Farm Bureau

Farmers and ranchers are be ing urged by Farm Bureau president Raymond Schroeder of Burkburnett to let the federal government know how proposed farmtruck-driver regulations would affect their operations. Letters can be addressed to John A. Volpe, Secretary, Dept. of Transportation, Washington, D.C. 20515.

Regulations will become effective on July 1 unless citizens can convince the government that they should not be put into effect. They were scheduled for Jan. 1, but were postponed to permit Farm Eureau and other organizations to study the regulations and file statements.





The following letter was originally written to our friends in Taiwan, shortly after our arrival in Hong Kong. We have made some alterations to eliminte personal references that would be meaningless to those of you in the USA.

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

ORDINANCE NO. 63A

An ordinance making it unlawful to obstruct the sidewalks within the City as herein provided; and providing a penalty.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to keep or allow any obstruction of any kind to be or remain on the sidewalks in front of the premises or place of busiess of said person, firm or corporation, except as hereinafter provided;

Any established business, with a permanent place for the conduct of business, may display its wares and goods on the sidewalk in mediately in front of its said place of business, but under no corditions may such display of its wares and goods be allowed to cbstruct psasage on such sidewalk that pedestrians shall be hendered in passing in front of such place of business.

The placing of such wares and goods on such sidewalk shall be for display only and within the codinary hours of business, and No perishable goods shall be displayed under any circumstances.

Be it further ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park that any person, firm or corcoration failing to comply with the provisions of this Ordinace shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 and not more than \$106.00, and each day's violation shall be considered a separate of-

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
