Section IV. Violation of Curfew Hours

Any parent, legal guardian or other person having the control or custody of any minor child under the age of eighteen (18) years who shall assist, aid, abet, allow, permit or encourage said minor to violate the provisions of Section III of this Ordinance, either by evert act, by failing to act or by lack of supervision and control over said minor child, is guilty of a misdemeanor. 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
