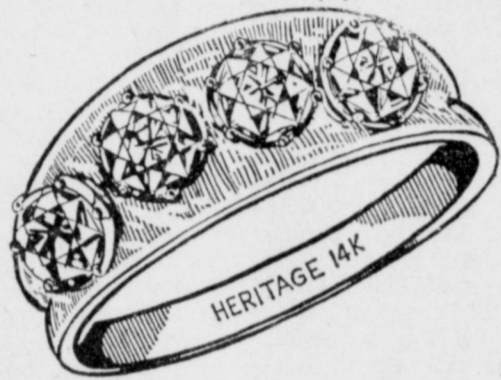

ORDINANCE NO. 63A

An Ordinance Making It Unlawful To Obstruct the Sidewalks within the City as Herein Provided; and Providing a Penalty.
It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to keep or allow any obstruction of any kind to be or remain on the sidewalks in front of the premises or place of business of said person, firm or corporation, except as hereinafter provided.
Any established business, with a permanent place for the conduct of business, may display its wares and goods on the sidewalk immediately in front of its said place of business, but under no conditions may such display of its wares and goods be allowed to obstruct passage on such sidewalk so that pedestrians shall be hindered in passing in front of such place of business.
The placing of such wares and goods on such sidewalk shall be for display only and within the ordinary hours of business, and No perishable goods shall be displayed under any circumstances.

Be it further ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park that any person, firm or corporation failing to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 and not more than \$100.00, and each day's violation shall be considered a separate offense.
Passed by the City Council on First Reading on the 23 day of March, A.D. 1971.

ORDINANCE NO. 164

An Ordinance annexing the hereinafter described territory to the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and extending the boundary limits of said City so as to include said hereinafter described property within said city limits, and granting to all the inhabitants and owners of said property all of the rights and privileges of other citizens and bidding all inhabitants by all the acts, ordinances and regulations of said city; providing a severability clause; and providing for the effective date of said ordinance.
Whereas, the City of Iowa Park, Texas, has heretofore adopted the provisions of Title 28 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1925, as provided in Article 961 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1925, and by virtue thereof, among other things, is empowered to annex territory and extend the corporate limits of said City; and
Whereas, the land hereinafter described in Section One (1) of this Ordinance accjoins the present city limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the members of the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, have concluded that said area, being contiguous to and with the West part of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and being within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, should be annexed and made a part of the City of Iowa Park, Texas; now, therefore,
Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:

Section 1. That the following described territory be and the same is hereby annexed to the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the boundary limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the same are hereby extended to include the following described territory within the city limits.
(Here follows the field notes and legal description of Virgil Scott and Jack Ayres tract in the triangle of U.S. 287, Johnson Road, and U.S. Expressway.)
Section 3. That this ordinance shall be effective as of date of its adoption.
Passed by the City Council on First Reading on the 26th day of April, A.D. 1971. (A hearing and second reading is scheduled for the next city council meeting to be held on the 10th day of May, 1971.)

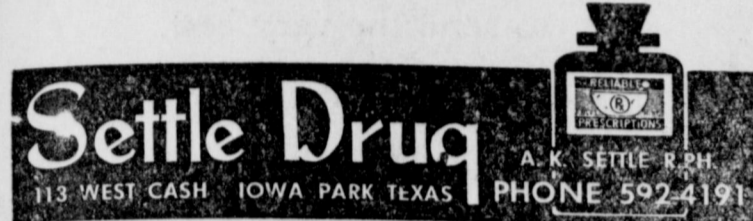

Section 1. That the following described territory be and the same is hereby annexed to the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the boundary limits of the City of Iowa Park be, and the same are hereby extended to include the following described territory within the city limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the same shall hereafter be included within the territorial limits of said City.

(Here follows the field notes and description of the annexed territory which is a short section of Loop 370 Highway and the U.S. Expressway not presently in the city limits.)

Section 2. That it is not the intention of the City of Iowa Park, to annex any territory not legally subject to being annexed by said City, and should any portion of the above described territory not be subject to legal annexation by the City of Iowa Park, Texas, such fact will not prevent the City from annexing such territory which is above described and is subject to legal annexation by the City and it is the intention of the City of Iowa Park to annex only such territory as may be legally annexed by it within the limits of the above described area.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall be effective as of the date of its adoption.

Passed by the City Council on First reading on the 26th day of April A.D. 1971.

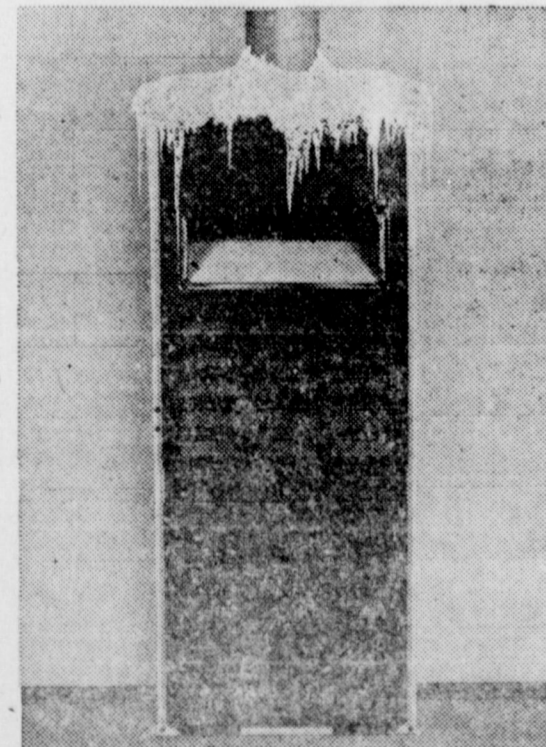

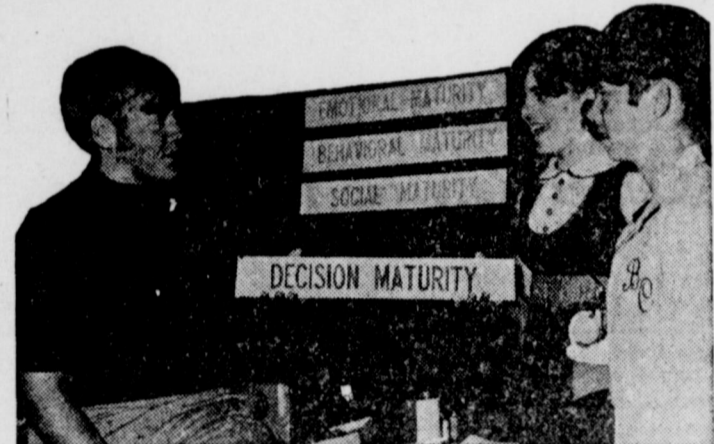
"The Making of the Black People" was subject of the interesting history of the progress of Negroes in America, followed by questions

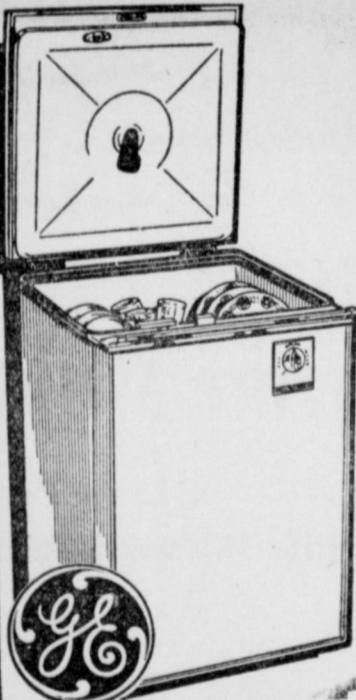
