Be sure each party understands if an abstract or a title policy is to be given and who is to pay that.

Food was served by members of WSCS in fellowship hall of the United Methodist church. Christian Workers Class members will serve the Aug. 16 meeting.

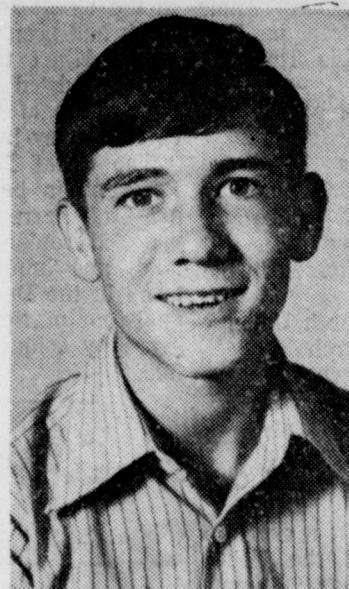
## Trimettes

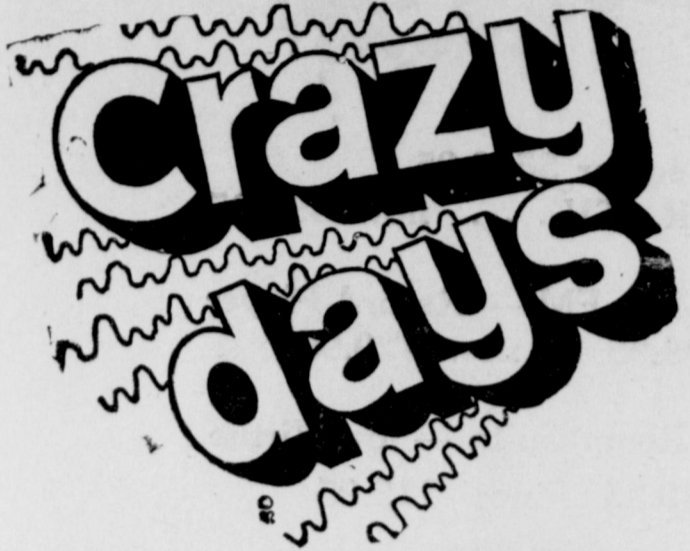
The family includes two boys: Ben 13 in ninth grade; and Alan 15, in tenth grade. The boys are musicians and probably will join the Hawk band.

**License for Vets**

Rep. Vernon Stewart announced this week the details of a new program which provides free 1972 license plates to some disabled veterans. He or she must be a Texas resident and have a disability rating of 70 percent or more. The veteran must be drawing compensation from the federal government as result of service connected disability.

A vehicle with DV plates is exempt from parking fees, including through parking meters, collected by any government authority other than a branch of the federal government.

**Scat, Mosquito**

Practice the 10 Commandments of Home Mosquito Control:

1. Empty, remove, cover or turn upside down any receptacle that will hold water—particularly old bottles and tin cans.
2. Change water and scrub out vases holding flowers or cuttings twice each week—or grow cuttings in sand.
3. Discard old tires or store them indoors.
4. Screen rain barrels and openings to water tanks or cisterns. Seal cisterns not in actual use.
5. Repair leaky plumbing and outside faucets. They may cause standing water.
6. Connect open waste-water drains to a sewerage system, or construct separate sump or leach lines.
7. Clean clogged roof gutters and drain flat roofs.
8. Fill holes in trees with sand or mortar, or drain or spray them as required.
9. Stock ornamental ponds with mosquito-eating fish.
10. Clean and drain evaporative coolers frequently.

Eleven scouts and adult leaders of BSA from the 13 counties of Northwest Texas Council will be at Philmont Scout Ranch and Explorer Base in New Mexico for two weeks, leaving Aug. 4. Six of the group will be from Iowa Park.

The two leaders chosen from the Council are Fay D. Brott, scoutmaster of Iowa Park Troop 38, and Dr. Earl F. Watson of Iowa Park.

The four local scouts are Carl Watson, Richard Hicks, David Brott and Kevin Wright. Carl has been named official reporter for Expedition No. 805-H at Philmont.

They will take Trek 17, which is 51 miles. They will average 5 miles a day as they climb Old Baldy, which is 12,441 feet above sea level. The trek is rated challenging. Mr. Brott and one Wichita Falls scout are the only members of the group who have had previous experience at Philmont.

## Leon Willis Is Chute Expert

Nine years at one job may not sound impressive, but when you have performed that job about 80,000 times, received 12 letters of appreciation and commendation, and 2 sustained superior performance awards, the job takes on a degree of excellence.

Such is the case with Leon B. Willis of the personal equipment section of the 3630th Flying Training Wing at Sheppard AFB.

Willie, as his friends call him, has been with the wing since its inception, and before that performed the same work for the SAC detachment at Sheppard. A native of Olney, Willis first became interested in the air force and flying in 1951 while working on drilling rigs at Thule AFB in Greenland.

After attending an advanced course at Chautauque AFB, Ill., Leon started working on parachutes. Eighty-thousand parachutes and four study courses later, he is now in charge of the parachute section.

Willis is responsible for inspecting each of 587 chutes each 30 days. This includes the timer, rip cord pins, tackings, releases, webbing, pack—the list goes on and on. In addition Leon is responsible for repack, the status board, keeping spare chutes on racks during repack, and fitting and briefing all new personnel.

The last job is his favorite because, as Willie puts it, "I like people. My main job may be in parachutes but what I really like to do is shoot the bull and learn about the people I work with."

Willis takes great pride in his work. He feels that it is a job that cannot be done second rate, or as he says, "I'll be the last to let you down!"

"Every pilot in the 3630th hopes he will never need to test Willie's services, but each one will continue to be in his debt. A job performance and an attitude like he has deserve no less than a hearty 'Thank you, Mr. Willis' from each of us," stated one of the pilots.
