

of the Town of Rico: SECTION 1.—That if any saloon, barroom, billiard hall, bowling alley keeper, or the pro-pictor or manager of any theatre, show, gam-bling house, house of ill-fame or place where place where liquors are sold, within the limits of said Town of Rico, shall permit any minor to frequent or be in or about, or to drink any intoxicating or malt liquors, or to engage or participate in any game of billiards, or in any game, bet or wager, with any cards or other ever, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction shall be subject to a fine of not less than five nor more than fifty dollars for the first offense; and for the second offense house keeper, or the proprietor of any place house keeper, or he proprietor of any place house hey shall be less than five and such hey such the apprise or elersks of any such proprietors or he apprise their place of business to any minor any of not less than five and be punished by a light of not less than five and be be found in of not less than five and be be found.
