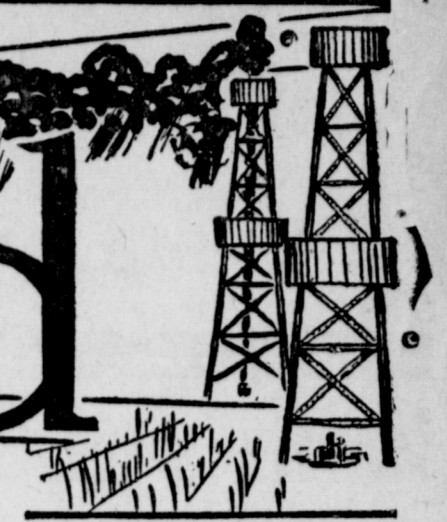

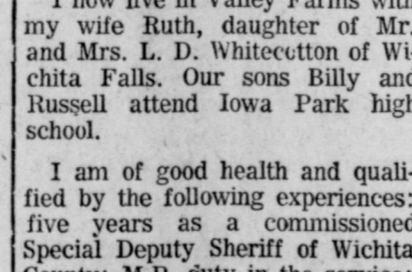

James Todd Rites Conducted Here

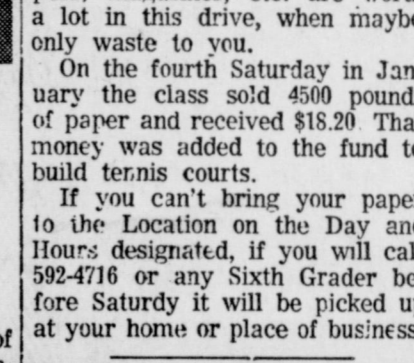

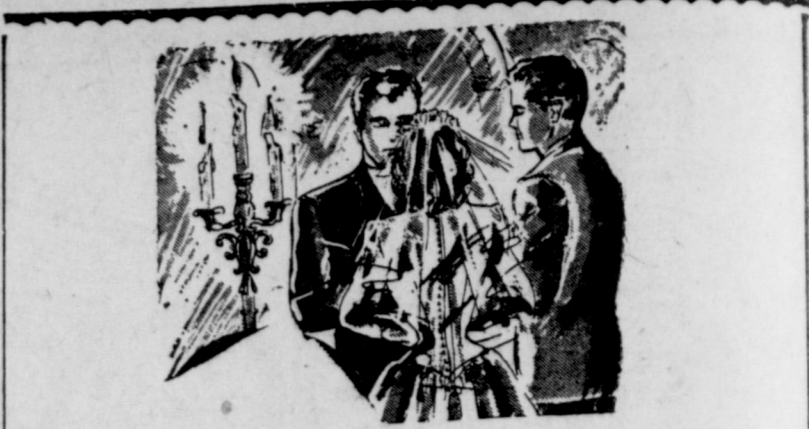
A panel of four men, knowledgeable in four areas of interest to the group, talked 10 minutes each... then opened the meeting to discussion and questions. They were:

