Abilene Takes Baird Game 6-5

A team from the Reporter News staff in Abilene turned away from their linotypes to tangle with the local softball squad here last Friday night, June 24. The Reporter News team set the hometown nine down to a one run defeat. In their coldest type they allowed Baird only five tallies as they pounded Mike Hughes and Lev-erett of Clyde for six runs. The Abilene presses really rolled in the fourth and sixth innings. The print and ink boys crossed the home sack twice each frame. Baird hit the run column once in the second, once in the third and three times in the fourth. Abilene's Murphy struck out five Baird batters, walked four and allowed three hits. Baird's six errors paved the way for the headline win which was the hometowners second defeat of the season.

Baird Tops Albany In Extra Frame 11-10

In Baird's last half of the eighth inning, Frank Crow, catcher for the local nine singled, stole second and rode home on Tom Barton's double to break a 10-10 tie and give Baird the victory in the first extra inning contest of the season. Albany jumped Mike Hughes of Baird for five runs in their top half of the first on two errors, two walks and two hits. Scoring four times in the fifth and one in the sixth the Albany team kept the game all tied up until with no outs in the bottom of the eighth Baird opened up for the one run needed for the win. Mike Hughes, Lee Brown and Burl Varner saw mound duty for the local team following a combined total of eight hits, ten walks. Albany's Allman and Elliot combined to dole out thirteen hits to Baird and gave up only one walk. Baird committed five errors as to Albany's three. Home runs for Baird went to Jimmy West in the fourth frame with one aboard and Burl Varner connected for a round tripper in the fifth.

In an exhibition game before the regular contest the Baird girls lost to the Albany girls 18-10. The girls wish to thank the merchants of the town for the donations. They used the money to buy uniforms and bats. Tuesday nights game saw a record breaking crowd at the new park, about 400 people. All the drinks sold before six innings of play. Thanks a lot folks for the support. We like to see all enjoy America's favorite pastime. Friday night of this week, July 1, our ball club puts on their best manners for their meeting with the pistol toting police force from Abilene. The game will be played in Baird at eight o'clock. Baird will take a nine victory-two defeat record into this battle with the law—on the diamond that is.

FORMER RESIDENT DIES IN AUTO WRECK

Miss Evelyn Blakley of Baird and Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Taylor of Putnam attended the funeral of Robert V. Blakley, which was held Saturday morning at the First Baptist Church in Aspermont. Burial was made in Belle Plain Cemetery, south of Baird.

Blakley, 26, was struck by a hit-and-run vehicle near Santa Rosa, N. M., Monday night. His arms and legs mangled and his body badly bruised, he died Thursday in Tucumcari, N. M., without regaining consciousness.

Born in Callahan county on September 5, 1922, he was the son of Bob Blakley of Aspermont. Also surviving are a brother, Bill, of Aspermont; two sisters, Mrs. Mandill Gofinch, Aspermont, and Mrs. Ruth Barnett of Morton.

The family moved to Aspermont from this county about 10 years ago, and there are many life long friends throughout this community who are grief stricken at this sad news.

Mr. Berry, 81, died at 6 p. m. Tuesday in the Callahan County Hospital after being taken there at 11 a. m. for a heart attack.

He had been a resident of Clyde since 1906. He was born March 4, 1868 in Tarrant county and moved to Stephens county in 1879, settling near Eolian. He married Pearl Cook there in 1896. He was a retired farmer and stockman at the time of his death.

Mr. Berry was an old time cowboy who worked with most of the famous outfits in the days of the open ranges in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

He was in the run that opened the Cheyenne Strip in the Indian Territory.

He and his wife celebrated their Golden Wedding in 1946. He had been a member of the Methodist church for 54 years and served as steward and Sunday school superintendent for many years.

CALLAHAN BOYS WIN CONTEST PRIZES

Daniel McClure of the Eula 4-H Club won first place in the District Litter Contest. Counties in the district are Callahan, Haskell, Taylor and Jones. Eighteen boys from these counties were competing to see who could raise the heaviest litter of pigs when they were 56 days old. McClure's litter weighed 137 pounds. There were 10 pigs in the litter. First prize is \$25.00.

