A man named Robert Pate, an ex-lieutenant of hussars, struck the queen on the face with a stick as she was leaving the duke of Cambridge's residence in her carriage on May 27, 1850. The next and last assault upon her majesty, previous to that of March the 2nd occurred nearly twenty-two years later than that of Pate. On Feb. 29, 1872, Arthur O'Connor, aged seventeen, presented a pistol at the queen as she was entering Buckingham Palace after a drive. The pistol proved to be unloaded, and was an antique and useless weapon. O'Connor carried in his left hand a petition for the pardon of the Fenian prisoners. Hamilton and Pate were each sentenced to seven years transportation, and O'Connor was punished with twelve months imprisonment and a flogging.

It will be observed that no political significance whatever has attached to any of these attempts upon the life of Queen Victoria. In every case the deed was either committed by an actual madman, or by some half crazy adventurer in quest of notoriety.

The New Ute Bill.

The following bill was reported by the Committee on Senator Hill's bill as pre-

sented last January: Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled; That all that portion of the Ute Indian Reservation in the state of Colorado lately occupied by the Uncompangre and White River Utes be, and the same is hereby declared to be public land of the United States, and subject to disposal from and after the passage of this act, in accordance with the provisions and under the restrictions and limitations of section three of the act of Congress approved June fifteenth, eighteen hundred and eighty, chapter two hundred and twentythree, except as hereinafter provided, under regulations to be prescribed by the Secretary of the Interior in accordance

with the provisions of this act. SEC. 2. That the Secretary of the Interior shall, at the earliest practicable day. ascertain and establish the line between the land mentioned in section one of this act and that now or lately occupied by the Southern Utes in said state; and for that purpose there is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury of the United States not otherwise appropriated, the sum of five hundred dollars.

SEC. 3. That all entries, settlements, or locations heretofore made, under any law of the United States, by duly qualified persons, upon a strip of land extending northerly and southerly, not exceeding ten miles in width, within that part of the Ute Indian Reservation in the state of Colorado lately occupied by the Uncompangre and White River Ute Indians, and bounded on the east by the one hundred and seventh meridian of longitude west from Greenwich, shall legally date from the time they were respectively made; and the rights of said persons shall be in all respects the same as if the lands had been legally subject to their claims when the same were initiated: Provided. however. That if homestead entries have been made on said strip, the lands so entered shall be paid for in eash, after proof which would be satisfactory under the pre-emption laws: And provided further, That none of said lands shall be disposed of for any consideration other than cash, nor for a less price than one dollar and twenty five cents per acre.



The Southern Utes.

Senator Hill has recently introduced in the Senate and proposes to force to a final passage, a bill to provide lands in severalty to the Southern Ute Indians in the Uintah reservation, in lieu of that now occupied by them on the La Plata river in the southwestern part of the state. This action is rendered necessary in view of the fast growing country on each side of the reservation, and the nec essity which exists for the transfer of the Indians, that the section now occupied by them may be opened up to settlement by the busy, pushing white population which is flocking to us, and spreading all over the southwest. The Southern Utes should have gone to Uintah when the rest of the tribe was transferred; but the obstinacy of the late Secretary of the Interior prevented it. Under the terms of the treaty made with them it was provided that each individual Indian should have allotted to him a prescribed amount of land in severalty "lying along the La Plata river." It was represented to Plata river." It was represented to Schurz by Ignacio their chief; by Page the agent, and by others well informed on the subject-and who were present in Washington at the time when the memorandum of the treaty was madethat there was not sufficient land within the limits specified to allow the proposed division. Schurz insisted that there was, and held to the arrangement. The White river and Uncompaligre Utes were removed out of the state, but the Southern Utes allowed to remain. Favorites of the Secretary were appointed to the work of surveying the land, and have been busy at the labor for nine months, thus incurring a large expense from which no return can ever come. Now it is proposed by Senator Hill's bill to do just what ought to have been done in the first place, and which Governor Pitkin urged should be done at the time. The people of southwestern Colorado want the Indians away. The Denver and Rio Grande railroad runs through fifty miles of the reservation and is in no degree safe from depredation should the redskins at any time, become turbulent, therefore, although a large amount of good money has been spent, the World hopes for the speedy passage of Mr. Hill's bill, and the final hegira of the last of the Utes from the borders of our state. - Denver World.

Mining and Industrial Exposition.

The National Mining and Industrial Exposition may be set down as one of the established institutions of our state and will be opened for the first annual exposition about the first of next August. It is important that all our mining men be apprised of some of the features which it is proposed to combine and deal with as specialties.

The mineral and mining department will be under the management and direction of an eminent mining expert and geologist This department will be perpetuated as a museum, and will be accessible to the public throughout the year and every year, so that all the varieties of minerals and the various methods of treating or reducing them may be intelligently examined at any time by the capitalist or the miner.

It is designed in this connection to exhibit a record of every mine, giving its history in all the essential and necessary details to afford an investigator the exact or most approximate truth. Mines and mining districts will be encouraged by every guarantee which can be reasonably given to improve their exhibits from time to time, as their development shall warrant.

The location of the Exposition buildings is peculiarly favored in all important particulars and the main building, which is designed after the National Museum at Washington, and will be situated in the center of a plat of forty acres, which will afford abundant room for concessions to such districts as may want to erect their own buildings. The directory has not yet acted upon the terms for space to be allowed to mining exhibits, but it is probable that it will be free or so

liberal that nobody can reasonably object. Other states and territories are moving in this matter and we hope to see Colorado represented by such as exhibit from all her camps as will fully justify the claim we make, that she is naturally the richest and greatest mining state in the union.

It is expected most confidently to bring to Colorado this year, 200,000 visitors and it is impossible to do too much towards instructing these strangers about our resources.

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
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
