Farmer Finds Childs Body Near Earth

The decomposed body of what appeared to be a child was found two miles North and three miles West of Earth Wednesday afternoon. A farmer found the remains at about 5:15 p.m. near an abandoned wooden structure in remote pastureland along county road #64, authorities said.

At a Press Conference held at 7:30 p.m. Thursday evening at the Earth City Hall, it was confirmed that the unidentified body found Wednesday has been definitely identified as the missing child, Shawnlee Perry.

Shawnlee had been missing since the night of May 7, when she was last seen playing near an abandoned church in the 400 block of First Street next door to her home.

The day after the disappearance, Becky Perry, mother of the child, said that her daughter was playing around an abandoned church next to her home, and had hollered to her friends moments before she had been reported missing.

On May 8, a Lamb County Sheriff's department tracker dog had picked up Shawnlee's scent around her home and the church, but nowhere else in the neighborhood.

The boarded up church and abandoned homes were searched in a fruitless effort to find the child.

In the months since her disappearance, rumors and reports of sightings of Shawnlee surfaced from time to time, but only brought false hopes and fears.

The girl's disappearance was featured on May 15, 1992 during the television show, "America's Most Wanted".

Treating the girl's disappearance as an abduction, the FBI, Texas Rangers, and the Dept. of Public Safety trained their attention to finding Shawnlee, but their clues and tips were scarce.

As early as May 9, officials believed that Shawnlee no longer was in the city of Earth. Witnesses had told police that an early model blue car had stopped in front of the church moments before the child disappeared.

The search continues with Rangers, Earth Police Dept., and the Lamb County Sheriff's Dept. They would like to take this opportunity to thank each and every individual involved either directly or indirectly with the searches, investigations, and the distributions of posters, and also to the media for their ongoing concern, patience, and cooperation.

Tracy Bridges, Lamb County Sheriff Deputy, reported that at 5:00, he had gone to the store, and

a farmer came in looking for him, to tell him his story. He had been shredding weeds, and thought he had found what appeared to be a body.

When asked what Tracy's first response at the scene was he replied, "Help! Give me some help, I've got to have some help!"

Police say the case is being handled as a homicide, and leads on the case are now being held, pending on the pathologist report. Tracy says they do have leads on a suspect, but had no comment at this time. He told the press that the dog team had not searched that particular area, because it had started raining, and that held off the search.

There was definite ID confirmed by the silver caps that had been on her front teeth, as they were found lying on the ground under her face. All evidence showed that the body had been there for at least three months. When asked if there were any indications of sexual molestation, Tracy replied, "Not confirmed at this time". He stated that statistics from Washington showed that in cases similar to the Perry case, when a child is abducted, that the crime will happen within 7-10 miles from the

Senior Steer Roping Held At Mulshoe Roping Arena

For the first time ever the Cotton Lee Memorial Senior Steer Roping Association hosted steer roping at the Muleshoe Roping Arena, last weekend.

Requirements for roping in the Cotton Lee Memorial Steer Roping are a little bit different. In the Seniors division you must be 50 years of age or older and in the Super Senior division you must be 60 years of age.

Each of the ropers pay a fee of \$225 for the privilege of roping in the events.

Approximately 30 steer ropers from several states including four former World Champions, competed. Former World Champions competing included: Charles Good of Elida, N.M. and Buddy Cockrel each held the world's title one time. Tuffy Thompson of Happy held the world's title twice, and Don McLaughlin of Fort Collins, Colo. held the championship three times.

Dean Vansandt told the Journal that they hoped to make steer roping an annual event in Muleshoe.

"The seniors were real happy with the arena and how the competition was handled," Vansandt said. "They hope to come back next year."

Winners in the Senior Division last weekend were: In the First-Go Kenneth Mauldin of Sonora, TX came in first with a time of 14.59; Eldon Dudley of Perryton, TX was in second place with a time of 14.83; and Tuffey Thompson of Happy came in third with a time of 15.01.

