BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board. or any successor "(b) The proceeds from the Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional argaregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies political subdivisions or bodies political subdivisions or bodies reacted of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized under Article XVI, Section 52, of this Constitutions is the Legislature may authorize. 


