The Grand View smelting works "blew in" Nov. 8th., at 8:20 p. m., every arrangement having been made for the beginning of a successful and profitable run on our Rico ores. Last Thursday we visited the works to learn all that might interest those interested in the Dolores mining camp.

During the first 36 hours run, four tons of base bullion were produced from fifteen tons of ore and fluxing. The present capacity of the smelter is twelve tons per day, which will be gradually increased as ores come in.

Large piles of ore are lying in the ore houses, which will be treated during the liminary examination it is said that Frank winter. The company have been fortunate in procuring a great abundance of fuel. The success in coking the coal from their coal banks six miles above Rico, insures a successful run, without the roasting process.

Prof. H. J. Hardess, formerly of Freiburg, but latterly of Leadville, who has charge of the smelting, has done away with the necessity of roasting the ores first in the roasting furnaces. The ore is crushed and fed into the blast furnaces, producing matte, which is broken up and roasted in large heaps on the ground, and run through the furnaces the second time, running out and being moulded into 100 pound bars of base bullion.

When the ores have been crushed they are bedded in order to obtain a correct mixture. The fluxing is magnetic iron mixture. The fluxing is magnetic iron and lime. 




