The Animas City Southwest in its issue of April 10th, assails the municipal af-Notary Public, fairs and the fathers of our ordinance laws, of Rico, as follows:

> "More than once during the past winter the municipal authorities of Rico have placed themselves in an unenviable and ludicrous position. It is safe to assume that at least one-third of the ordinances of that town are not only unjust but illegal and void. We will refer to only one in the matter of voting salaries to the Mayor and Board of Trustees. Sections 2640 and 2641, page 873 of the statute makes the offices of Mayor and Trustees in all towns in Colorado of not more than 5,000 inhabitants, purely honorary. It is a misdemeanor for them to accept any compensation whatever, unless the same is legally voted by a majority of the citizens. It was probably owing to their ignorance of the existence of this law that the Board of Trustees of Rico voted themselves five dollars per diem and the Mayor an annual salary of six hundred dollars. The Town Board of Trustees of Rico will find it advisable in the near future to repeal some of their farcial town ordinances and also to employ a competent town attorney."

In the charge of misdemeanor preferred by the Southwest, there is no ground or reason given, but the editor presumes that the board of trustees of the town of Rico have voted to themselves a salarywithout having submitted the question to a vote of the people. The ordinance concerning town officers, and the salaries to be allowed them, were simply passed upon by the old board, for the purpose of specifying the amounts, that they might with the question of salary be submitted to the approval or disapproval of the people. The salary voted was to be paid the new board; the old board not receiving a cent.

On the day of election ballots were circulated with the words "for salary" at the head-that it might be voted for, or WILL PRACTICE IN ALL THE COURTS OF THE STATE, "scratched." The result was 214 votes 'for salary,' and 14 against.

SEC. 3. The trustees shall be entitled to receive as compensation for their services the sum of five dollars for each meeting of the board they attend. And the Mayor the sum of six hundred dollars per annum.

While we are not an attorney, (after having printed the ordinance laws and proceedings of the board of trustees of Rico, from their beginning to the present time) we would assert that they have made but few errors or blunders for men who are inexperienced in these matters. The duties to be performed by a board of trustees for the town of Rico, are more complicated and difficult than those of fry-sized towns, where there is little (if anything) for a board of trustees to do.

The Southwest is rather presumtuous in its charge, not being aware of the adversity encountered by our trustees in the performance of their duties as agents of the people.

That an attorney of some brains and ability, (who has had experience in min ing towns similar to Rico) would be of great benefit to them and to their constituents, our trustees, also would the NEWS respectfully submit.

How much of our ordinance laws are illegal and void, we shall not presume, yet, if as charged by the above presumptuous journal,-one-third of our ordinances are void .- then, that ratio of the ordinance laws of the several towns of the editor seems to forget that his is a Colorado are illegal and void, as the most glass house. That Mining Bill.

The following is the gist of the new mining bill, recently introduced in the House by Rep. Belford. It will be seen on perusal that it is simply odious, if not preposterous and beyond all reason. News of its final disposition is awaited in Colorado, as also in all mining states and territories, with a great deal of interest:

The first amendment gives to the locator twenty acres, being 1,500 feet long and 600 feet wide, and does not allow him to follow mineral beyond the side

It is further amended so as to allow the locator one year after staking out his claim to discover mineral and give him, or assigns, one year after discovering mineral to apply for a patent.

It is further amended so as to require a deposit of \$250, instead of \$500, at the time the survey is made. These amendments were offered by Mr.

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
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
