NEW YORK, Nov 25 .- The Tribune's Washington correspondent says: "The counsel for the Government in the Guiteau case will ask the Judge to charge the jury, among other things, that the law as to the defense of ihsanity in criminal trials is as follows: When the prisoner, at the time of committing the offense, is in such a state of mind as to know the act is unlawful and morally wrong, he is responsible. The law does not recognize a form of insanity which has the capacity of distinguishing right from wrong without the power of choosing between them. That species which is induced by passion, unless settled down into a state of total derangement, is not an excuse for the commission of crime. To acquit on the ground of insanity it is not enough that there be doubt as to the prisoner's sanity-his insanity must be affirmatively established. To establish a defense of insanity it must be shown that the prisoner at the time of committing the crime was so far deprived of reason as to destroy his consciousness of the distinction between right and wrong."

From the Durango Herald.

The opening of the late Ute Indian reservation in Western Colorado, according to a correspondent in the Denver Tribune, is almost equivalent to the discovery of another world. There are about 12,000,000 acres of this domain and when thickly settled, if all walled in it would be self-supporting. This vast empire is to be formally declared open to settlement, by Presidential proclamation. But the Chief Executive has been anticipated, and at this time large areas within its limits have been and are yet being occupied by industrious agricultural settlers and ranchmen. They have taken with them their households, herds and flocks, and purpose making this the New Arcadia. Surely this country contains all the elements of a fair and happy

The County Commissioners will meet at Parrott City, on Monday, for the purpose of closing up the business of the county for the year. Arrangements will be made for moving the county seat from Parrott to Durango in accordance with the vote of the people. The vote was canvassed on the 19th of this month, and the law requires the seat of government to be moved in thirty days from that time. In order to avoid the bad roads that may reasonably be expected a month later, it is presumed that the Commissioners will decide to move the county-sent as soon as possible after they meet. We are informed that there is nothing in the law to prevent this and apparently such action would be wise. 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
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
