### ON THE ROAD.

#### What the Traveling Public Has Reason to Expect.

The following communication came to hand this week, showing the rapidity with which mail is at present transported in San Juan. Mail contractors have reduced the science to such a fine thing that if a letter is mailed in speaking distance on the first of the month you can bank with comparative safety on receiving it before the month is entirely gone. The letter gives such a graphic description of the route that it cannot fail to interest our

readers. Here it is: ALAMOSA, February 3, 1881. DEAR NEWS:-Sic transit gloria mundi and so also has the sublimity and grandeur of the mountains departed and here I am in the dirty, dusty, but withal busy metropolis of the San Luis valley. One can scarcely realize that such a change has been made in less than one hundred miles. Last night at 8 o'clock we left the Pinos-Chama summit, 9996 feet above the sea level with the snow twenty feet deep on a level, and cold enough to freeze our friend Pluto in a wink, if he should have the temerity to put in an appearance at that point. M., it was completely shrouded in a dense fog that hid everything, even our leaders in a four-horse team; and cold? well, some. I mentioned the fact to the driver, thinking he had perhaps forgotten or overlooked the matter, but my words froze before reaching his ears, which were probably frozen also, so that I failed to be benefitted by any comments he might otherwise have made. He afterwards used some very warm words in regard to the same subject, but I noticed no particular improvement in the temperature. We crossed the Continental Divide-ten miles from Chama-just at sun-set and saw some beautiful effects of the sun on the snowy peaks that everywhere surrounded us, but our Jehu, being of a phlegmatic turn of mind, didn't propose to stop to enjoy the thing, but with the hilosophic remark that there would be plenty more like it, whipped up and away we went, spinning down the mountain at a break-neck pace, making the crisp snow ring like a bell. We reached Chama at 7:30 that evening with an appetite like a wolf, and visions of fried oysters in our mind; but, alas, bacon and black coffee were "too good" for us. Chama has quite a number of restaurants and saloons and two dance halls in full blast. Every thing at present is carried on in tents, the depot building being the only substantial structure in the town. JERSEY CITY, Feb. 10.-The great stock stable on Elizabeth farm, belonging to G. Dawson Coleman, of Lebanon, and situated in the northeastern section of Lancaster county, was destroyed by an incendiary fire. The famous registered herd of Jersey cattle, many of them imported, fifty-two in number, were chained in their stalls, and when the fire was first seen it had attained such headway that not one of them could be saved. The thoroughbred dogs, goats and game chickens were also burned. Many of the cattle were highly valued, some of the bulls costing \$3,000: loss \$30,000.

#### COUNTY OF DOLORES.

After so long a time the anxiety, fears and doubts regarding the establishment of the new county of Dolores are things of the past, and the citizens of Rico are rejoicing over the glorious event. The first intimation of the passage of the bill in the senate was the receipt of the following telegram:-

DENVER, February 10. To Julius Thompson and others:
Dolores county passed the senate to-day with a whoop. Last county bill in and first one

CUSHING.

The telegram was opened in the postoffice and read to a large crowd, among which manifestations of satisfaction were numerous and boisterous. The change from the thousand and one disadvantages of the old arrangement will be the most welcome news that it has been our good fortune to chronicle for a long time. Everybody seems happy and good-natured over the result, especially so, in view of making no effort to advertise. the fact that it was quite a surprise to most of the public, so many discouraging reports having been received from Denver in the last two weeks. The hope was regarded a forlorn one and consequently the favorable ending is all the more welcome, because unexpected. The great expense and trouble of going so far over such a highway made our people eager to take upon themselves the burden and ex pense of a new county rather than longer endure the hardships of the present arrangement. . They went at it with eyes wide open and a full and clear understanding of the obstacles which must be overcome in case their scheme should be successful. The house committee on counties and county lines reported favorably on Bill 111, but amended it, and recommended that the bill as amended be passed. It is not known what the amend ment is, but it is supposed to be that all all officials of the parts added will hold office until the next general election, or until successors are elected and qualified, at which time a county seat will be chosen, until then Rico shall be the county seat. Dolores is made part of th XXth senatorial district and attached to the fourth judicial district and attached to Ouray and San Juan for representative purposes. Alamosa, Col., Feb. 7.-Marshal Wcidner, Gen. Cameron and the posse of men who left here Saturday night, and were joined by reinforcements on Sunday, returned to the city this evening, bringing with them two of the robbers, one dead and the other seriously wounded. The rebbers were strongly fortified in a cabin on Cat creek, in the mountains near the Alamosa, and made a strong and determined resistance until one of them was killed and the other slightly disabled. A rush was then made by the assaulting party and the surviving robber was overcome. None of the party making the arrest were injured. Great excitement prevailed throughout the day, and the anxiety for the arresting party was much relieved by their safe arrival this evening.

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
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
