# The Anti-Polygamy Bill as it Passed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 .- The following is the anti-polygamy bill as passed by the senate:

the revised statutes of the United States be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows, viz:

Every person who has a husband or wife living who, in any territory or other place over which the United States has exclusive jurisdiction, hereafter marries another, whether married or single, and any man who hereafter simultaneously or on the same day marries more than one woman in the territory or other places over which the United States has exclusive jurisdiction is guilty of polygamy, and shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$500 and by imprisonment for a term of not more than five years: but

whose husband or wife by such marriage shall have been absent for five successive years and is not known to such person to be living and is believed by such person to be dead; nor to any person by reason of any former marriage, which shall have been dissolved by valid decree of a competent court; nor to any person by reason

of any former marriage which shall have been pronounced void by a valid decree of a competent court on the ground of nullity of marriage contract.

SEC. 2. That the foregoing provisions shall not affect prosecution or punishment of any offence already committed against the section amended by the first section of this act.

SEC. 3. That if any male person in a erritory or other place over which the United States have exclusive jurisdiction, hereafter cohabit with more than one woman he shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$300 or by imprisonment for not more than six months or both; said punishment to be in the discretion of the court.