Second and Go winners were: H.L. Todd of Mustang, Okla. with a time of 14.10, first; Mel Potter of Marana, Arizona, second, with a time of 14.27; and Eldon Dudley of Perryton with a time of 14.40.

Myrl Goodwin of Grand Junction, Colo. took first place in the Third and Go with a time of 12.38. Second place winner was Tuffey Thompson of Happy, TX, with a time of 12.68, and Charles Good of Elida, N.M. took third place with a time of 13.47.

When their times were all averaged together, each roper roped three steers, Eldon Dudley took first place with a time limit of

44.46. H.L. Todd of Mustang, OK took second place with a time of 47.76. Third place winner was Kenneth Mauldin of Sonora, TX with a time of 54.12.

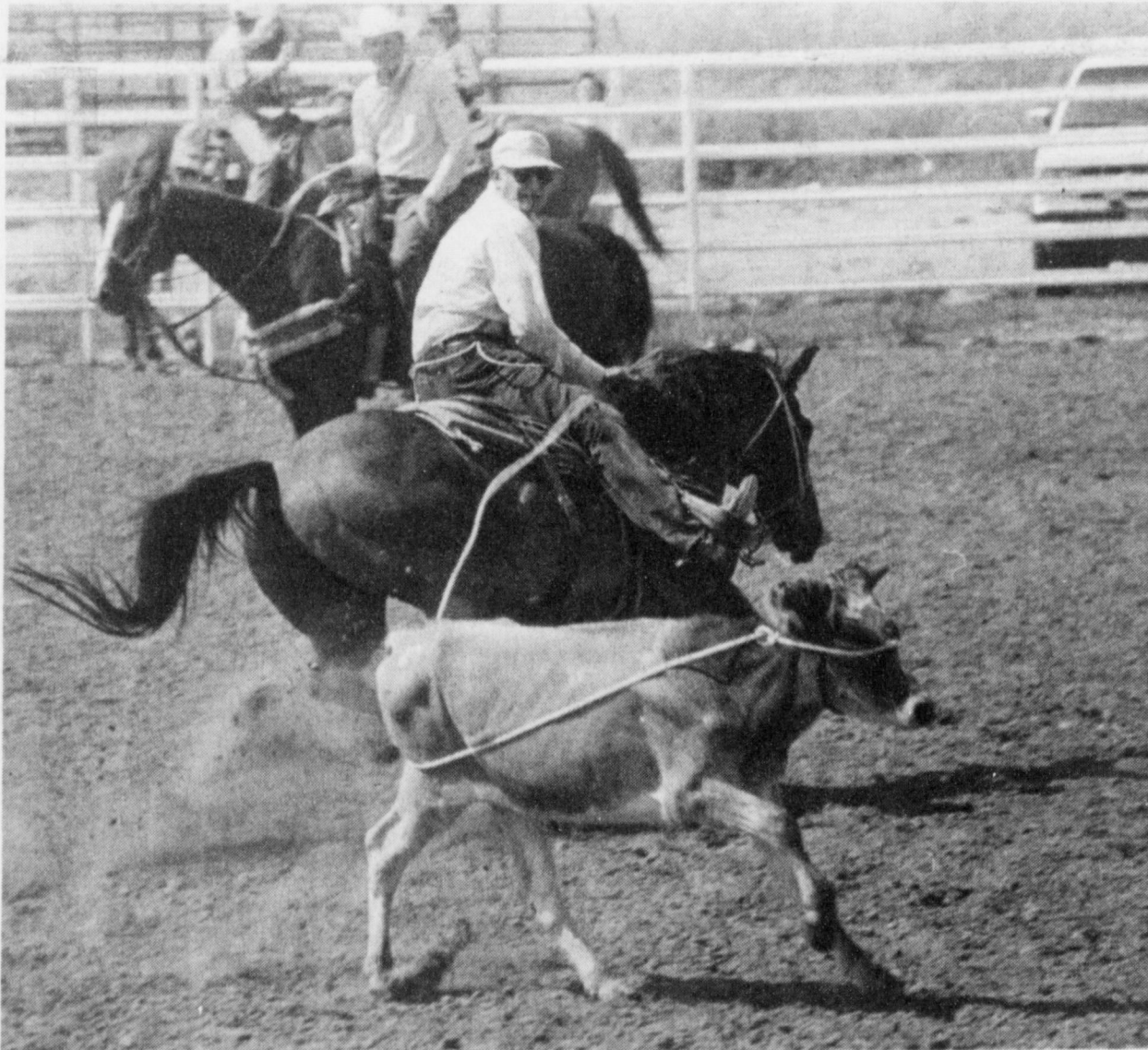
In the Super Senior Division, First Go, Don Hudson of North Platte, Neb. took first place with a time of 16.63. Second place went to Don McLaughlin of Fort Collins, with a time limit of 23.15; and Ned Ward of Aspermont, TX took third place with a time of 24.57.

