, automatic spray where plants are being rooted, a floor heater to maintain the proper temperature, and several large tables with perforated tops.

Already rooted are coleus plants, abelia, prycaantha, crocus, hyacinth and daffodil bulbs are potted and beginning to grow. And an outside hotbed contains hundreds of plants ready to be transplanted in the spring.

Many of these rooted plants will be for sale and indications are that through such a plan the department will be self-supporting.

All plans for buildings on the school campus are being drawn in such a way that future additions will be complementary to the master plan.

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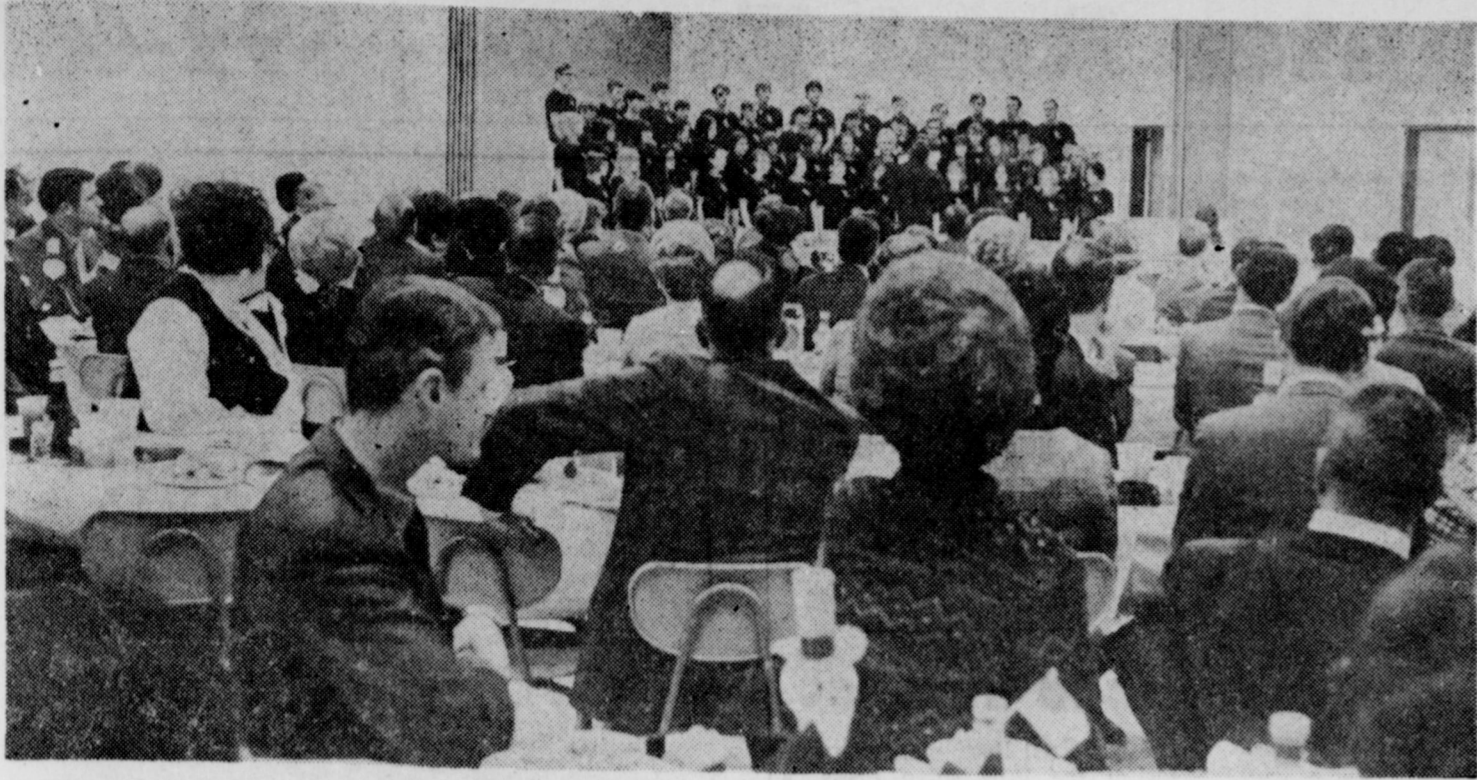

