Carol Cole Essay in International Church Magazine

Miss Carol Cole, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Cole of Iowa Park has written an essay which was published in the August issue of the Catalyst, a monthly publication for and by high school age boys and girls. It is produced by the Christian Board of Publication at St. Louis.

Miss Cole has been an active worker in the Christian church and is presently a freshman at Texas Christian university, Ft. Worth.

Her essays follows . . .
When would I resort to physical violence? Never.

My first inclination was to begin and end this essay with that simple statement, but upon further examination, I find the assertion will not stand because I have resorted to physical violence before and, because of human nature, I cannot predict when I might do so again. Perhaps the first approach then should be to look at Jesus' life. Jesus resorted to violence only once, and this was driving out animals and overturning tables to rid the temple of its desecration, but without harming any person.

Other instances show an antipathy toward violence and provide an alternative to it. When Jesus was betrayed by Judas, Peter cut off the ear of the high priest's slave, but Jesus rebuked him and healed the slave (Luke 22:50-51). In another account he stated "all who take the sword will perish by the sword" (Matt. 26:52).

The most exciting instance to me took place in Jesus' hometown where he was reading scripture in the synagogue and the people were so greatly angered by his words that they took him to the edge of a cliff to throw him over. Jesus looked into their eyes and walked away through the middle of the crowd (Luke 5:16-30). Such ways of dealing with violence by the use of non-violence occur today too. David Wilkerson faces murderers with the authority of Jesus Christ, saying, "God bless you" and walking away. My fiance, who is in the army, shook the hand of a fellow soldier threatening to hit him and said, "God bless you." The man didn't hit him.

How do we attain this ability to fight violence with spirituality? Through acceptance of our inheritance of Christ's authority and power, and through prayer in all situations.

The ultimate non-violence was a man betrayed, forsaken, and in mortal pain saying, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."

New rules for 1972 were explained by Dr. Creighton Hale, rules chairman from the Little League headquarters at Williamsport, Penna.



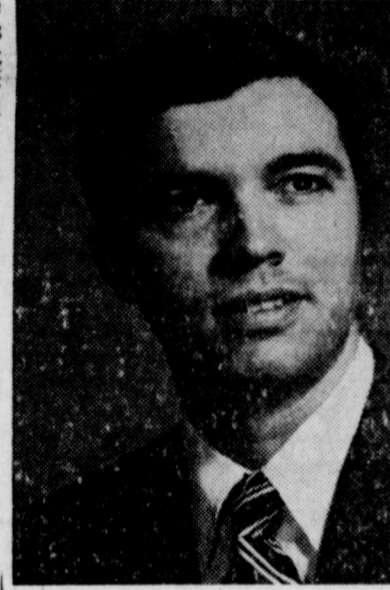
Engaged

We need at least 15 boys on each squad to enter teams into the Soccer League. All boys who join will play.

School Board

Calling of the annual school trustee election, reports of principals, decision to enter the UIL baseball program, and highlights of the administrators' meeting in Austin last week featured the meeting of the Iowa Park school board Tuesday evening.

Bob Dawson stated that 705 are enrolled in school now and he estimates 824 will be enrolled two years from now. Three additional classrooms will be needed a year from now. The physical education classes are crowded.

The vocational classes are moving smoothly and dropouts are at a minimum, according to Dean Miller and Harold Cowley. At mid-term there are only 15, about half the usual number, and the reduction seems to be linked to interest in vocational classes.

Austin Webb reported 189 in the sixth grade, 204 in the seventh, and 201 in the eighth. Asked what his greatest need is, he replied it is a P.A. system but he hadn't intended to mention it again!

Work on the high school floors was a successful project. They learned how to do a good job—that summer time is the best time to do it, and enough material is on hand to complete the halls.

The greenhouse is turning out well. Both boys and girls are volunteering time and effort to do the work. And \$5,370 has been spent to date.

The board voted to enter the baseball program. Jan. 18 is the date set to work out a schedule for the district. It was estimated that \$1600 will be required to outfit a team.

It was reported that a large school bus has been ordered; There is 75% participation in cafeteria meals; Pupils are co-operating with the good grooming policy of the school board;

A driver and bus will be furnished to take the cosmetology class to Dallas for demonstration workshop by experts from over the nation on Feb. 7.

Trustee election will be April 1 with voting boxes at Valley View, Bradford, Kidwell;

Harold Cowley will be responsible for absentee balloting at the Administration building.

Reports on the Mid-winter conference in Austin last week by Steger, Cowley and Nowell contained food for thought and presented possible changes in school administration in the next few years.

The quarter system of conducting school the year around, will be a fact by 1973 if the measure is not appealed. Under that plan, 160 hours will be required for a credit regardless of the time elapsed.

"Career education" and "work is honorable" are phases prevalent now in policies in education. Philosophy of education is changing rapidly with emphasis on training for a salable skill.

No longer will the emphasis for the majority be on preparing for college entrance.