Second Go winners were Doc Hardy of Denton, TX with a time of 21.27, first; Jim Taylor of Jermyn, TX, second with 22.40; and Don McLaughlin of Fort Collins, Colo., third with a time of 27.99.

Third Go winners were: Glenn McMennamy of Amarillo, with a time limit of 19.92, first; Don McLaughlin of Fort Collins, Colo. second with a time of 26.47; and John Rae Powell of Eldorado, third with a time of 29.97.

When all the times were averaged, Don McLaughlin had a time of 77:61 for a first place win. Don Hudson had a time of 107.48

Bailey County Receives Award

Bailey County recently received a performance award from the State of Texas. This award was received as a result of House Bill 93 which became law during the last legislative session. The purpose of the bill is to divert criminal offender from the state penitentiary, and to pay counties for expenses involved in such diversions. House Bill 93 set up nine performance factors that each county was to be graded on. The specific performance items that counties were judged on for this award were:

1. Personal bond utilization rate.
2. Pretrial diversion rate.
3. Deferred adjudication rate.
4. Probation rate.
5. Probation revocation rate.
6. Utilization rate of residential and non-residential diversion programs.
7. Prison commitment rate.
8. Admissions to prison per index crime rate.
9. Use of prison admissions.

Counties were also required to draw up a specific plan to divert offenders. Based upon its score on the nine performance factors, Bailey County was given a performance award that amounted to \$64,128. This was figured on a base amount of \$50,000, plus \$2. per county resident.

As a result of receiving this award and the need to implement its plan, the Bailey County Sheriff's office was able to hire an additional deputy and to purchase, and completely outfit, an additional patrol car with award money. Joe Orozco, a Muleshoe native, was

where inmates are released from the jail under the supervision of Deputy Orozco. The inmates will work on government or publicly owned property.

The second part of the program is for inmates that are trustys and have a job. They are released from jail to go to work, and then must return to jail when they get off work. These inmates pay the Sheriff's Office \$7.50 for each day that they work. This is to reimburse the county for their room and board.

A unique feature of this award is that twenty-five percent of the award must be spent on substance abuse programs. The main area of concern in Bailey County is stressed that only non-violent

offenders are released for work!

There are two parts to this program. The first part is known as community service. This is

alcoholism. Inmates receive counseling through MHMR and other agencies. Because of the grant, Bailey County Sheriff's Office has also been able to purchase computer equipment and is in the process of becoming computerized.

Chief Deputy Don Carter is the manager of this performance award program for the Sheriff's Office. Since Don has an extensive background in computers, he is also setting up the computer system for the department. No outside help has been required to accomplish this task.

Help For Men With Low Sperm Count

Childless couples may benefit from micro-sperm penetration assay (micro-SPA), a modified version of the standard test for measuring sperm quality in men with low sperm counts.

