## Masonic Lodge Dinner Honors Earl Ladd Sr.

"Masonry will make you a better citizen and church member," says Earl Ladd, 60 year member of the local Masonic Lodge.

When asked if he had any clues for young people interested in leadership, Ladd commented that if a young person has a sincere desire to be of help to somebody in need, there are a multitude of opportunities through which he can serve.

Ladd who was honored Thursday, January 9 by the members of Masonic Lodge No. 1237, spoke highly of the work of Scottish Rite and Shrine hospitals that are supported by the efforts of the group.

"These hospitals are maintained for the benefit of every afflicted child of any race, creed or color. For those who qualify for treatment at the hospitals because of being crippled, having a speech impediment or other disability, treatment is free.

Burns Hospital in Galveston is just one such example as is the Scottish Rite Hospital in Dallas. Children up to 16 years of age are treated.

"It is only necessary for the family of the disabled child to make application to the lodge to get in to these hospitals for treatment," Ladd commented.

If anyone knows of a crippled child or a burned child with scars and so forth, Ladd encourages the individual to seek help for him through the Masons. "The family must only pay transportation costs to the

Scottish Rite or Shrine hospital, in order to be in line for treatment," Ladd says.

Ladd mentioned the case of news announcer Skip Watson of KCBD-TV in Lubbock. He stated that Watson is a victim of polio who was abandoned by his family early in his life. He sought treatment through one of these hospitals and re-gained the ability to walk. This is only one of the cases that has been addressed by the efforts of the Masons, Ladd continued.

Ladd, who received the Golden Trowel award Thursday evening, has been a member of the local Masonic Lodge for almost 61 years. In May of 1991, Ladd received two fifty year pins and a 60 year pin. Jimmy Willison of Floydada, Post Grandmaster of Masons of Texas, presented these pins at a dinner in 1991.

In 1946-47, Ladd was Lodge Master and was appointed to District Deputy Grand Master in 1953. He took his Scottish Rite in El Paso in 1948.

Ladd's wife, Cammie is a 50 year member of the Muleshoe Order of Eastern Star and received this award in 1988.

Many know Ladd as a person active in the Volunteer Fire Department, the Ladd Fire Station was named after Ladd. He served the fire department as chief for 20 years.

It was mentioned Thursday night that Arnold Morris, before his death, was the only member of the local lodge who had been a member longer than Ladd.

Hugh Young, Worshipful Master of the lodge, mentioned the fact that Ladd had stood by his wife through times of illness. Young, in presenting the Golden Trowel to Ladd said that if one needs assistance with any worthy project, he need only ask Ladd.

Young stated that the Golden Trowel award was established in 1989, and that Ladd is only the fourth member in this community to have been given the trowel.

"Masonry was brought from England," Young said. "It has been established since 2000 years before Christ."

Bob Phillips, secretary of the local Lodge, said that Ladd is Cont. Page 6, Col. 4

### Vandiver Files

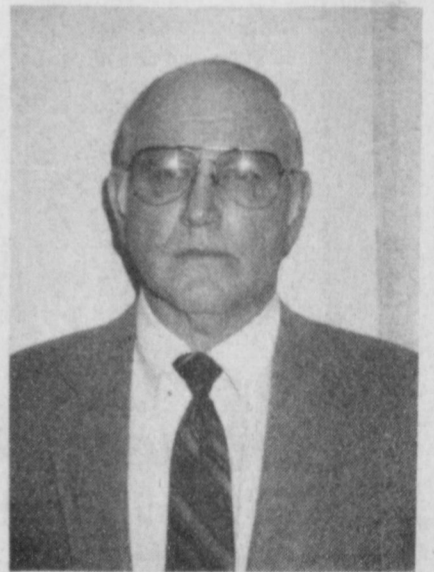
### For Commissioner Precinct One

## Noble, Scott Present Leadership Program

Ronda Scott, introduced Dany Noble of ASCS to members of Leadership Muleshoe at their monthly meeting Wednesday, January 8 in the Council Chambers of City Hall.

Noble, Miss Scott's adult leader in the field of agriculture had met with her to help plan an informative program on the overview of agriculture in Bailey County.

All ten members were present at the meeting to benefit from the program.