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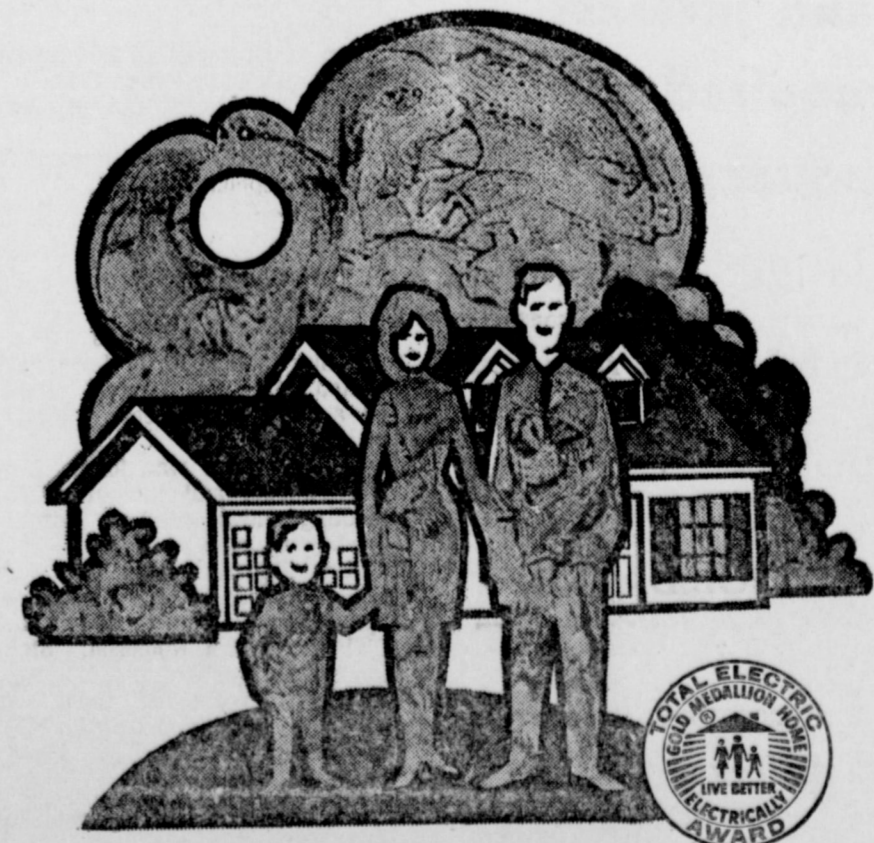
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23 Study Club

By tracing the history of England from 700 B.C. to the present time, Mrs. Chauncey Weiler gave meaning to the theme of the program "Deriving Inspiration from Our Historical Heritage," when she told of her visit there during the past summer to members of the 23 Study Club.

"We in the United States are the fortunate heirs of a glorious language exemplified by Shakespeare; of a religion fostered by Augustine and the King James authorized version of the Bible; and a government which guarantees civil liberties as based on the Magna Carta which produced the English parliamentary system, the mother of all parliaments," according to the speaker.

She said the scene of Cathedral at Coventry perhaps stirred her heart more than any other. This site received the longest sustained bombing of any during World War II. In the ruins was a cross made of the nails, and above it was the inscription "Father, forgive."

Mrs. T. M. Thaxton's meditation based on the sixth chapter of Deuteronomy portrayed the worthy aspects of the inheritance today's youth have received from former generations, telling her talk "The Heritage of Good Parents."

Miss Ethyle Kidwell's reading of Alice Duer Miller's poem "The White Cliffs of Dover" served to enhance English tradition.

I give special tribute to members of the Iowa Park High School Band, their leaders and to their parents on their expression of devotion and reverence during their visit to Waco Tuesday night.

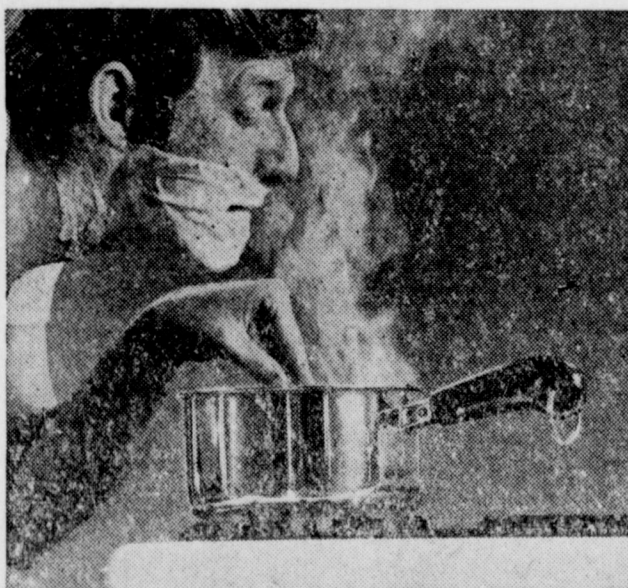