In the micro-SPA, hamster eggs are paired with a patient's sperm in a specially designed test tube. Results are based on the number of sperm that penetrate each egg. Unlike other routine fertility tests, the micro-SPA provides useful

clues on sperm function.

"For example, a semen analysis will only tell you the number and movement of sperm but not if the sperm are capable of fertilization," said Dr. Larry Lipshultz, a urologist at Houston's Baylor College of Medicine where the test was developed.

Surgery or medication is usually the next step in improving sperm quality and its ability to travel from the testes to the egg.

Special guest for the evening was Grandmother Margaret Durben.

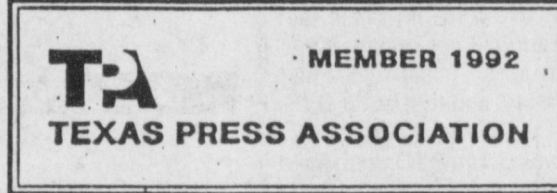

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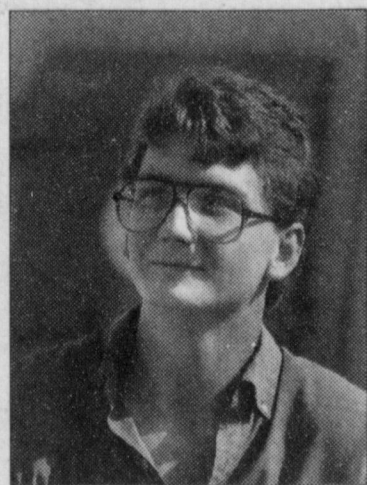
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Noble, Gunstream Repeat Wedding Vows

A wedding rehearsal party was held at 8:00 on August 14, at the Muleshoe Country Club, following the wedding rehearsal.

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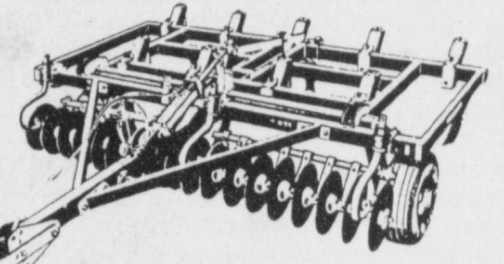
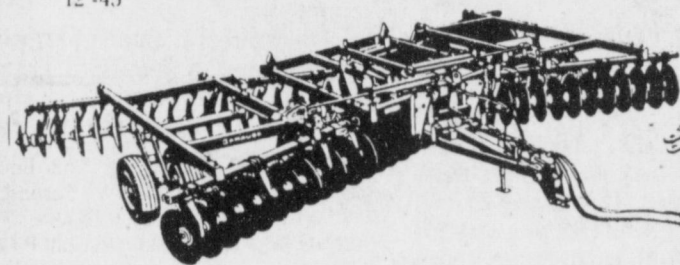
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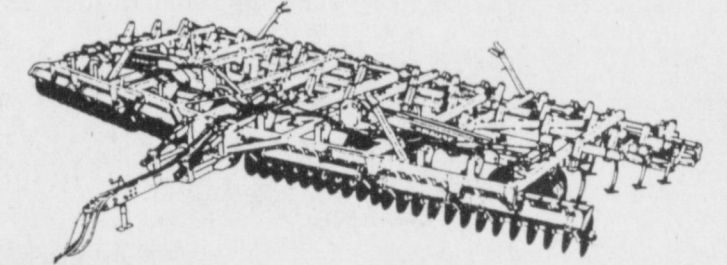
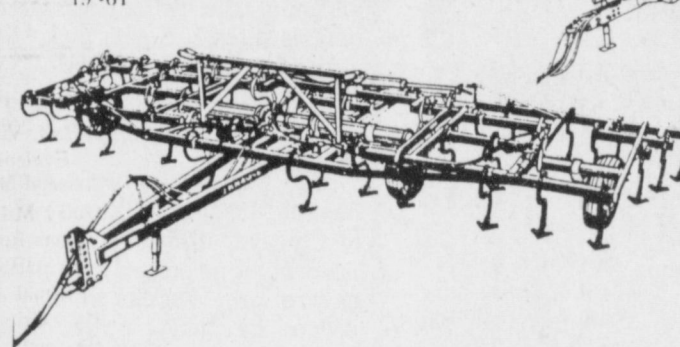


