While, generally speaking, they would be in error on this point, yet in the latter portion of the proposition and in so far as it relates to themselves,

they would be exactly right.

The business of prospecting is recognized to be as legitimate and regular a means of gaining the necessaries of life, with a chance for some of its luxuries in the future, as that of the miner or mill owner. Every man who has a knowledge of nature's ways sufficient under ordinary circumstances to render him able to seek intelligently over the surface of a given section of country for mineral veins, possesses something which has cost him years of toil and hardship to obtain. Such a laborer is just as worthy of his hire as any one in any of the walks of life, and to think of being able to secure the services of a competent prospector for a mere grub-stake "with tobacco and clothes thrown in," is the height of absurdity. None but the lazy and utterly worthless vagabonds who every summer swarm through the mountains living off 'grub stakes" furnished by unsuspecting novices in mining, will now a-days accept propositions involving, if honestly carried out, the maximum amount of trouble and the minimum amount of reward, unless good fortune should befall. When, therefore, uninformed persons do not succeed, as is usually the case, in procuring property of some value, it will when inrestigated usually be found to be due to the employment of the class of mountain vagrants described, and this being so, their strictures upon prospectors are

had dealings with: The only sensible method, and the one which is regarded with the most favor among those with whom the business of prospecting and mining stands in a favorable light, is that by which the prospector employed is furnished with means and material to operate quickly and economically, according to the dictates of his judgment. When we use the word prospector, we do not necessarily mean' an individual whose chief qualifications consist in his ability to absorb large quantities of whiskey and talk loud and knowingly about mining, and the remarkable discoveries he has made and missed durtheir special attention Those warsed ; eyes of the beholder throughout the great mineral fields of the Rocky Mountains, glance, formations most congenial to the existence of ore deposits, are the kind of prospectors whose labor is worth money,

Such men are of the kind, who, if search should reveal to them the whereabouts of a good vein, will act honestly with those in whose interest they are engaged. Others might and often do conceal important discoveries until such time as they can secure it for themselves alone.

Golgotha

The traveler down the Dolores river on his way to Rico sees toward the right and but a few miles distant, an enormous obelisk of red porphyry named the Lizzard's Head. During the past mining season several adventurous prospectors penetrated the wilds of the valley and head waters of the West Dolores river in search of mineral bearing territory. On one of these tours a ghastly discovery was made of two skeletons under a tree, and near them another, partially concealed by a clump of bushes. Near the first two several miners' tools were found, and near the other a pick and shovel. There was nothing about the remains by which they could be identified. They were decently interred and thus their history closed, except for the remembrance of a few of the earlier inhabitants of that section, who conjure that the remains found are those of three out of four Mormons, who, in 1876, worked in some spot, the precise location of which they concealed. They started for Ouray to buy tools, and on arriving at a cabin on the San Miguel were told they could not get through and obtained steel and other needed supplies of the old man at the cabin, agreeing to pay him for them another time. They said they had worked a tunnel 45 feet in on a rich lode. This work has never been found, and if done is supposed to be closed by a rock slide. The fourth man has never been heard of .- Silver

SALARY QUESTION.

This question is now regarded with some degree of interest. Some of the heavy tax payers are opposed to the city council receiving pay for services renderdered, contending that the town of Rico is thoroughly organized, and its laws framed, leaving only for the councilmen as duties, their judicious care in the selection of locality for improvement and expenditure of the public funds. A great many have requested the Dolores NEWS to advocate the dispensation of the right exercised by the councilmen to receive salary. At the first general election held in the town of Rico, in April, 1880, for the election of mayor, clerk and board of councilmen the salary question was voted upon, resulting in 214 votes "for salary," to 14 "against salary." According to the vote of the people the board has enjoyed the right of receiving salary for services, provided that the vote was in conformity with the law governing such election of "salary," or "no sal-



DIED.

In last week's issue we briefly referred to the illness of Robert Maxwell, and it is with profound regret that we chronicle his sad death which took place night before last. His age was about 28 years and his residence before coming to Rico was in the Los Cerrillas Mountains of New Mexico, where it is reported he had some very valuable mining property, but owing to some trouble, he was compelled to leave there for a time. We understand that his parents are alive and reside in Rock Island, Ill. Maxwell's illness was very brief, as almost all fatal sicknesses are at this altitude, but his suffering was quite acute. Pneumonia is pronounced as the disease. The funeral took place at 3 o'clock this afternoon, and the body of the unfortunate lies resting quietly in the cemetery.

DEATH OF SETH WELFOOT.

Many of our citizens were acquainted with Seth Welfoot, who has on several occasions visited Rico, having worked some assessments on Nigger Baby Hill but a few weeks ago. From this place he went direct to Santa Fe, in order to attend to some business pertaining to securing title to his property near Farmington in N. M., and on his return was overtaken by his fatal sickness. Mr. C. H. McHenry in corresponding for the Durango Southwest gives the particulars as follows:

Will you allow me space in your paper to give the facts in regard to the death on to-night's buck-board. of Seth Welfoot. About the 20th of February, he left Durango for Santa Fe, where he met a party of old friends, by agreement, for the purpose of witnessing to each others ranches. The party all started homeward about the 28th of February, Welfoot returning with them. from home about three weeks. On the road he took a severe cold, which terminated in fever. When they got to Chama he complained of his feet, and took off his boots and socks and forded the river. Still he was not thought to be in a dangerous condition by his comrades. When he got to Porter he stopped for a few days, growing worse, until Saturday morning, March 11th, when he was taken from Porter to Mrs. Vaughan's, near his ranch at Farmington, where he grew still worse until death claimed him. In the absence of a physician, he was kindly cared for by kind friends, and followed to his last resting place by the most of community. Some think it was pneumonia while others were fearful it was smallpox. He has no near relatives in the West, but prior to his return here stated, in case he should die, he wanted his cousin in the east to have what he left in this world. 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
