Colorado Game Laws. The game and fish laws of Colorado are very strict and but little understood. For the benefit of our San Juan readers, the following compilation has been made; GAME. Birds.—In referring to birds, the law states that no person shall kill, ensnare, net or trap, within this State, any quail, wild turkey, curlew, plover, lark, dove, whip-poor-will, finch, thrush, sparrow, wren, martin, swallow, snow bird, bobolink, red-winged blackbird, crow, raven, turkey, buzzard, robin or any insectivorous bird, except partridge, pheasant, prairie chicken, prairie hen or grouse, which may be shot from October 1st to November 1st.

Animals.—The section of the law relating to animals says that no person shall kill or wound, ensnare or trap any elk, deer, buffalo or bison, fawn or antelope within the State between the 1st of January and the 15th of September, and no person except butchers or persons dealing in meat, shall offer to sell or expose the hind quarters of any of said animals without offering and exposing also the forequarters of the same. And no person shall wantonly kill any of the birds or animals before mentioned. Any person found outside of an incorporated town or village in possession of two or more of the saddles or hindquarters of any elk, deer, buffalo or bison, fawn or antelope without having the forequarters thereof, shall be deemed guilty of violating the law, and such possession shall be prima facie evidence of his having wantonly killed said animals. The killing of mountain sheep at any time is prohibited for ten years following February 1885, under heavy penalty by legislative enactment.

EXEMPTION.—The law does not prohibit taxidermists from killing birds or animals for the purpose of preservation in cabinets or museums. NECESSITY.—The law does not prohibit persons from killing animals to a reasonable extent, caused by a scarcity of food. It is not lawful for any person to kill, or take, any fish in any waters in the State within 200 yards of any fishway or artificial or natural obstruction, nor to take or kill any speckled trout, or food fish, by poison or any drugs, or by any explosive substance, or by the erection of any weir, dam or artificial obstruction, or by any net or seine, or any device, except by hook and line, at any time in any of the public waters of the State. Provided, That the State Fish Commissioner may take fish, or permit he same by written permission, for the purposes of science, cultivation or dissemination. And no person is allowed to take any fish at any time from any private lake pond or stream used for the propagation of such fish, except by the consent of the owners of such waters.

La Plata and Dolores. Rice threatens soon to come to the front as the leading mining camp of the state. The recent strikes in the San Juan carbonate camp are simply fabulous. The Southwestern Stock Grower's Association, with headquarters at Durango, already has a membership of 76, representing a combined capital of \$3,000,000. The Durango Dressed Beef and Packing Company, consisting of Carlisle Brothers, Pearson Brothers and John Reid, shipped seven car loads of steers, this week. Three car loads went to Silverton and four to Denver. The company expects to ship four or five hundred head more in a week or so.

Painting it Red. Lafayette (Ind.) Courier. A comical incident in the Illinois senatorial contest transpired at Watseka, Ill., May 20th. Major Peters, editor of the Republican, of that place, and republican member of the Legislature from Iroquois county, when assured of Logan's election telegraphed the boys from Springfield: "Logan is elected. Paint my old home red." He meant, of course, for them to hold a jollification in Watseka, but the boys took him at his word, and, showing the message to Mrs. Peters, gained her consent, and forthwith the entire male population turned out, and procuring the brightest red paint imaginable, painted the house, barn and out houses scarlet—roof, chimney and all, not sparing even the fences and tree trunks. When the Major heard of the affair this morning he was the maddest man in the nation, notwithstanding Logan's election.

There are two noted horses in Colorado which have carried their riders in many battles. In his herd of horses in Southern Colorado ex-Gov. Hunt has an aged gelding once ridden by Kit Carson on his death raids against the Indians. General Grant's once famous stallion, Claymoun— the one he gave \$5,000 to Mr. Chas. Backman for—was traded on the Purgatoire in Colorado the other day for a soldier's tent and a camp kettle.

A CHANGE in ownership of some Dolores county cattle is spoken of by the Durango Advertiser. Mr. Bennett Bishop a few days ago purchased the cattle interests of Messrs. A. Krumpantitzky, Chas. Talbot, Geo. Graham and Adolph Lusk, amounting in all to about four hundred head. Mr. Bishop only a few months ago came to Durango from Wyoming where he was engaged in the cattle business. In future his range will be Cross Cañons.

ED. CURRY is mashed on the weather. He says in the Telluride Journal: "Those who get up with the lark now-a-days will enjoy a delicious treat. The air is the clearest, purest and freshest. The birds sing the sweetest, and all nature seems to be out doing herself, in her efforts to atone for the past. During the past week the weather has been very summer like. It has seemed as though the sky stooped down to clasp the earth in its blue arms, and when night comes with its thousands of eyes, it seems only a step from this mundane sphere to the starry realms above. Verily these Colorado days are too lovely, and the nights in their beauty must be seen to be appreciated."

COL. GARDENER a somewhat noted Indian inspector, was interviewed in Denver the other day and says the idea that death is rapidly making the Indians an extinct race is erroneous. They are holding their own in almost every tribe. The census has never been perfectly taken, but so far as perfected it shows they are not going very fast. The Navajoes claim that they have lived on Puget Sound for fifteen generations, that is during the lives of fifteen old men, each man being considered to live 70 years, making 1,050 years. Of old "Colorow" band there are now only 42 members and his party, which does not stand high with any tribe, will soon become extinct.

