The railway mail service of the United States embraces sixty-nine lines of railway post office, some of them longer than necessary to reach across a whole Euro pean kingdom. Including steamboat routes, the annual service foots up 102, 166,001 miles, on which mails are constantly being received, distributed and delivered, with a saving in time over the old methods, upon each letter or package handled, of from twelve to twenty-four hours, and in one year the employes in the railway mail service distributed 2.658. 483,320 letters and pieces of mail matter.

Rico has a money-order postoffice, and was compelled to be made such within a shorter time after the establishment of the office than any other postoffice in the United States, on account of the great demand and increased call for money order business.

There are no Indians at or near Rico, and we are in no more danger from Indians than are the people of Massachusetts or Vermont.

In the Dolores valley, along the river, above and below Rico, a water power may be had, which will supply the requisite for any kind of machinery in the known world.


