The ore from this group has been shipped in large quantities recently, the average value received per ton being \$265. It is estimated that there is in this group a million dollars' worth of ore in sight.

The Santa Clara company are making arrangements to erect a mill this winter. This company owns a valuable mill-site, probably the most eligibly located in the camp, and the erection of a mill will enable smaller mine-owners to utilize the product of their properties to far greater pecuniary benefit than the present costly method of shipping to Pueblo and Argo. Work is progressing briskly throughout the camp. The weather is pleasant and mild, with but little snow.


Talmage on Newspapers.

Talmage speaking about newspapers in his Sunday's sermon said: "Don't bewhen a man can do nothing else he can edit a newspaper. To publish a newspaper requires the skill, the precision, the vigilance, the strategy, the boldness of a commander-in-chief; to edit a newspaper one needs to be a statesman, an assayist, a geographer, a statistician, and so far as all acquisition is concerned an encyclopedia. To man and to publish a newspaper requires more qualities than any other business on earth."

"CHARLES JONES, one of the two miners who discovered the famous group of Robinson mines, in Colorado, died while drunk in a Leadville saloon. He then owned a quarter interest in seven mines out of the twelve constituting the Robinson consolidation, from which the late Lieutenant Governor Robinson made his fortune of over a million. The heirs of Jones live in Vermont, and, being uninformed of the great value of his estate. were induced to accept \$1,200 for an estate really worth \$250,000. 




