Postmasters J. B. Jones of Baird and Dan South of Clyde, announced today that Rural Mail Carriers will begin distributing June 1, 1959 Livestock Survey Cards to patrons on their routes about May 21.

This mid-year livestock survey is the first of three which your Post Office and U. S. Agriculture Departments cooperatively make each year. The June 1 survey provides basic information to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin for estimating the 1959 calf crop; what the spring pig crop actually numbered and preview of farrowing intentions for the fall season.

Also, poultrymen will get information on number of chickens raised during the spring. Those chickens will be the coming fall and winter laying flock.

To be sure our community is well represented in this survey, the Postmasters urge each patron receiving a card to fill it out and return to his mail box.

Dairymen Hear Talk On Dairy Problems

J. W. Davis, Extension Service Dairy Husbandman of A & M College, spoke on General Dairy Management Problems stressing the following three points: more production, better supply of forage, and keep better records, when he addressed a group of Callahan County dairymen at the District Court Room in Baird, Tuesday night.

He also showed slides of the A & M College Dairy Center. He was accompanied here by R. G. Burwell, district extension agent, and Sid Johnson, extension specialist in Farm & Home Management, both of Stephenville. The latter two also brought some interesting messages, according to Glen Green, county agricultural agent.

Banquet Honors Bailey Johnson

Bailey Johnson, who recently resigned as superintendent of the Clyde School system, was honored by approximately 200 friends, students, and past students, at a banquet in the Clyde gym last Saturday night. Johnson resigned, he stated, to give closer attention to his sheep ranching interests near Opalin where he was reared.

His retirement follows 19 years service with the Clyde school, four years as principal and 15 years as superintendent. During his years at Clyde the school tax valuation has risen from \$672,000 to over \$2.5 million. A new high school building has been constructed along with a cafeteria and a vocational agriculture building.

When Johnson came to Clyde there were less than 300 students in school. Now that number has doubled.

Ola South, Sweetwater schools superintendent, and former head of Clyde, Baird and other area schools, was the main speaker for the evening. He was introduced by Master of Ceremonies H. E. "Chick" Swofford, president of the Clyde School Board, and a school board member during the years of Johnson's regime.

Mr. South paid high tribute to Johnson, naming him "one of the outstanding men in his field." Others paying their respects to Johnson included J. B. Paylor, who referred to Mr. Johnson's title of "Mr. Tennis," as seven of the teams he coached reached state championship.

Ione McIntyre who has taught with Johnson during his 19 years in Clyde, two as principal, and also taught Johnson at one time, told of her years with him, reciting many humorous instances. Other speakers were John Berry, long-time friend; Joe Don South, Bobbie Collins and Jerry Swofford, all spoke on behalf of Clyde students.

Suggs Callahan, janitor of the Clyde Schools for many years, now retired due to an accident, in a few words paid fitting tribute to Mr. Johnson, and stated "Mr. Johnson is the best friend I ever had."

Mr. Johnson, whom his close associates, call "modest," and who will rarely speak in public, responded with gracious words of thanks and appreciation to all, and remarked "he didn't believe they were speaking about him."

Also present at the dinner were the immediate members of Johnson's family: His wife, the former Modena Pair of Strawn; his son, Tommy of Jal, N. M.; and two daughters, Mrs. Freddie Kniffen of Lubbock, and Mrs. J. W. Newton of Abilene.

Also introduced at the dinner was Johnson's successor, Lewis Newton, formerly of Cross Plans, who is also a brother to Johnson's son-in-law.

Johnson received several gifts of appreciation of his services, among them a watch from the school board, and a large plaque from present and past state tennis champions.

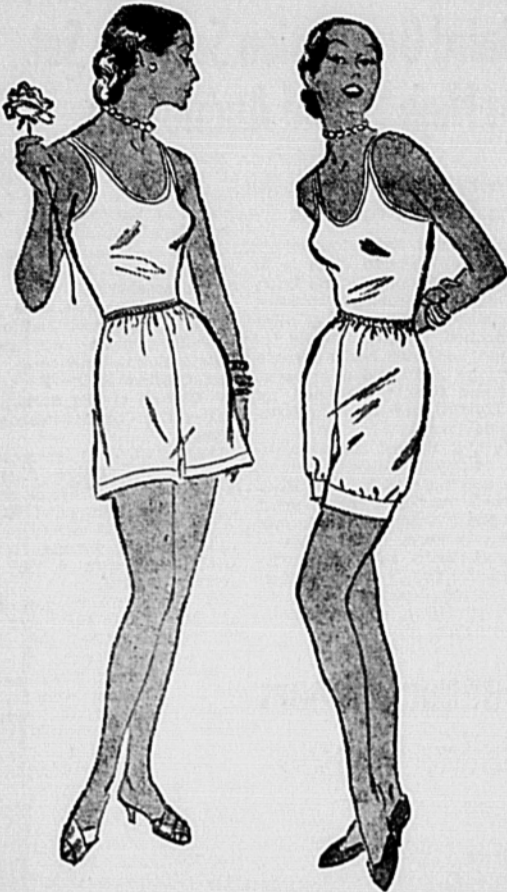
