

O'BRIEN MOORE TO THE FRONT. He Turns Up In Old Mexico, Trying to Create Trouble.

For some time past the memory of the party whose name appears in the above caption has been buried in a blissful oblivion, but now the possessor of an unprecedented gall heaves into sight in distant Mexico. The last news of him was at the time he committed suicide(?) near Wilcox, Arizona, and by some means he secured the publication of an extended account of his death in the Tombstone Nugget. An associated press dispatch was sent from Las Vegas, N. M., on the 28th of last March as follows:

"O'Brien Moore, alias Jerry Luddy, who has been representing himself as the agent of the Denver Tribune, Dolores News and other papers and was exposed, com-mitted suicide last week at Wilcox, Arizona, by shooting himself through the heart. He has lately led a haunted life, caused by the seduction of a girl in Con-necticut some years since. His age was about 25 years of age.'

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
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
