The Victory. From the Chicago Mining Review. The history of mining during the past few years of its existence has been a rec ord of obstacles overcome and to be overcome, a labor of wonderful vigor and force, which has accomplished vast results, the fruit of which is not yet apparent to the casual observer. The financial distress which has left the traces of its ruin on every industry, effected mining and paralyzed its activity. Then narrow legislation, which regards only the interests of a class, left the impress of its power plainly visible in the deserted mines and vacant stock exchanges. The discoveries of new mineral territory opened up wider fields of operation, which were rapidly filled and an impetus given which has been felt throughout the entire land. These new mining localities were in most cases distant from supplies and means of transportation, and almost insurmountable difficulties have been mastered in this direction. Lack of capital has been in many cases a mountain in the way of rapid development and sure success of rich and promising camps. One great difficulty has been the almost universal anxiety to push a mine to production and dividends, to satisfy a hungry horde of stockholders, before it was scarcely in condition for thorough development; the ultimate result, in a majority of cases, has been disaster and disappointment. Slowly and surely the principles of correct management are becoming better understood. New and improved facilities of every kind are rapidly answering to the demand and becoming more easily available. The people have learned the necessity of time in the slow process of development, and are more patient and reasonable. Capital responds more readily to inviting proposals, and confidence is gradually growing stronger and better established in the value and permanence of mining as a real and legitimate industry. These things, one after another, like lions in the way, have taken time, and hindered the advance movement, while they were being pacified and removed. Every step has been a step forward. Every failure has blossomed and borne an apple of knowledge. Every disappointment has been a lesson of wisdom, and every obstacle has only been a call for a greater exertion and effort. Mr. John Miles has left for Animas City, where he will take up his winter quarters. He has been superintending the working of the Trident mine, in the interest of the New York Trident Mining company. The location of this property being unfavorable to gain depth the showing is not so good as it would be were the formation more solid. At the end of last contract (81 feet) the breast was more solid, with a change of quartz. The footwall shows a fine streak of pyrites and magnetic iron, and it is thought that a little development will show up a solid formation and good vein.

On last Monday morning a fire was dis covered in the old Eaton shaft of the Vulture mine, at Leadville. The workings of this mine connect with those of the Chrysolite, Amie, Little Chief, Eva, Climax and Pittsburg, and the shafts were bulkheaded to prevent the entrance of air. These men were rendered insensible by gas generated by the burning mine. All Bros. work on Fryer Hill has been stopped and the firemen of the city were out, but were not able to do much, on account of the inaccessibility of the fire. At the time of the latest reports, the timbers in the Vulture had fallen and the mine caved and it was thought that the flames were being smothered.

D. J. Shaw, the well-known San Juan freighter is now running a pack train of 60 jacks between Rico and Cascade Hill and will run a large number of animals throughout the summer. Mr, Shaw has brought a great many loads of provisions. into Rico already and will hereafter give his personal attention to buying and selling of live stock of all kinds, Mr. Shaw also has a train of teams and wagons running from Alamosa to Animas City, and from the latter point to Cascade Hill, from which point he will transfer to pack

Onward March!

In a recent issue of the News we copied an article from the Animas City Southwest in regard to a contemplated invasion of the Navajoe reservation by an armed force of men. We see from the latest number of the same paper that the expedition is under way. The head of the article reads as follows: "Star of Empire! Eighty-Five Prospectors, Armed to the Teeth, Marching toward the Silver Zone to the South of the Navajoe Reservation. Through the Land of the wild Naraguinup, by the Home of the Peaceful Moqui, the Van of Discovery Moves Southward." Under this startling head, the writer proceeds: "In a late issue of this paper we called attention to the fact that a number goods and nothing shoddy. of prospectors and miners were organizing an armed expedition at Parrott City to march into the silver regions southwest of the Navajoe reservation and across the Arizona line. According to the information first received, it was supposed that the expedition would be unable to start before the first of November, but all arrangements having been perfected, it took up its line of march this week. The expedition is composed of twenty men from Parrott City and Mancos valley, twentyfive from Rico, and forty more from other points, who have congregated on the Lower San Juan to wait the arrival of the others, when the three parties will be combined and one organization perfected.

The expedition in its line of travel will follow the course of the Rio San Juan to the Utah boundary, at which point it will turn to the south, flanking the Navajoe reservation on the west and crossing into northwestern Arizona, where these silver mines are located. The distance from Animas City is said to be one hundred and twenty-five miles. . The expedition may encounter opposition from the Piute renegades through whose country it travels for some distance, but such opposition, if it should come, will amount to but little, unless the Navajoes become hostile.

The mines are not situated on any Indian reservation. The party that started from Parrott City and the Mancos valley, were in town Wednesday, purchasing supplies."

The Plumas National describes a valuable prospecting implement as follows: The shaft-boring machine now at work on Spanish Peak, is fast demonstrating that it is just what is needed in a mining country. The shaft recently started is down over 200 feet and the machine sinks it at the rate of twenty-five or thirty feet per day. The hole is about eight inches in diameter, and by the action of the drill is thoroughly plastered up on the sides, so that there is no danger of a cave. In quick-sand a tube is inserted, which takes the place of timbers in an ordinary shaft. The dirt which is raised can be prospected and its character determined nearly as well as in an ordinary shaft and of course the depth to bed-rock is both very easily and cheaply found. Water is no trouble The Animas Livery, Feed and -in fact, the water is an advantage, as it has to be poured into the drill-hole in places where the ground is dry. Some part of the machinery broke a few days ago, but is probably repaired by this time, and it will take but a few days more to tell the depth to bed-rock.

One Leadville Man.

While it seems that, the general opinion of most Leadville people is that there is no other place than Leadville, we have one gentleman in the person of Mr. S. Enfield, who left a good paying business in Leadville during the past summer, to visit and look into the status of Rico. Soon after his arrival here he purchased several valuable mining interests, and Rico town properties, not dallying or hesitating on the comparatively high prices of properties. Mr. Enfield has built on Glasgow Avenue, three very creditable buildings. The Great Western Amphitheatre, when completed, will be of twostory, 25x100 feet, and one of the finest wooden structures in Colorado or the West. We want more men of this kind.


