



A beginning is being made to reverse the trend that saw 5,000, 000 persons leave the farms and ranches in the decade of the '60's, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said in the kesnote addres he delivered in Wichita Falls,

Speaking to Texas County Agricultural Agents attending their annual meeting, White said that money has been appropriated by the federal government for a campaign to stop the emigration from rural areas, and the Texas Department of Agriculture is also trying to find a solution to rural

"The congestion in which 75 percent of the people live on 2 percent of the land has created problems for the cities too," White pointed out. "Billions of dollars will be needed for the program to save boths forms of society.