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Jerry Lewis Telethon

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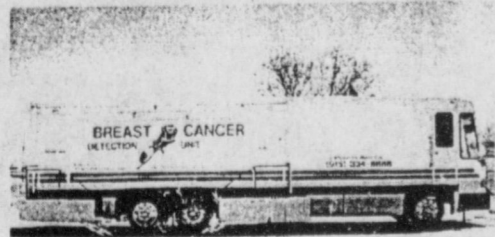

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$4,413.00 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$4,590.00 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.74 for county education districts, State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of \$.4185 that will provide \$4,731.00 per student in state and local revenues.

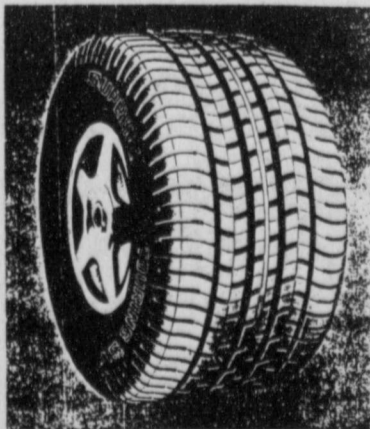

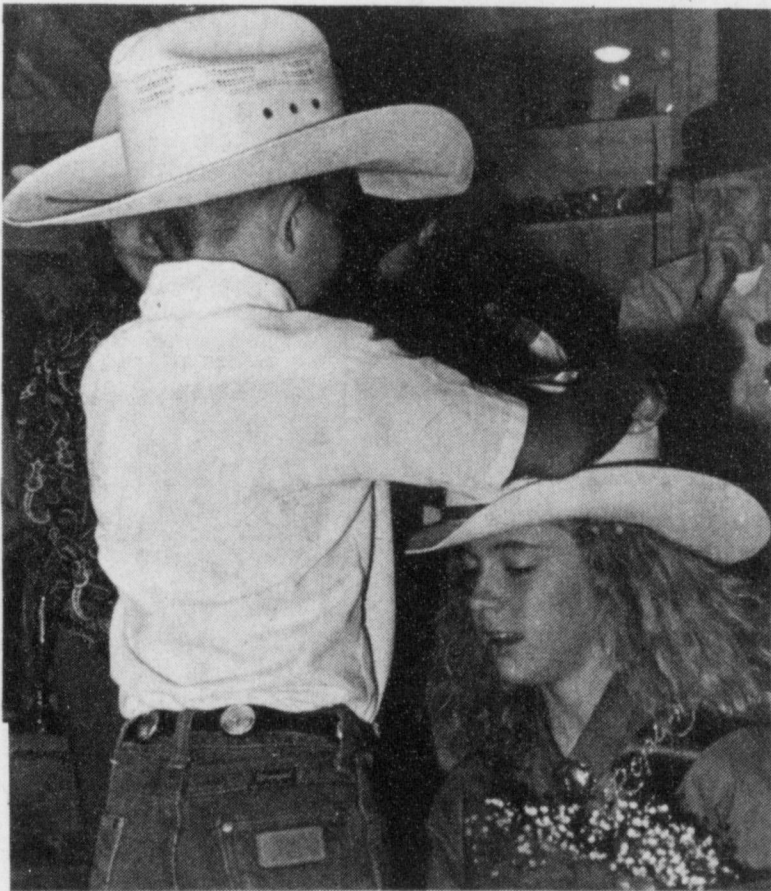
