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

A New Coinage Bill.

Mr. Dorsheimer, of New York, intro duced a new coinage bill which was referred. It is intended to prevent overcoinage and to promote the circulation. of gold and silver equally.

The bill provides that as soon as practicable the secretary of the treasury shall cause to be engraved notes of the denomination of \$2, \$5; \$40, \$20 and \$50, and printed in such quantities as may be nec essary to carry out the provisions of this

Said notes, when issued, shall be payable on demand in silver dollars of the present standard fineness, of 480 grains troy weight, or, if the holder prefer, he may receive standard silver bars, stamped by the United States at the rate of 480 grains to the dollar.

Section two provides for a deposit with the government of standard dollars or bullion, for which notes proportionate to such deposit shall be given, redeemable in silver bars or dollars, the standard value in both cases to be 480 grains to the dollar.

Section & provides that the coinage of the gold, silver, and silver bullion prod uct of the United States, shall be free. but no silver coin shall be made at any of the United States mints from foreign silduty imported on manufactured silver. Section 4 provides for the exchange of silver dollars and certificates issued under the former act, for notes authorized by

Section 5 authorizes the secretary of the treasury to cause to have coined at any time out of silver in the treasury to standard dollars of 480 grains, as many as he may think likely will be needed, and to retain in standard silver bars so much silver as he may deem necessary to meet the demand for silver in that form. Section 9 makes the notes hereby au therized a legal tender at their nominal value for all debts, public and private, except when otherwise expressly stipu-

----AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING MINORS.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees

of the Town of Rico:

Section 1.—That if any saloon, bar-room, billiard hall, bowling alley keeper, or the proprietor or manager of any theatre, show, gambling house, house of fil-fame or place where obscene plays are performed, or any other place where liquors are sold, within the limits of said Town of Rico, shall permit any minor to frequent or be in or about, or to drink any intoxicating or malt liquors, or to engage or participate in any game of billiards, or in any game, bet or wager, with any cards or other gambling device, or any other game whatsoever, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction shall be subject to a fine of not less than five nor more than fifty dollars for the first offense; and for the second offense shall forfeit his license, and such license shall not be renewed for sixty days.

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

THE UTAH GOLD FIELDS.

The gold discovery in Utah is drawing quite a crowd, generally composed principally of the old prospectors who go to all the excitements. Jim Hall, of Rico. now in the Unaweep country, is going on horseback and writes that he will have to ride about 100 miles. A correspondent of the Durango Herald says the fact that the western branch of the D. & R. G. has sent a competent engineer to the alleged gold fields in San Juan County, Utah, for the purpose of making a preliminary survey is suggestive that there is foundation for the report of their riches. 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

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
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
