

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

cause, as Willie puts it, "I like people. My main job may be in parachutes but what I really like to do is shoot the bull and learn about the people I work with."

Willis takes great pride in his work. He feels that it is a job that cannot be done second rate, or as he says, "I'll be the last to let you down!'

Every pilot in the 3630th hopes he will never need to test Willie's services, but each one will continue to be in his debt. A job performance and an attitude like he has deserve no less than a hearty 'Thank you, Mr. Willis' from each