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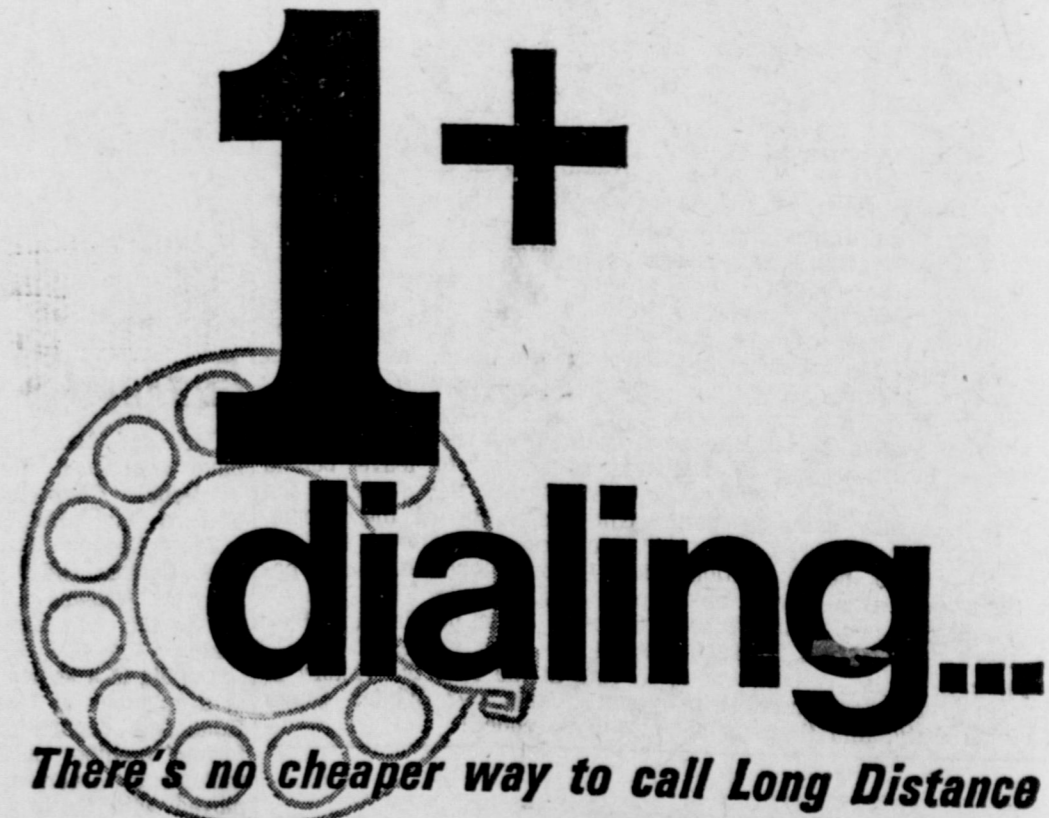
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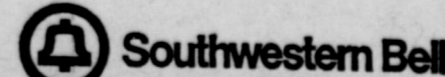
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Stamp Buffs Get a Break

Manned spacecraft recovery forces in the Atlantic and Pacific will cachet and cancel philatelic mail for the April 16 launch of Apollo 16. The special covers will be processed at Norfolk, Va., and Honolulu, Hawaii. From the Hawaii site, First Day covers will be forwarded to the recovery ship.

Atlantic covers sent to Norfolk will be processed through the local post office with the standard U.S. Postal Service cancellation device and will not contain the name of an Atlantic recovery ship.

Collectors throughout the world should send stamped self-addressed envelopes before March 25. Only US postage may be used on the covers. Cash, money orders or checks cannot be accepted.

Collectors are to furnish envelopes 3 3/4 inches by 6 1/2 inches. A 3-inch square should be allowed on the left-hand side of envelopes so the cachet can be applied. If adequate is not left the cachet cannot be applied to the front of the envelope without covering the cancellation or return address.

Each recovery force co-ordinator will accept only two covers per collector. Extra and those received too late will be returned unprocessed.

Addresses are: Apollo 16 Covers, Task Force 140, Naval Air Station, Va., 23511 and Chief-in-Charge, Apollo 15, Task Force 130, Navy Terminal Post Office, Fleet Post Office, San Francisco 96610.

