A "QUIEN SABE" CASE. Removal of the Uncompahgres, and Other Indian Matters. It begins to look now as if there was a probability that the Utes, or, rather, the Uncompahgre Utes, would be removed at no distant day, and, better still, it seems that no great difficulty would be experienced in their removal. So many troops have been placed in the Indian country that the red skins seem to have concluded that resistance would be useless. Still, there is no telling what may transpire, as their apparent willingness to go may be but a blind to throw people off their guard. The Muldoon in its last issue says that Commissioners Mears, Russell, and McMorris were in town last Monday and say that the transfer of the Utes to the Grand River country will be made as speedily as possible. The commissioners will utilize a portion of this week, in appraising the government's and Chipeta's property. On Saturday morning, in company with an able bodied escort and the leading Ute chiefs, they'll leave for Grand River to select agricultural and grazing land for the Uncompahgre tribe. The arrival of the troops at the Uncompahgre, Southern and White River agencies has convinced the red brothers that they want to go. There is not as much as a lingering doubt in their minds on that point. Shavenaux is perfectly willing to bid adieu to the verdant mesas that margin the beautiful Uncompahgre, and his way to pastures new.

A large body of cavalry and infantry, numbering about 450 men, reached the Cantonment this week and the Indians have got their Saratogas packed and are ready to go. So much for the Uncompahgres. Turning to the Southern Utes and renegade bands, everything does not look so favorable. The fact that all men from the vicinity of the neighboring rivers to the south who can go are out trying to rescue the stock stolen from them by the Indians, precludes the possibility of our hearing from that country for a time. Since the departure of our Rico boys to the aid of the stockmen we have had no definite news concerning them, except such as is contained in the following letter from the Durango Record's correspondent: "A company of about sixty-five men, well armed, left Big Bend for the Blue Mountains, to try and gather up the stock out there belonging to Mr. Alderson and others, and should the Ute Indians molest them, they are determined to fight for their rights. About thirty of the men are from Rico. This brave band show their valor by their readiness to go and fight, if necessary, for the protection of the settlers and their property. It is to be hoped that they may all return safely to their homes and friends. They will always be remembered kindly by the poor unprotected settlers of this country. Four companies of colored troops are expected here soon to act as scouts."

Reports were circulated here this week that the boys had captured 70 horses, but as it would be next to impossible for them to communicate with the settlers, we presume it is ungrounded. The probabilities are that we will not hear from them until they return from their expedition. The settlers on the Mancos have built a stockade around the school house, near Bauer's store, and are making all possible preparations for protecting themselves in case of attack. Although the attack is not expected, it is well enough to be prepared. "In time of peace, prepare for war."

Murder in Denver. Charles W. Stickney on the 31st ult. murdered at his boarding house, in cold blood, Montgomery F. Campan, and by accident one of the bullets from the pistol which the murderer held in his hand, flew wide of its intended mark and entered the heart of Mrs. H. O. Devereaux, a young and beautiful woman whom Stickney had never seen; and he did not know until an hour later that he had been the cause of her death. This murder and accidental killing is the sequel of a story that for some months past has been the leading scandal in legal circles and the society of Denver. Its complications are many; woman's frailty, compromised by a husband; man's passion and sin, offset by charges of preconcerted blackmail pursued systematically to the death. The murderer was at once lodged in jail. A large mob collected and threats of lynching were freely made. Charles W. Stickney, the murderer, was born at Shawnee town, Illinois, and was a clerk at Grant's headquarters during the earlier part of the war. He was a teacher, and with his family came to Denver about a year ago. Campan was from one of the old established families in Detroit, of French extraction and was a near relative of Thos. and Wm. C. Campan, who are now interested in mining on Bear creek. Campan went to Denver about two years ago, just from school and entered into the real estate business, for which purpose he was provided with funds by his relatives. Mrs. Devereaux was the wife of H. O. Devereaux. They were married only three months ago and left their home in Toronto, Canada, to go to Denver, where Mr. D. had engaged in business. She was about 23 years old, of girlish frame and very beautiful.

Mrs. Abraham Lincoln is slowly dying at Springfield, Ill. Her physicians say she can live but a few days.

Mining Mention. The Bull Domingo is standing by its owners and is producing 150 oz. ore. The trial of the Johnny Bull case was set for the 6th, but no news has yet been received from Denver. It is the intention of its owners to run a tunnel of 200 feet on the Robt. E. Lee. They have sunk the shaft to contact and want to tap it with a cross cut. We have been in camps before where extensive smelting works would be built without the ore to justify it, but this is the first camp we ever saw with oceans of rich mineral and no facilities for treating it. Recent assays from the Sundown show the difference in various qualities of rock taken from the vein. The amounts per ton in silver are: \$30.77; \$3.99; \$278.38 and \$327.09. The first two assays were from the quartz. The Wabash continues to improve and is regarded as one of the richest strikes of the state. Lead carbonate ore is profusely scattered through a 22-foot vein, and the entire body is extremely rich. Suidam is working it with energy.

San Miguel Items. Columbia is a new mining town, located on the west side and near to the Rio San Miguel, in Iron Springs Mining District, Ouray county, Colorado, about thirty miles northeast of Rico. At present there are several general merchandise and other business houses there. A forty-stamp mill is being erected one mile from Columbia, for the treatment of the ores of the Iron Springs District. Columbia is about thirteen miles distant from Ophir, in a southwesterly direction. Columbia is connected with Ouray by a good toll road, which is to be completed to Rico by the first day of next August, (one month and nineteen days from to-day.) Considerable work is going on in the mines in the camp. Columbia is to have a newspaper, the San Miguel Journal, published by J. R. and F. E. Curry. Columbia, with its resources, will, no doubt, make a good little mining town.

