Through the courtesy of Dr. W. Q. Marsh, formerly of Rico, we have received a copy of the Socorro Bullion, containing an account of the investments of W. A. Koneman in that locality:

"Koneman & Hatch have bonded the Graphic, Review, Sampson, Iron, Silent Friend, Greyhound, Ouray, Cimarron, and Waldo claims, from the owners, Thornton Manderfield & Shelby of Santa Fé; the bond to run until the 1st of January, 1887, with the privilege of purchasing for the sum of \$115,000. They have also secured a bond on the La Joya & Gulf Railroad, now completed and in operation between Kansas City, Mo., and Memphis, Tenn. The completion of this when, or at any time previous, they may become owners de facto by paying \$16,500.

Work upon the Graphic mine will be commenced next Monday, with full day and night shifts in the old lower tunnel, which is estimated will intersect the main ore body when driven in 50 additional feet, and work will also be inaugurated in other portions of the claim. The new firm will cause immediate repairs in the smelter, will rebuild and refit the laboratory, and otherwise add to the efficiency of the plant which will blow in about the 1st of October, on Graphic ore and Cerillos concentrates.



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

Thursday afternoon of last week a riot occurred at Rock Springs, in Wyoming, between the white and Chinese miners there. At this place were about 400 whites and 250 Chinese employed then and a fresh importation of about 50 pig tails caused the already bad feeling to be greatly increased. A fight between a pair of whites on one side and a couple of Chinese on the other in a level of Mine No. 6 precipitated the riot and all the Chinese were driven from the mine. The whites organized and after arming made a raid on Chinatown. Several Chinamen were shot down and the others fled to the hills and buttes for safety, until every cabin was deserted. The fleeing Mongolians were pursued for some distance and the whites then came back and set fire to the quarters, destroying every Chinaman's cabin. At first only a few dead Chinamen were found, but the roofs of all the cabins were dirt and covered up the dead when the hovels succumbed to the flames. Over twenty bodies have since been found in the ruins. It is said that most of them were under the influence of opium or were too frightened to leave. Probably the opiate was administered in the form of leaden pills. It had been arranged that the first attack on the Chinese was to be made in Carbon, a mining town 150 miles east of Rock Springs, to be followed by similar movements in the latter place and in Evanston.
