Silverton Democrat-Herald. The body of Swan Neilson, the mail carrier who was lost on the 22d of December, 1883, was found on Tuesday last, near the head of the gulch or canon just on the opposite side of the Ophir range. Neilson left Silverton with the Ophir mail, on the morning of December 22, the fourth day of one of the heaviest snowstorms that ever prevailed in this section of the state. Succeeding in reaching the top of the range in safety, he passed down the western slope of the divide, starting a snowslide, in which he was caught and killed. The fall of snow during the winter of 1883-4 was so great that it did not entirely disappear last summer, and in places where slides were frequent as much as 30 feet of snow remained when the winter of 1884-5 set in. Late in the fall last year and before the new snows commenced, Neilson's hat, one of his snowshoes, his snowshoe pole and the mail sack were found, and although a diligent search was made for the body, it could not be discovered, as the snow was banked up to a heighth of fully 30 feet and covered nearly an acre of ground. Some weeks ago it became evident that all of it would disappear from the bottom of the gulch where the body of Neilson was known to be, and as mentioned above, it was found on Tuesday last. 