Miss Scott reported to the group that there were 400,000 acres of crop land in Bailey County. In addition, there are 100,000 acres of pasture land, approximately 1200 farms, 600 operators, and approximately 1,000 owners. She explained to the members how participants in the farm programs, are eligible to receive diversion payments, deficiency payments, and disaster payments. Noble explained each type of payment in detail and showed the group the amounts of money paid out in Bailey County by USDA-ASCS in each area.

The program explained the various farm programs such as the Dairy Program, the Wool and Mohair Program, the Livestock Feed Program, and the Peanut Program. However, the information on the CRP Pro-

gram was one that the members found the most interesting. Miss Scott and Noble reported that Bailey County has 98,513.5 acres in the Conservation Reserve Program. A total of 385 Cont. Page 6, Col. 2

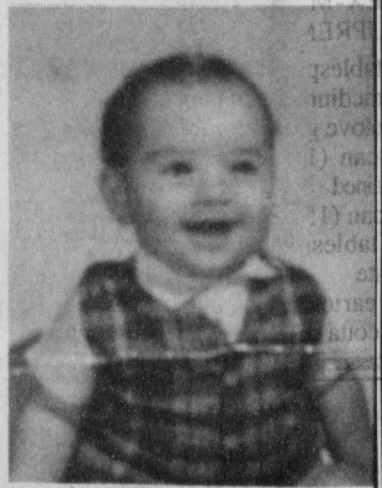

### WISCONSIN CHEESE FUDGE

- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter, softened
- 8 ounces Pasteurized Process Cheese, cubed
- 1 1/2 pound powdered sugar
- 1/2 cup non-fat dry milk
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 2 cups coarsely chopped nuts
- 1/2 cup cocoa

In a large sauce pan over medium heat melt butter and cheese, stirring frequently. Remove from heat. Sift together sugar and cocoa; add to cheese, mixing well. Stir in non-fat dry milk, vanilla and nuts. Turn into a 9x9x2-inch pan. Chill till firm. Makes 3 pounds.

### TEX-MEX CHILI CHEESE SUPREME

- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 medium green pepper, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 can (15 1/2 oz.) kidney beans, drained
- 1 can (15 oz.) tomato sauce
- 1 tablespoon chili powder, or to taste
- 1 carton (15 ounces) Wisconsin Ricotta cheese

- 1 can (4 oz.) chopped green chilies, drained.
- 1 bunch green onions, finely chopped
- 3 eggs, beaten
- 1 bag (8 oz.) tortilla chips
- 2 cups (8 oz.) shredded Sharp Wisconsin Cheddar cheese
- 2 cups (8 oz.) shredded Wisconsin Monterey Jack cheese.

Heat oil in skillet over medium high heat. Saute green pepper and garlic until tender. Add kidney beans. Set aside. In saucepan, combine tomatoes, tomato sauce and chili powder. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat and simmer, uncovered, for 15 minutes. Add to kidney bean mixture. Combine Ricotta and Monterey Jack cheeses, chilies, onions and eggs. Spread 1/4 of cheese mixture evenly in greased 13x9x2-inch glass baking dish. Arrange 1/4 of chips over cheese. Spread 1/4 of tomato mixture over chips. Repeat layer 3 more times. Cover with aluminum foil and bake at 325 degrees F. for 30 to 40 minutes. Remove foil and top with Cheddar cheese. Bake 10 to 15 minutes more. Let stand 5 minutes before serving. Makes 10-12 servings.

## Evidence and Proof of DWIs

To prove up a DWI in Court several important evidentiary factors must be considered. As reflected in my prior article the elements of a DWI are as follows: that a person did intentionally and knowingly operate a motor vehicle while intoxicated, to-wit: lost the use of his normal mental or physical faculties or has a blood and alcohol level of .10 or greater. Therefore, to be able to prove up a DWI, several things must be present. First, there must be "probable cause" for the stop. What constitutes "probable cause"? Erratic driving, going over the center stripe, hitting the median, driving too slow, driving too fast or running a stop sign. Any of these factors, or a combination of these or others could constitute "probable cause", but there must be adequate probable cause for the stop. Next, the officers' observations of the defendant are important. How did the defendant look? How did he smell? Was his speech slurred? Were his eyes bloodshot? Next the officer will ask the defendant to perform field sobriety tests. The defendant's inability to perform field sobriety tests is very important to be able to prove "loss of the normal use of mental or physical faculties". There are several field sobriety tests which can be demonstrated and then performed, and it is imperative that a jury be able to see, through the officers' eyes, the non-performance of these tests. Field sobriety tests are the primary way to prove "loss of the normal use of mental or physical faculties." Next, the officer requests that the defendant take either a breath test or blood test, and his blood alcohol content is .10 or greater, you then have scientific proof to bring before a jury as to the defendant's level of intoxication. In the best of all worlds a DWI coming into the County Attorney's Office will have:

1. adequate probable cause for the stop,
2. officers observations as to smell, looks, speech and manner of defendant,
3. many field sobriety tests demonstrated by the officer then failure to perform properly by the defendant, and

We will use the basic formation of the wing T and go to a multiplicity of formation. We are going to know how to throw the ball," Adair said.

"Offense wins games. Defense wins championships," Adair comments.

"I am a great imitator and a good student of the game."

Adair mentioned his continuing interest in golfing and hunting. "I bear the scars of this in my marital relationship," Adair jokes.

Roland McCormick returned the humorous attitude with which Adair completed his talk, saying that he "should not go hunting with Mark Morton."

Jack Young asked what his handicap was in golfing. Adair replied that "it varies."

Gordon Wilson asked Adair a question about strategy in a recent Dallas Cowboys game. Adair gave a full and lengthy answer to Wilson's question.

Again in a slightly tongue in cheek mood, Adair said that we will start a new tradition here in Muleshoe. "The committee of fans will meet at a local restaurant and establish a game plan on Monday for the previous Friday night."

Mark Morton raised a question to Adair regarding the new director's plan on off season conditioning. Again, Adair gave a thorough response.

Adair wants every student to be a part of the athletic program. He wants them to do other things to because this is the essence of the high school experience. "I know this approach works. It has worked for me at 2 other 3A high schools."

Adair closed with a brief outline that he gleaned from his admiration of Gordon Wood, high school coach in Brownwood. Wood has the distinction of winning more games than any other coach ever at any level—over 400.

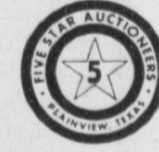

## Jan., 1776

On January 2nd, 1776, George Washington raised the flag of the new American republic near Cambridge, Massachusetts. He had been named commander of the colonies' forces six months earlier, had assembled about 16,000 men in Massachusetts.

A year later he won two important victories, at Trenton on December 26, 1777, and at Stony Brook Bridge, N.J., one week later. Thereafter, Washington encamped at Morristown.

It was an important start for the colonial army and freed New Jersey from British control. After these defeats the British in New Jersey returned to New York.

Washington's 1776 flag had the thirteen red and white stripes it still contains today--representing the thirteen states. In the corner where fifty stars are now seen there were the crosses of St. Andrew and St. George.

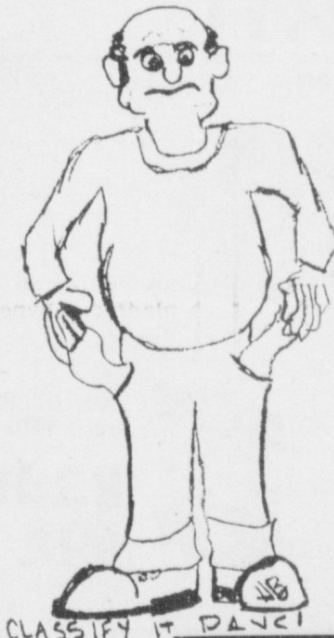

Do you have any ideas on what I can do about this situation? Worried--L.A.

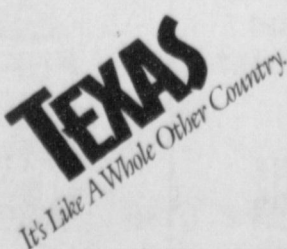
Answer: A boy or girl of that age is not a child nor are they adults.

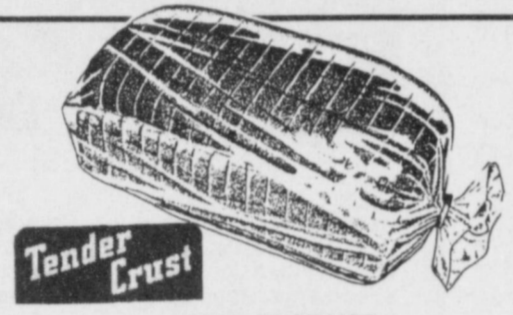
