DOLORES NEWS.

Refutation of a Slander Upon Some of Durango's Citizens.

From the Durango Record. An attack upon some of the citizens of Durango, was made in the Rocky Mountain News of the 31st, ultimo., in a letter purporting to come from this city, but bearing internal evidence that the writer was never in Durango.

This band of Farmington cow-boys, has also threatened to burn Durango because the Garrett, Eskridge, Stockton party is believed to be harbored and protected here. This is the party that is posing before the public as martyrs at the mercy of a band of ruffians.

It is also believed that this quarrel is a pretext on the part of the cattle men, who are largely in the ascendancy in the Farmington party, to drive out the ranch men, who are fencing the country and rendering it more and more unfavorable every year for the cattle men, who do not own land to any great extent.

Not even are the leaders probably so to the full extent; but as in all such lawless movements, a power is set in motion which cannot be controlled.

The boys who are here are quiet and peaceable citizens of Durango, whatever they may or may not have been elsewhere. Like Stockton, so far as any one here knows, has been guilty of no crime, unless attempting to save his brother from the toils of the law, at Cimarron, some years since, be a crime.

At least forty refugees from that section are said to be in Durango, with many of whom we have talked, men who are neutral in this quarrel, and have left their homes because they did not propose to wear revolvers the rest of their lives and make themselves targets for bullets in other men's quarrels.

There are a half-dozen men in the vicinity of Farmington, determined to hunt these boys to the death. The rest of the community have no part nor lot in the quarrel, and would prefer to keep out of it, but in many cases, have been compelled in order to save life and property, or at least under the belief that, otherwise they could not save them, to join the Farmington party, although having no sympathy with them.

There are doubtless some bad men in both parties. It is not likely that a feud could grow to such proportions, with blood shedding on both sides, without more or less of wrong doing on both sides. Evil passions have become inflamed and both parties have doubtless resorted to extreme measures; but the account given in the News, is preposterous, gotten up either by the Farmington party, to mislead the public, and create a sympathy for them, or more likely by some irresponsible newspaper reporter, careless of the injury he might do, who has gathered the data from New Mexican sources, and gotten every thing by the eyelids.

We have heretofore repeatedly refused to air these troubles through the columns of our paper, having had numerous communications sent in by both parties; but the wholesale misrepresentation of the boys here, which is being made through

the press of the state, as exemplified recently in a letter in the Colorado Springs Gazette, and more flagrantly in the Denver News, seems to demand in justice to them that the truth as gathered from neutral parties, be placed before the public.

DOTS FROM THE DOLORES.

Points of Progress from an Interview with a United States Deputy Surveyor at Rico.

Denver Tribune. Mr. Frank W. Gove, Deputy United States Mineral Surveyor, stationed at Rico, after a visit of some days to his brother, Mr. Aaron Gove, Superintendent of the Denver schools, will return Monday next for the field of his labors among the mines of the Dolores.

Mr. Gove, in connection with his official duties, is the representative of the Montezuma Irrigating Ditch company, an enterprise which promises to be of great benefit to the mining section of the Dolores for all time to come.

Upon the Dolores river, fifty miles below Rico is a beautiful valley of arable land twenty miles in length, and embracing 50,000 acres at an elevation of 5,500 feet. The soil is exactly similar to that of the Mancos, but a few miles further south, and productive of the cereals and all the vegetation indigenous to the climate and soil of Colorado.

It is not productive of all these things, merely, but all manner of vegetation springs forth in amazing luxuriance and abundance. It is the purpose of this company to construct a system of ditches through the entire valley, so that every foot of the ground may be placed under thorough irrigation and ready for cultivation by the farming emigration of the future.

When this is accomplished the land will be quickly peopled and all the outlying mining camps beyond the centers of the great San Juan will have a perpetual source of supply. The ground has already been surveyed by Mr. Gove and the work of construction begun. Mr. Gove reports the town and mining district of Rico in a flourishing condition, with the prospect of great accomplishments this year, which, it may be said, will be its first season of actual development.

A Sad Death.

