# Buttonhole Interviews

"Ugh, George, get away over yonder," Yewell Haskins, the leader of the Elk's Glee club, which plays every evening at the Alta Vista, sent the player of the extra bass guitar to the farthest end of the crescent the musicians form when entertaining the guests. When spectators heard this they began to wonder why it was so objectionable to have such a skilled artist as Mr. Clambeck in the proximity of the leader.

"Well, I'll tell you how it was," said the latter, who asked about his peculiar taste. "I have a music back. Not a 'musical' back, but a plain 'musical' back. This music from some instruments. It has puzzled doctors and no one has been able to account for the peculiar effect of playing a mandolin while in bed, but it is certainly beyond the power of science to explain the position that I have acquired a back that appreciates music. I was confined to my bed for several weeks at the time and about the only thing that amused myself was this mandolin. You are going to have a great big city here within 10 years, and it is the legitimate character of the city that will bring it about. I can Boulder the second city in the state for beauty, but Colorado Springs is the garden spot of them all."

Charles Chandler, formerly assistant city agent of the Midland in Colorado Springs, now representing the company in Denver, was a visitor in the city.

"I just got to town," he said to a Gazette man, "but I have already told three people that this is the coming city of the state. It does do me good to see Colorado Springs making such a substantial advance. It was to my interest to go to Denver as I did, and from that standpoint of course I am glad to see it. I have told lots of people, and I can frankly say that all other things being equal I would rather live in Colorado Springs than anywhere else."

"That is probably natural," he continued, "inasmuch as I lived here eight years and knew pretty nearly every part when I left, but the town is certainly growing splendidly, and I am glad to see it."

W. H. Proctor, who was arrested a day or two ago under a charge of maintaining a nuisance, and yesterday morning in police court fined \$50 and costs, said to a Gazette man:

The police would not have come near my place I had not called them. When I sent for them to come over it was because I feared that some of the men in there were going to have trouble. I did not then know that there had been. In the future, as in the past, I shall endeavor to conduct a first-class and gentlemanly place."

RICHEST KIMBERLY SHOOT Is Now Being Developed by Lessees Isaacson and Davidson--Wide Body of Ore With Seams of Sylvanite.

Special to the Gazette: Cripple Creek, May 4.—The richest ore shoot ever uncovered on the property of the Kimberly company is now being developed by Lessees Isaacson and Davidson. The principals in the lease have been operating on block three of the Lonsconing for the last three and one-half years, with but indifferent results, but have always maintained faith in ultimate success. This faith is about to meet its just reward.

Acacia. Returns on 27 1/2 tons, shipped from the Wrockoff lease on the Burns of the Acacia company, show a net profit at the rate of six and one-half ounces, or \$120, to the ton. By the first of next week the contract has widened. At a depth of 20 feet the ore, as seen today, has widened to eight feet, with the only foot wall showing on the east side of the contact. In the bottom of the mine, on the extreme western side there is an eight inch vein, and this vein of ore that will average not less than eight ounces to the ton. The remainder of the vein is, as shown by the previous assays, good to excellent ore to the ton. Seams of sylvanite show all through the rock and the screenings from the entire body are greatly enriched thereby. A grab sample taken from the bin gave values of \$400 a ton. The first shipment of 11 tons was taken from the top of the shoot returned values of \$88.20 to the ton. 
