The law requires that proprietors of sa loons, bar rooms, billiard halls, etc., or any place where liquor is sold, shall not permit any minor or habitual drunkard to frequent such places or to drink any intoxicating or malt liquors, or engage or participate in any game of billiards, or any game, bet or wager with any cards penalty of \$50 fine for the first offense

and forfeiture of license for the second. The law further requires that if minors or habitual drunkards are found in any saloon, billiard hall, bowling ailey, etc., between the hours of 9 o'clock in the evening and 5 o'clock in the morning, without reasonable excuse, they subject themselves to a fine of \$25 for each offense.



Major B. F. Klee, census enumerator for Dolores county, returned from the western portion of the county last Saturday afternoon, and has concluded his labors. A summing up of the result shows that the population of Rico is 712, of Bowen, 7. The joint population of Cross Cañons, Dove Creek, Monument Creek, Piute Springs, Lower Dolores, Disappointment creek and Narraguin up Springs is 119. Beaver creek since the Indian trouble is reported as entirely deserted, as are also a number of other ranches at the above enumerated points and locali ties. The number of ranches and ranges in the county is placed at 27. A deplorfact that the mining public has failed almost unanimously to give a statement as the S. M. S. five cent cigar in quality or to product of individual properties-the value. C. H. C. being the only one which has made a statement. The only properties to be included in this report were such as had shipped ore to the value of \$500 or upwards. While a large number of such mines are located here, none of them seemed disposed to make the desired report. It will not be a very flattering showing for Dolores county to be credited in the state census report as possess ing but one mine that has produced \$500 worth of ore. Of course our home peo ple know better, but for outsiders the report will be accepted as accurate in the absence of any other testimony.

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
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
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A Sign of the Zodiac.

An exchange says nine-tenths of them come from Canton, where they are made by convicts hired by Flatshing & Chow Hing from the Government at 3 cents per day. All the work is done inside of the prisons, which consist of a reservation 400 feet square staked off and surrounded by high bamboo palings. The paper employed in the manufacture of fire crackers is made of bamboo film and is without doubt the strongest paper made. Each cracker is filled, rolled and pasted by hand, and the nimble fingers of the convicts finish them with astonishing rapidity. The powder is different from any other made and despite the fineness of it, is nevertheless equally as powerful as our best blasting powder. When ready for the market they are sent to Hong Kong, from whence they are distributed all over the world. In the year 1884 half a million boxes of crackers THE WHITE IS KING were sent to this country. Each box contained forty packages, and each package from 64 to 80 fire crackers. From this some idea of the number of crackers exploded on the Fourth of July may be gained.

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
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


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