Durango Record. The Durango Record gives the following beautifully expressive account of the death of Mrs. Enderich:

News has been received here of the death of Mrs. Enderich, wife of C. Enderich, Esq. of this place, which occurred at Pagosa Springs, while en route for her old home at Newark, New Jersey, in search of health. She had been for years an invalid, and hopeless of recovery, in the high altitudes of Colorado, which seemed unfavorable to her, she had started with her three younger children, for home, Mr. Enderich and his oldest boy at the same time leaving for Rico to look after his interests there.

It was a sad parting, as both husband and wife felt that it was an experiment the result of which neither could foresee; but cruel circumstances compelled the separation, the husband being pecuniarily unable to accompany her.

The journey proved too severe a strain upon the weakened constitution of the invalid, and she succumbed at Pagosa, in a dying condition, and soon sank into her last sleep. Her husband was at once notified; but owing to the slow mails and the difficulties of transportation to and from Rico, he only arrived in Durango, last evening, having walked all the way, leaving this morning for Pagosa, to look after his little motherless children.

The wife was necessarily laid to rest by stranger hands, and he will not even have the consolation of looking on her sweet dead face.

A lovely and gentle woman has faded from earth, a good woman who was devotedly attached to her and had cared for her as a mother would for a child, for twelve long years of invalidism, is left desolate. Four bright and beautiful children are left to the cold mercies of the world without a mother's tenderness to guard and guide them. The tragedy is ended, but the curtain falls upon the scene, in this world, for one of the actors; but it rises for her, in another, brighter and cheerier, where the still waters and green pastures await her, and refresh her weary soul.

The Pike County lode, near Ophir, is reported sold to a Boston company for \$10,000. The ore is galena and gray copper.—Ouray Times.

A. B. DANIELS.

One of Those Good Old Timers Has Crossed the River.

In one of the parlors of the residence of Governor Tabor, Mr. A. B. Daniels, the banker millionaire, expired from heart disease a few minutes before seven o'clock on the evening of April 9th. The sad affair came so sudden, and was so unexpected, that when the rumor was raised about Denver on that evening, it was not generally accepted.

For some years past Mr. Daniels has been in ill-health, and had only recently returned from an extended tour in California, where he had gone in the hope of improving his health.

From the Denver News we take the following concerning the life of Mr. Daniels:

"The death of Mr. Daniels, while sudden, was not entirely unexpected, as he had been suffering from heart disease for a number of years.

The late A. B. Daniels was one of Colorado's Pioneers, one of the men who came to the site of Denver in 1859, when the gold discoveries set the world throbbing with excitement, and was gifted with a sufficient amount of discernment to know that the then wilderness would in a few brief years become a powerful star in the galaxy of states.

He was about fifty-five years of age and a native of New York state, from whence he removed to Iowa about 1850. He remained in Iowa until 1859, when the Pike's Peak excitement broke out. Dr. Daniels married a most estimable lady in the year of 1863, and the fruits of that union were three children. Mrs. Daniels was laid to rest in Riverside about three years ago, and two of her children are sleeping by her side. The remaining child is a son eight years of age. A brother and sister of the deceased man reside near the old home-stead, in New York.

During life, Mr. Daniels was exceedingly successful in his business ventures, and leaves a fortune of at least \$1,000,000. At the time of his demise he was vice-president of the Colorado National bank, and a director in the Denver and New Orleans Railway company. On his arrival here in 1859 he went into the business of retailing groceries on the corner of Fifteenth and Larimer streets, where Hoffer's market now stands, the firm name being Daniels and Brown. The firm was so successful that in 1862 they removed to the corner of Fifteenth and Blake streets. When the great fire in 1863 came their building and stock was burned to the ground, and being uninsured, the loss was what may be termed a total one. Within a few days the firm went into business again on Blake street, directly opposite their former site. Fortune smiled upon them to such an extent that three years later Mr. Daniels withdrew from the banking business with the Kountze Brothers. At all times he has been foremost in the advancement of Colorado interests, and prior to the sale of the Denver, South Park and Pacific railway, was a director in that enterprise. He has always given freely to charity, and his untimely demise will not be mourned in Denver alone, but in every city, town and mining camp in Colorado."