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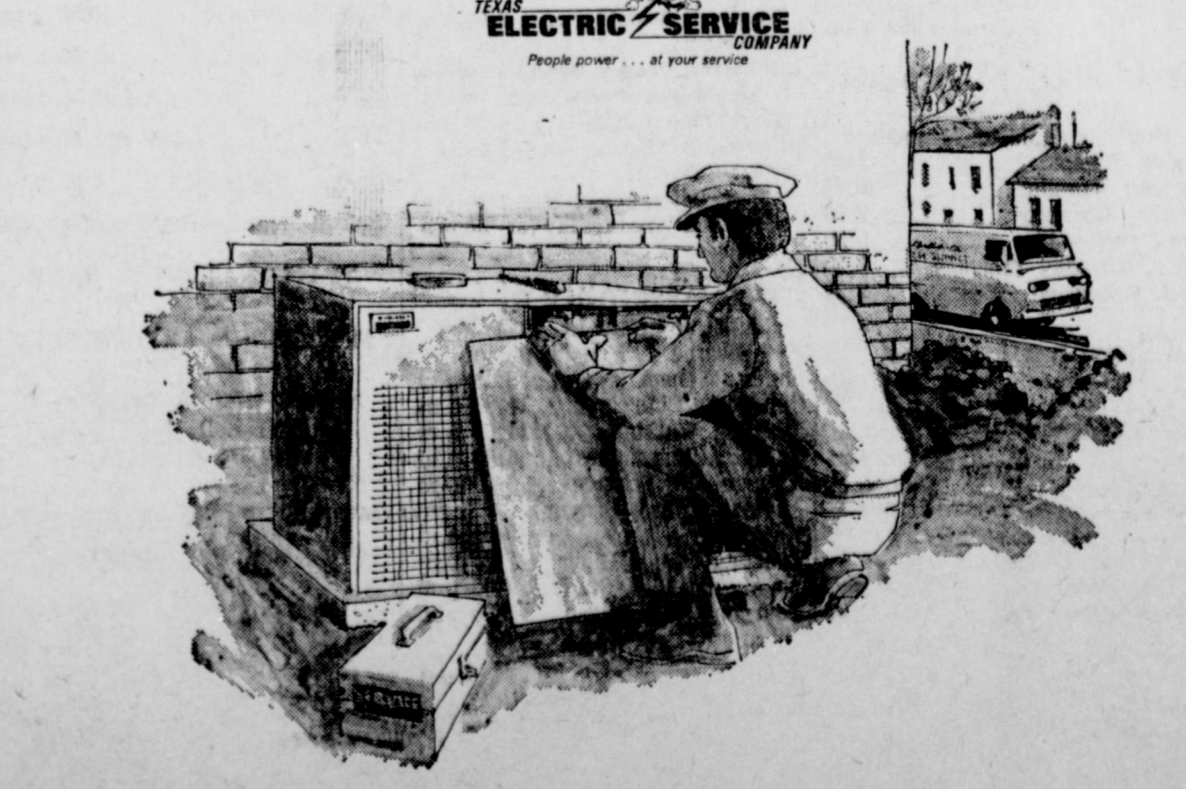

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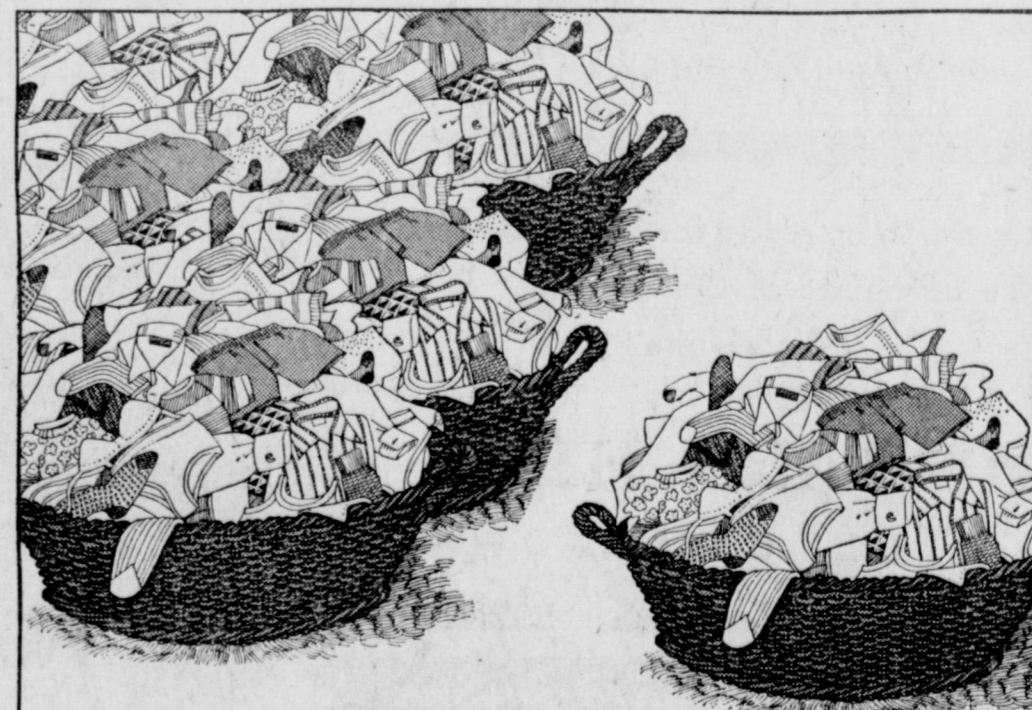