Many questions were asked regarding the ad valorem tax and what will be done with reference to it as a means of school financing. No definite answers were heard. There seems to be a consensus that ad valorem tax will be revised but not abolished. The goal seems to be to create a taxing authority whereby all properties would be assessed equally and the funds distributed by the per capita school load. But chaos reigns and the path to solutions is strewn with difficulties.

The Iowa Park board was not pessimistic. They realize the situation is serious, but they are confident some way will be provided whereby the school system will continue with the best interests of students in mind.

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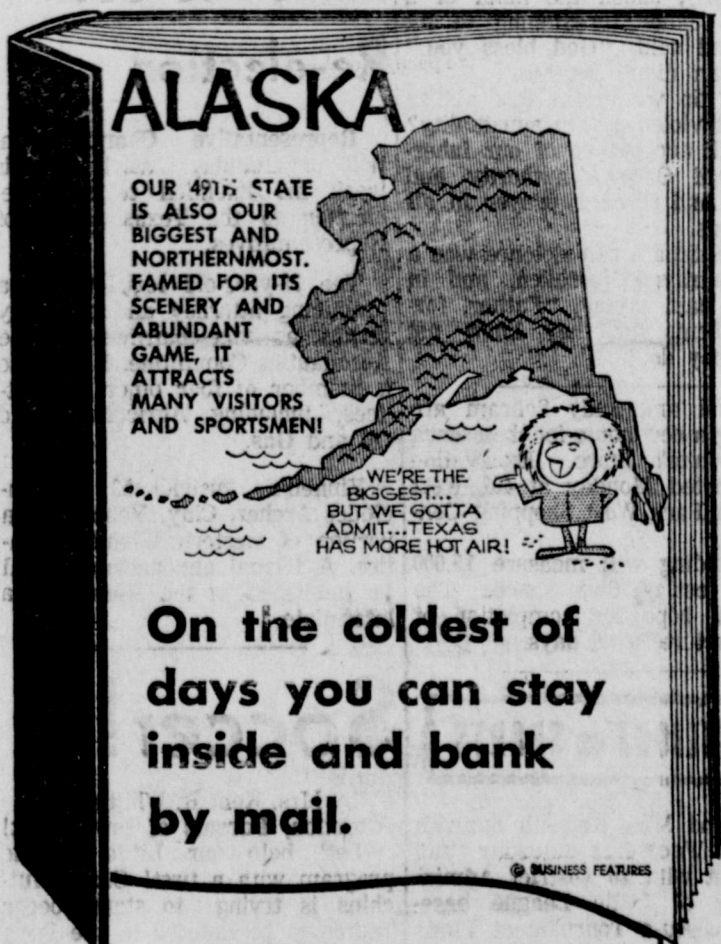

Sixteen voices will audition on each part, while only six from each section will become members of the All-State choir.

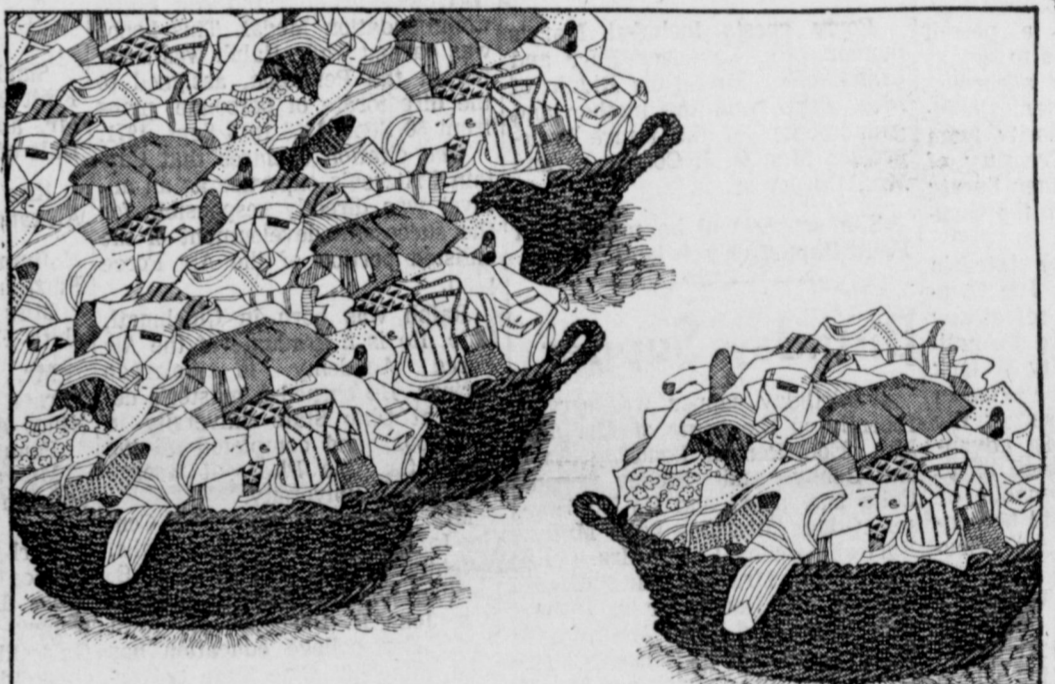