On April 9th Gen. Ben Spooner died at Lawrenceburg, Ind. He was Colonel of the 83d Indiana in the war and lost a leg at Kennesaw. He was born in Mansfield, O. He was aged 58.

It is stated that Adjutant-General Frost, arrived at Bloomfield, twelve miles east of Farmington on Saturday, and was expected at Farmington, Sunday, for the purpose of organizing two military companies.

A raid was lately made in Canon Largo, about eighteen miles above Farmington in New Mexico, upon the settlers there, who are Mexicans. The raiders were a party of about forty men, composed of a few white men and the balance Mexicans—the former acting as leaders. Their object was plunder.

There are a few, perhaps, who take advantage of the situation—men who have nothing to do with the quarrel, are stealing cattle from the range near Farmington, and the Stockton party have the credit of doing the stealing. All members of the Stockton party known to the News, are honorable, peaceable law abiding citizens.

Rumored Appointments. General Kirkpatrick announced to his friends lately that Garfield and Blaine had assured him that he is to be appointed Minister to Chile. The President has offered the position of Solicitor of the Treasury to Warner H. Bateman, of Cincinnati. When the deadlock ends in the Senate the President will nominate J. D. Baxter, medical purveyor, to be Surgeon General of the army in place of Surgeon General Barnes, and Colonel Daniel McClure, now Assistant Paymaster General, to be Paymaster General in place of Paymaster General Nathan W. Brown, both General Barnes and Brown being eligible for retirement.

A correspondent of the Durango Record concludes an article regarding a stage driver's treatment to Mrs. C. Endrich, as follows:

The action of the Stage Company's agent caused general indignation here, from the fact that he would knowingly leave a white woman to die in the stable with no one to speak to her. He knew that she was there two whole days without medical or other attendance, save that of the stable man. Such conduct justly merits general condemnation. When she was thought to be an object of charity she agent flatly refused, in the name of the company to contribute to her relief. Farther comment would be superfluous.

If such be true, both driver and agent are no longer good enough to live and surely to mean to die. A few years in the penitentiary they richly deserve.

MILITARY.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, DENVER, COLORADO.

CAPTAIN—Your letter of March 20th and the muster roll of your company have been received. The letter shows the work of a practical hand and I am pleased to see so many old soldiers among your organization.

The legislature failed to make any appropriation for the purchase of military stores at its last session so that until the taxes begin to come in next winter, we will have to do the best we can with what means we have on hand. I will send you an order for the muskets and ammunition now at Rico, and will forward to you fifty cavalry cartridge boxes with belts and plates, as soon as I can do so, I will give you Springfield carbines instead of the muskets, and send slings and swivels for them. This is the best I can do for you at present. Early next year we propose to uniform every company in the state with the U. S. regulation uniform. For the present your company will be attached to the Second Battalion of Infantry as Co. E. You will form part of the brigade of Gen. U. M. Curtis and be attached to the Second division under command of Major Gen. A. P. Curry. Your battalion has at present no Major, Capt. Geo. J. Richards of Lake City being Senior Captain.

The amount of your bond for arms will be twelve hundred dollars. I will forward the bond and order for the arms now at Rico when the cartridge boxes and belts are ready to ship.

MINING MENTION.

Something of the Progress of Rico and the Carbonate Camp.

The Newman Group of mines are now starting up for the summer's work, and will never be shut down again.

Messrs. Spurlock and Smith are sinking a hole on Deadwood Creek, and are now in three and a half feet of lead matter, making a fair showing.

CARBONATE SPRING.—The Spang, owned by Messrs. Friend and Rinsow, have a tunnel at a depth of 147 feet, with a fine body of mineral in sight.

DEMOCRAT.—Messrs. McCormick and Friend, owners, are sinking an incline, which is now at a depth of 45 feet, in three feet of gouge and quartz matter.