THE law in this State regarding the exemption of debtors' wages to the amount of \$100, provides that "there shall be exempt from levy under execution or attachment and garnishment the wages and earnings of any debtor to an amount not exceeding one hundred dollars earned during the thirty days next preceding such levy under execution or attachment, or garnishment is the same: provided said debtor shall at the time of such levy under execution or attachment or garnishment be the head of a family or the wife of a head of a family, and such family is dependent in whole or in part upon said wages or earnings for support."

A SCIENTIST says "that the way to sleep is to think of nothing," read Mrs. Smith in a newspaper. "If that be true I should say that you would sleep all the time, my dear," said her husband. "No doubt, Mr. Smith, for I think a great deal of you."

Off for Mexico. A special to the New York Sun from New Orleans says the investigation that was made by the Government into the defalcation in the United States sub-treasury in this city was so secretly conducted that even the press had no idea of what was going on. The accounts were examined May 23 and found to be correct. On Saturday another investigation was made which discovered a shortage in the accounts of Aufdemorte, the Redemption Clerk. On Monday morning Aufdemorte failed to appear at his office. The case was put in the hands of the detectives and the department at Washington was notified. Everything now shows that Aufdemorte managed his flight very skillfully. It is supposed by the officers that he left for Mexico on Saturday's train and consequently landed in Mexico on Sunday. When, therefore, on Monday the fact of the defalcation became assured Aufdemorte was in the interior of Mexico.

CHARLEY PECK, well known to many Ourayites as the proprietor of a hotel at Wagon Wheel Gap, is a man of note. On the occasion of Old Tecumseh Sherman's visit to this country several years ago the General was a guest at Peck's Hotel, and wishing to make himself agreeable to the host, among other things said: "Mr. Peck, I have heard of you frequently in the east as a clever host, and a gentleman well known throughout the west." "Yes," responded Charles, "it is wonderful how the names of noted men are bruited about the country. Now, General, I've heard of you, too, all the way out here," and Charles smiled benignly as he ordered something hot with lemon on the side.—Muldoon.

THE throne of Mexico is now exhibited at the New Orleans exposition, and from the descriptions given of it we judge it to be a magnificent affair. It is to be used by the President of Mexico on state occasions, and is valued at \$50,000, the gold and silver threads worked into the bullion embroidery being alone worth \$15,000. The draperies that hang from a huge gold crown are of crimson brocade, and are drawn back by golden ropes and tassels. Below sweep massive folds of ruby velvet, in the midst of which is embroidered a red Phrygian cap on which appears the word "Libertad," while the ornamentation is costly and historic. Inside these draperies, the same magnificence of brocade satin, gold and silver reigns. The throne itself is supported by two huge gilded eagles, and is of ruby velvet. The entire structure has Aztec and Spanish emblems.—Denver Times.

On a certain occasion W. R. Travers was in a stage going up Fifth avenue, and his son, W. R. Jr., who was then a very small boy, was sitting on his knee, the stage being very crowded. A lady got in and there was no seat for her. Mr. Travers, with his usual gallantry, said to his son: "B-Billy, g-get up and give this l-lady your seat."

FERDINAND WARD, the aspiring young man who stole some \$1,500,000 worth of money, bonds and securities from the Marine Bank, has been indicted by the New Grand Jury. He is trying the habeas corpus dodge in the court of Oyer and Terminer and his case will come up, for trial next Monday. His indictment is for larceny in the first degree.

At the Gallup mines in New Mexico a vein of water has been discovered at a depth of 130 feet, in horizontal strata. This is an important find for that region, for it indicates that subterranean water is more abundant there than has heretofore been supposed, and will stimulate further experiment in this direction.

COLONEL D. C. DODGE, the widely known Colorado railroad man, who was at the head of one of the quarreling factions of the road last spring, has accepted the Vice-Presidency and General Managership of the Mexican Railway Company and the Mexican National Construction Company.

THE census bureau has taken into consideration the advisability of re-grouping the United States, dividing the country into northern and southern Atlantic, mid and western states. Under this new decision, Colorado will be the most easterly of the western states.

Junction Creek Ores for Rico. There is a strong probability that Rico will be called upon to treat the ore output of the Junction creek mines in La Plata county. John Conley, a well-known packer, has been requested to go over the route from Rico to Junction creek mines via Bear creek and determine the cost of packing the ores across the divide down Bear creek to the Dolores river, where the trail will intersect with the river wagon road and teams can be employed. The request is made by several of the mine owners of the Junction creek district, and we understand that samples of ore have been sent to the Pasadena smelter for test and terms of treatment. Conley will make an investigation of the route in a few days. It seems that at present there is no road leading from Durango to the mines named and as the commissioners of La Plata county cannot reconcile the two opposing factions as to the route of the road, there is no probability of a road being built, and the miners think they can make money by shipping to Rico for treatment. There is no reason why a good trail from the Dolores river on a good grade to the Junction creek mines cannot be built at small cost and the distance is not great. The manifold advantages of Rico as a smelting centre are being recognized and will in time greatly aid in building up a metropolis here. The miners in Junction creek last season when roads were good, paid \$9 a ton for hauling ore from La Plata Basin to Durango, and the additional cost of packing ore from the mines to the basin.