Billy Hicks of the Clyde 4-H Club won 4th place and \$10.00. He had a litter of nine pigs that weighed 364 pounds.

Dale Crawford of the Oplin 4-H Club won 7th place and \$5.00 on a litter of pigs that weighed 328 pounds. There were 10 pigs in this litter.

Robert Collins of the Clyde 4-H Club won 12th place and \$5.00 on a litter of seven pigs that weighed 275 pounds.

There were only twelve prizes in the contest and Callahan county boys won four of the prizes. All the Callahan county boys who entered the contest won prizes.

RAT KILLING PROGRAM

The Baird Veterans Agricultural class met with the county agent on June 23 and decided to sponsor a rat killing program in the county. The class will cooperate with the US Rodent Control Service in killing these rats.

Any farmers and all farmers in the county are urged to get in this program. All you have to do is to see the county agent or some member of the class and list your name with them.

The poison to be used is 1080. This is a deadly poison to rats. The 1080 cannot be bought and is put out only by the US Rodent Control Service. The service will train a member of the veterans class to use the poison. This type of program was carried on in Baird several years ago and was very successful.

Before the rodent control service will train a man to put out the poison, there must be between 200 and 300 farmers signed up who want the rats killed on their farms. So all farmers who want to get in on this program should sign up as soon as possible. The only cost will be a small fee to cover the cost of the poison and the labor of the man putting out the poison. The man putting out the poison can usually cover from eight to fifteen farms in a days time, so the cost won't be very much.

If merchants in the towns desire to have a drive to kill rats

with the 1080, they too must have some organization to sponsor the program. For more information on this program contact the county agent.

HEALTH FACTS

Austin — The people of Texas have been fortunate in escaping any serious outbreaks of typhus fever this year, the total number of reported cases so far being 133. This is a gratifying decrease in the incidence of this disease, but at the same time, it is well to warn that only continued stringent rodent-control measures will hold this disease in check.

This is the advice of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who says that "typhus is one of the most debilitating of all diseases, and the long drawn out illness results in such loss of time that this factor is usually even more expensive to the victim, than his doctor and hospital bills."

Inasmuch as typhus fever is transmitted to man by the rat flea, the control of typhus depends almost entirely upon ridding ourselves of rats. No garbage should be left exposed where they can get to it to feed. Granaries and feed houses should be rat-proofed so that rats are starved out. All rat harborage such as trash piles, piles of old lumber, accessible quarters in the walls and foundations of buildings and other suitable living quarters should be denied them. Houses and business buildings can be effectively rat-proofed at a comparatively low cost, and the expense is always much less than the damage that can be done by rats, and the sickness they can spread.

"When the rat is gone, typhus fever will go also," Dr. Cox said. "Keep building out, starving out, and killing all rats, and typhus fever will no longer menace the health of our people."

TOUGH JOHN WAYNE HAS ENVOIOUS JOB

John Wayne, who plays opposite Marlene Dietrich in "Seven Sinners," stirring drama of love and adventure in the honky-tonks of the South Seas, opening Tuesday at the Plaza Theatre, is rated one of the foremost discoveries in recent years.

A native of Winterset, Iowa, the husky young star began at the bottom of the cinema ladder as a property boy after his career as a football player at the University of Southern California was ended by a broken ankle.

SUMMARY OF WORK BY T.B. ASSOCIATION

The Callahan County TB Association completed two years of work March 31, 1949. The officers of the association were: president, Mrs. W. P. Brightwell; 1st vice-president, Mrs. S. L. McElroy; 2nd vice-president, Mrs. M. C. McGowan; secretary and Seal Sale Chairman, Mrs. Jack Ashlock; treasurer, Mrs. L. L. Blackburn. Seven meetings of the Board of Directors were held during the year.

The association is booked to have the Mobile X-Ray in November. The unit will come before November if it is working in this vicinity, and can be available. These X-rays will be given free to all persons over 14 years of age in the county. The association feels sure that everyone will take advantage of this service. This will be the association's first major step in case finding. We believe this X-ray service will accomplish worthwhile results in the discovery of unsuspected tuberculosis and in stimulating more and more people to seek annual chest examinations by their private physicians.