We understand that work will be begun on the Bancroft Millionaire and Tyrona in a short time. These lodes are all situated just across the Rio Dolores from Rico.

OSTARO.—Messrs. A. K. Prescott and D. McGraw commence work on this property soon, and hope to develop it into a mine, equal to some of its neighboring mines on Horse Creek.

ELGIN SAW MILL.—E. P. Lehman having leased the saw mill of the Elgin Company, located at the mouth of Horse Gulch, is now cutting lumber for the Rico market. With three mills there cannot be a great scarcity of lumber.

STOWN.—This property, situated on Dolores mountain, now has a shaft at a depth of 73 feet, showing a 16 foot vein, which is nearly perpendicular, an assay made from the ore at this depth, gave \$2,544.48 coin value, silver per ton.

MAY.—The May lode on Horse Creek, now has a tunnel under way which is to be driven 100 feet. Messrs. McCarthy and Porter, owners, say they are now in mineral, which improves in both quality and quantity as depth is attained. The ore is of quartz and carbonate.

NORTH STAR.—Gus Misch begins work on the Star this week and proposes to show what it is made of. He now has a shaft 40 feet deep, and a tunnel at a depth of 60 feet, (in mineral) on the St. Louis tunnel. Both of these properties will be worked continuously this summer.

ECLIPSE.—The Eclipse is situated near the first saw-mill. The owners, Messrs. A. K. Prescott, D. McGraw, A. M. Friend, and S. W. McCormick, will commence work in a few days. They have not concluded whether to ship the ore to Durango or hold over for home market.

THE HERMOSA MINING ASSOCIATION.—This company have begun earnest development on their several properties, situated in Pioneer District, near Rico. Forces will be put on the Silver King, situated on Dolores Mountain, adjoining the Newman. The Black Eagle situated on Horse Creek, above the Petzite, the Harriette, situated in Horse Gulch, just below the Johnnie Bull, and the Sunset and Brother Jonathan, directly off the north end line of the Johnnie Bull. The company are making arrangements for the purchase of several properties to be added to their list.

Surveying to Be Done At Once. Since the arrival of our friend, Frank W. Gove, Deputy United States Mineral Surveyor, he informs us that he has a contract for surveying 225,000 acres of land, running from Rico south, to the Big Bend, and to the Ute reservation line. The tract is to be townshipped and sectionized. Hermosa Park and all other parks and valleys tributary to Dolores valley, come under this survey. This is an important feature, essential to the advancement of a most promising section, and the matter is in excellent hands.

H. D. Breuninger writes us that Wall & Witter will not pay him for work they hired him to do.

FARMINGTON.

Editor News:—I will give you an outline of the trouble here which you may publish if you choose:

In the first place the Stockton party have made their appearance here with stolen stock, and have repeatedly been caught stealing stock on the La Plata, which of course made the owners angry and uneasy. Then the Port Stockton affair, it seems almost absurd to touch on that affair, as you certainly must know what an unprincipled fellow he was, leaving Animas City as he did for knocking a poor unoffending and unarmed negro in the head with a pistol, and no sooner did he get here, but he must do the same thing to a white man. He, too, was caught killing stock and selling both meat and hides, and even had the impudence to offer to give a bill of sale for the hides. You, of course, are aware how matters were settled with him. The affair at Mr. Hamlet's is well known by good honest settlers here to have been arranged between Eskridge and Garrett to go there and kill their man, and it was no fault of theirs that they did not fully succeed. Why now Eskridge's brother should take sides against us, or in any way feel injured I can't see, but seems to be as much interested against us as any one. For my part I can't see what any one down here has done unlawful or unjust—we have been the injured party in every way. Not long since, Tom Nance and Aaron Barker, while out attending to stock in their charge, were fired upon by the party from Durango, and poor Barkley was killed. The people of Durango and Animas must certainly have matters misrepresented to them. Perhaps Seth Wolfelt has been making false reports, but he is too contemptible to notice. The fellows have lately made a raid down the La Plata and stolen stock. And there is little doubt but what they will come down here once too often.