A fellow named "Buckskin Joe," who claims to have practised tight-rope walking all his life proposes to stretch a wire across the Royal Gorge in the Grand Canon, and make the trip some time in September next. In speaking of this projected scheme the Leadville Herald reporter, Joe says that he has practised tight-rope walking from his youth up; that the distance across the Royal Gorge is less than that across Niagara River, which was so often traversed by Blondin; that this programme instead of being a "mad project," is encouraged and backed by the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe road; and that a hundred thousand people from all parts of the union will be in the Grand Canon next September to witness the unparalleled performance, which he hopes to repeat daily during the month. The preliminary steps towards the undertaking have already been taken by Denver parties. All that we have to say is that if he doesn't break his neck he ought to.—Chieftain.

CHANGE OF MAIL. The postmaster at Rico has been officially instructed to send all mail for the East, via Durango, Pueblo and Santa Cruz, and to promptly report all failures and irregularities in the arrival of the mails at Rico. Under this order all mail from the East for Rico, will come via the same route, and under this new departure in mail matters, we will receive mail in Rico in a much shorter time than heretofore. As there have been two stage-coach robberies committed near Pagosa, on this route, lately, steps should be taken immediately, to guarantee the safe transportation of the mails over this route. Capture the gang of robbers that have lately stationed themselves near Pagosa.

Clives Hersee, a member of the Soldene troupe, has been having some trouble of late with his wife. Last Saturday their train was obliged to wait an hour and twenty minutes near the Forks of the Creek, on the Colorado Central. While the other members of the troupe were eating lunch and picking flowers, Hersee walked up to Miss Somerville, one of the troupe, and said "Good-bye." He then turned round and walking deliberately to the center of the bridge, jumped head first into the foaming current below. He made desperate efforts to swim out, but could not. His body was probably recovered at the stone dam, five miles down the stream, a short distance west of Beaver Brook. Somebody has jumped the Flat Broke mine, on Greene mountain, which has been patented for four years, and the patent is on record in the Recorder's office. Jumping patented mines is very unprofitable business, as not one case in ten thousand can be made to stick, after spending in many cases all the property is worth.—La Plata Miner.

This is a fair sample of a San Juaner's cheek, and similar cases happen frequently in this vicinity. There have been many mines jumped near Rico which were the oldest locations in camp and the stakes were driven long before the jumper saw Rico. The mines in some cases have been worked almost constantly, but these mine jumpers seem to think that they may possibly extort a few dollars from the rightful owners by systematic blackmail.

Muldoon Mixture. Barrister Cassidy has gone to Rico, where it is to be hoped he will remain. Fred Mayol returned from his cattle camp near Wright's Springs Monday and thinks his loss will approximate one hundred head. He found the carcasses of thirty-three young steers and believes a greater portion of the missing to have been run off in the direction of White River. Isaac King, whose herd is near Mayol's found fifteen head bearing his brand that had been "tongued and branded," and thinks his loss much heavier. Most of the carcasses discovered were perforated with rifle balls. The cowboys should inaugurate the blessed work of retaliation before the red brothers bid adieu to the verdant mesas of the Bonnie Miguels. P. S.—Shoot low.

General Lionel A. Sheldon, of Ohio, the newly appointed Governor of New Mexico, accompanied by his wife, arrived in Santa Fe, on the evening of the third. He qualified on the fourth, after which Secretary Ritch turned over the Governor's office and the new administration was formally inaugurated. A large number of the citizens paid their respects to Governor Sheldon, and from his many inquiries as to the wants and necessities of the Territory, he has created an impression that his administration will be an exceptionally good one. Rio Arriba county affairs are already receiving attention. A terrible accident occurred near Granite a few days since. Twenty-six laborers were seated on the flat car and in the caboose of the construction train. After eating dinner Joseph Ryan, the construction boss started the train backwards to the piece of work. The shining new engine, "Mogul," was approaching rapidly but noislessly from the opposite direction and on rounding a curve which had precluded the sight of each other, a collision occurred which killed Patrick McMahon and Wm. Wright and severely injured nine other laborers. Floyd, a noted Colorado foot-racer and McComb, the California professional, ran a race of 100 yards in Denver last Saturday for an immense purse—\$5,000. Floyd won the race, leading McComb by five yards. Time: 9 1/2 seconds, being the fastest on record in the world. Fusilade, a Kansas City horse, was natched by Lemasney Bros. against Clifton Bell's Lillie R. for a purse of \$4,000. The race was run in Denver on the 8d and was won by Fusilade in 1:46, being the fastest mile ever run in Colorado. A News man made some inquiry this week, of several property owners in Rico, as to the value of certain lots and improvements. The lowest price given was \$100, for an unimproved lot, at the east edge of town. Senator Dorsey has gone to his New Mexican ranch to escape the tortures of the star route investigation. He will find the Vermejo, Palo Blanco and Chico Springs quite a relief. Mrs. Maxwell, the celebrated Colorado huntress, who created such a stir at the Centennial, died at Rockaway Beach, R. I., on the morning of the 1st inst. Two little children were terribly mutilated by an explosion of giant powder at Leadville June 2d. They were the son and daughter of Chas. C. Smith. Some people have more of a hankering for selling prospects than helping a poor fellow to get a job. Geo. W. Lynch shot and killed Charles Lyle, near Leadville last week. He says he did it in self-defense. J. A. Williamson, commissioner of the general land office for a long time, has resigned that position. Pierre Lorillard's Iroquois won the Derby race. Rico is the liveliest camp in the Rockies. "I'd like to a got a finger in the pot."