Of the 66,183 apparently healthy people screened through X-ray chest surveys last year, 1,065 were found to be tuberculous and 689 others showed chest abnormalities other than tuberculosis. All persons requiring further examination were referred to their private physicians for 14x17 diagnostic X-ray films and clinical check-up. The success of the X-ray surveys depends upon community-wide interest and participation in the screening process, and upon prompt reporting to their family physician by all persons whose miniature chest films indicate a need for further examination.

The entire program of the Association is financed with funds raised in the annual Christmas Seal Sale. In 1948 the voluntary contributions of 797 interested persons in Callahan County to the National, State and local association programs exceeded all past records. A total of \$1311.14, forty-two per cent above the 1947 Seal Sale, was contributed in Callahan County. Of each contribution made to this local association, 80% remained in the county to finance the local program, 15% was appropriated to support the work of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and 5% was forwarded to the National Tuberculosis Association to support its overall program of medical research and study, preparation and production of educational materials for nationwide use. In this county an extensive education program was carried out by means of pamphlets, posters, window displays and through the newspapers and motion picture theatres. Plays were given in the Baird Grammar School, Baird High School, Cross Plains High School and the Callahan County Luncheon Club in Baird. These plays were under the direction of Mrs. R. A. Webster

and Miss Sue Hooker of Baird. They were assisted by Mrs. John Bowlus and her small son, Johnny, who created an exact replica of the 1948 Christmas Seal Stamp. Approximately 70 school children took part in these plays. All of the women's clubs of the county presented one program on tuberculosis during the year. Most of these programs were given in November and December. Mrs. Robert Evans of Clyde Dr. M. L. Stubblefield of Baird appeared as guest speakers during this time.

After all expenses were paid for the year, the association has on hand \$1574.25 with which to carry on this great work. In cooperation with the Medical Board five persons were given 14x17 diagnostic X-rays.

The association would like to take this means of thanking all persons who gave their time and their financial help in this program. Without the cooperation of everyone, the program will not be a success because it does depend on the community's full support. In addition to those who contributed to the Seal Sale, we would like to say to the 50 volunteer workers, "the program would not have been a success without you."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred dollars (\$3,600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the state Comptroller."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even numbered year.

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on

account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR The Amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST The Amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 24th day of September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

SHRUB TONIC

If your green-leaved shrubs have turned yellow about this time of year, give them a little tonic — tonic in the form of a quarter to a half pound of copperas and one pound of sulphur for every large shrub or small tree.

That's the advice of Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. & M. College. This copperas-sulphur tonic will turn the leaves green again, like they should be. Fertilizers mixed with the soil at the same time also help prevent further yellowing of leaves.

Here's something else that will help keep the plants going this summer. Spread a vegetable mulch around the shrubs to keep the roots from drying out when the summer temperatures soar. Mulch holds moisture in the soil, making it available to plant roots, Miss Hatfield says. The mulch, spread over several square feet several inches thick, will gradually work itself into the ground.

Compost, grass cutting, straw, or any kind of decaying plant materials are all good, Miss Hatfield says. Grass cuttings furnish nitrogen and other plant foods. They also make soil acid, making iron more available for plant use. This helps the leaves stay green, she concludes.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Berry Meringue Ice Cream Pie

3 egg whites
 1-4 teaspoon salt
 1-4 teaspoon cream of tartar
 1 cup sugar
 1 teaspoon vinegar
 1 teaspoon water
 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 1 pint vanilla ice cream
 1 pint berries

Combine egg whites, salt and cream of tartar and beat stiff. Add sugar gradually, alternating with mixture of water, vinegar and vanilla. Beat until mixture stands alone. Make individual pastry shells from the meringue by dropping meringue onto heavy paper on a cookie sheet and shaping with a spoon. This also may be baked in a 9-inch pie plate lined with a circle of heavy paper, making several slits from outer edge toward center. Spread meringue mixture in pie plate making rim at edge. Bake in very slow oven 250 F. for an hour. Cool. Fill baked meringue with ice cream and sugar fresh of frozen berries.

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
