An Important Suit Decided.

Judge Hallett made an important mining decision in the United States Circuit yesterday, and the same is given in full in to-day's Republican. The suit was brought to recover an interest in the great Robinson Consolidated mine, and involves the law on grub-staking. The doctrine is laid down that a grub-stake partnership must be fulfilled in every particular, and the association between the staker and the prospector must exist at the time of the alleged discovery and location, in order to give the parties associated an interest in the property. Otherwise "no interest can be acquired by those who are not personally present." This decision was freely commented upon by the lawyers of the city yesterday, and its soundness approved. It is regarded as common sense, just in its bearings, and sound law. It will be read with great Prescriptions carefully Fre- interest, not alone in Colorado, but in Arizona, New Mexico, Utah, and in every mining camp in the west. Grub staking has not been popular for some years, because of the uncertainty of the prospectors, and this decision will give the system its death-blow, and throw a large number of frauds out of easy and profitable berths. This decision requires not alone an absolute compliance with all the provisions of the agreement, but almost a continuous personal presence in the field. This is the saddest blow of all, for just what the average grub-stake prospector does not want is the presence of his principal.—Denver Republican.

#### HOW TO VOTE AND WHAT SHALL QUALIFY A VOTER.

"The last Legislature of Colorado passed several acts which seem to be generally ignored in the discussion of the capital question. It may not be amiss to resurrect these acts at this time, just as

they are to become applicable.

On page 41 of the pamphlet laws of the State for 1881 is found a bill to provide for submitting the question of the permanent location of the seat of govern ment to the qualified electors of the State. This act, after providing for the matter of notification to the people contains the following important provision:

This house is under careful experienced management, and run to suit the general patronage of a mining camp.

Sec. 3. All persons voting on said question shall vote by separate ballot, where on shall be placed the words, "For" (inserting how the continuous properties of the con serting here the name of the place) "as the seat of government." No person shall vote on this question who is not at the time a qualified elector of this State, and a majority of all the votes upon said question cast at said election shall be cessary to determine the location of

That is, national, State, county, udicial, municipal, and even ward (dis they bear the same number, but are cast nto separate boxes. The law requires that every person voting "shall be a qualified elector." The same Legislature, by the act approved February 18, 1881, changed the status of he "qualified electors." The law will be found on page 113, and reads as follows: First—He shall be a citizen of the United States, or, not being a citizen of the United States, he shall have declared is intention, according to law, to be-

Second-He shall have resided in this State six months immediately preceding the election at which he offers to vote; in the county, ninety days, and in the ward or precinct ten days; provided, that no person shall be denied the right to vote t any school district election, nor to hold sex. That all acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act be, and the same are

hereby repealed.

The first portion of the second section contains the change. It requires a residence of 'innety days in the county and ten days in the district.

These provisions of the law will interest the entire State, and too close a study and interpretation of the law cannot be urged. No point in the State wants the capital so badly that it would capture it on a legal technicality. This is Denver's

DENVER will keep the capital by about one-third majority over all other towns. Salida will poll upwards of one hundred votes, Canon will poll about all of Fremont county, Colorado Springs will poll all El Paso county pretty solid, Pueblo will poll Pueblo county, including the several car loads of men shipped in there for voting purposes-altogether perhaps 3,000 votes.

Our Pueblo correspondent says the ambitious city on the Arkansas is rapidly filling up with miners, who are coming to spend the winter. The uncharitable might say that Pueblo was colonizing voters, but this is not, of course, the case The people of Pueblo are much more honest than their principal paper, and the "Committee of Safety" would not allow a colonization of voters .- Denver Republican.

When the census of Denver was taken in June, 1880, it showed in round numbers 36,000 people. The population has greatly increased since that time, and it is now estimated at 47,500 by the best of authority. The Denver Times takes as a basis, the increase of school population, which has increased from 6,998 in 1880, to 9,198 in 1881. This gave a school population last year of 7,000 in a total of 36,000 (nearly), being an average of 1 to 5 1-7. Estimating on the same for the present year, the population is 47,304.



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
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
