The princess was responsible for saving the lives of 100 American boys shot down over her estate in World War II. She also resisted several hundred more to escape through the air-life in Roumania.

She comes to Iowa Park because the brother of our townsman Joe Harris was one of the men shot down over her property and she nursed him back to health and helped him get to safety.

Her remuneration is by free-will offerings only.

The school administration requests that the public allow the families to be seated first before taking their places in the auditorium.



ORDINANCE NO. 166

(A public hearing is to be held at City Council meeting June 14, 1971, at 7:30 p.m. at which time this ordinance will be set for final reading.)

An ordinance annexing the hereinafter described territory to the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and extending the boundary limits of said City so as to include said hereinafter described property

within said city limits; and granting to all the inhabitants and owners of said property all of the rights and privileges of other citizens and binding all inhabitants by all the acts, ordinances and regulations of said city; providing a severability clause; and providing for the effective date of said ordinance.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas: Section 1. That the following described territory be and the same is hereby annexed to the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the boundary limits of the City of Iowa Park, be, and the same are hereby extended to include the following described territory within the City limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the same shall hereafter be included within the territorial limits of said City, and the inhabitants thereof shall hereafter be entitled to all rights and privileges of other citizens of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and shall be bound by the acts, ordinances, resolutions and regulations of said City; that the territory to be so annexed is more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

(Here follows the legal description of the tract known as "Bogan Acres" including the Bill Kenney lot) 50.9816 acres of land; Less and Except However a tract of land heretofore sold and conveyed to and presently vested in Glenn Scott with Field Notes as follows: (Here follows the legal description of the exception.)

Section 2. That it is not the intention of the City of Iowa Park to annex any territory not legally subject to being annexed by said City, and should any portion of the above described territory not be subject to legal annexation by the City of Iowa Park, Texas, such fact will not prevent the City from annexing such territory which is above described and is subject to legal annexation by the City, and it is the intention of the City of Iowa Park to annex only such territory as may be legally annexed by it within the limits of the above described area.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall be effective as of the date of its adoption. Passed by the City Council on First Reading on the 24th day of May, A.D. 1971.

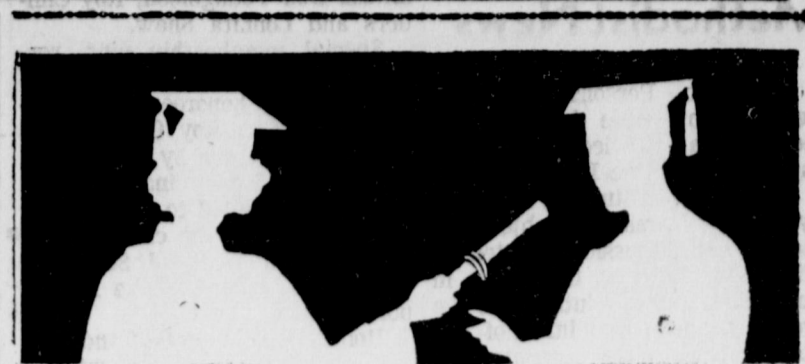
Not much sleep at Slumber Party for Diane
