MINING MATTERS.

THE C. H. C. The C. H. C. is sending down 15 to 18 tons of ore daily and angleite-sulphate of lead is being extensively mined.

THE PRINCETON. About 12 tons of ore are daily being sent down from the Princeton—one-half of which is iron ore, used chiefly by the Pasadena as a flux.

THE HONDURAS. D. F. Taylor and Clint Dutcher have resumed work on the Honduras, and believe that they will be enabled to commence shipping ore with a very little development.

LEASES EXTENDED. The last leases on the mines of the Newman group only extended over a period of three months and were about to expire.

CASCADE BASIN. Cascade Basin is a district which has produced specimens of rich ore and owners of properties up there have reason to expect good returns.

SAN BERNARDO. The owners of the San Bernardo at Trout Lake have executed a lease on the third level to Milt Evans and Billy O'Brien. They are to run the tunnel 200 feet, for which development they will be entitled to 40 feet of stoping ground.

THE PASADENA SMELTER. The Pasadena smelter is receiving about 40 tons of ore every day—a considerable quantity of which comes via the coke ovens from Trout Lake and the Miguel. The number of carloads of bullion already turned out are in the neighborhood of 60, and Manager Watkins says it is his hope and intention to make number 100 before the close of 1885.

THE STEPHENS. W. B. Whiteside and Theo Barlow are at work on the Stephens and are having a great deal of trouble from water. The vein was cut a month ago, but the large body of water which was tapped simultaneously with the vein prevented its being tested thoroughly.

THE GOLDEN AGE. The Golden Age on Dolores mountain has again uncovered some very fine mineral, and if it holds out as well as tests which were made this week, or anything near it, it will prove a bonanza of magnificent proportions. In the vein is a 10 inch streak of quartz, which has heretofore been passed by unnoticed, but free gold was accidentally discovered in it a day or so ago.

Supplies for the Hungry Utes. A Washington dispatch says:—The report of General Miles upon the condition of the Southern Utes, in Colorado, was received at the interior department this morning and the commissioner of Indian affairs immediately instructed the agent to secure supplies for the Indians.

The cholera scourge. The cholera in Spain continues its awful work without abatement. The condition of Granada is most pitiable. Hundreds of people are attacked by the cholera in single streets nearly every day. There are no doctors, and no authorities to look after the victims, who often pass through their agonies in the streets and expire unattended in the gutters.

The last Del Norte Prospector contained a beautiful and well executed picture of Wagon Wheel Gap, the famous Rio Grand resort. It is so nicely printed as to resemble a landscape drawing.

THE PRESENT GAME LAW.

Following will be found the game law entire as it stands now. It is published in compliance with the general demand to know what it is since the last general assembly made such radical changes. As will be observed the season for large game is cut down a month and a half, and off the popular end, too.

SECTION 1. Section 1545, of chapter XLV, general statutes, is hereby amended so that it shall read as follows: No person shall kill or wound, ensnare or trap any elk, deer, buffalo or bison, fawn or antelope, within this state, between the first day of January and the 15th day of October in each and every year; no person shall kill or wound, ensnare or trap any mountain sheep within this state during a period of ten years from and after the approval of this act.

SECTION 2. No person, or persons, shall ensnare, net or trap, within this state, any wild duck, or wild goose, at any time. Any person, or persons, who shall violate the provisions of this section, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined as provided for in section 2, of the act of which this act is amendatory.

SECTION 3. The fine fixed by the section referred to is not less than five nor more than fifty dollars, with costs of suit, and one-half goes to the informer. These cases are prosecuted in the same manner as other cases of misdemeanor.

SECTION 4. Section 1546, of chapter XLV, general statutes, is hereby amended so that it shall read as follows: No person shall ensnare, net or trap, within this state, between the first day of January and the 15th day of October in each and every year; no person shall kill or wound, ensnare or trap any mountain sheep within this state during a period of ten years from and after the approval of this act.

SECTION 5. No person, or persons, shall ensnare, net or trap, within this state, any wild duck, or wild goose, at any time. Any person, or persons, who shall violate the provisions of this section, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined as provided for in section 2, of the act of which this act is amendatory.

SECTION 6. The fine fixed by the section referred to is not less than five nor more than fifty dollars, with costs of suit, and one-half goes to the informer. These cases are prosecuted in the same manner as other cases of misdemeanor.

SECTION 7. Section 1547, of chapter XLV, general statutes, is hereby amended so that it shall read as follows: No person shall ensnare, net or trap, within this state, any wild duck, or wild goose, at any time.

THE STARVING SOUTHERN UTES.

The officers commanding in New Mexico say that the Southern Utes are starving; that they had no supplies, and were not able to procure any; and that unless food was immediately secured for them, that they would immediately go on the war path.

EDITORIAL BY THE DENVER TRIBUNE REPUBLICAN. This is the same complaint that was made in the early part of the summer regarding these Indians. They were not fed then, and they were compelled to leave their reservation or starve.

THE ROCKWOOD ROBBERY.

Mason Jackson and Mark Munyan Held up and Robbed.

Thursday night a couple of hold-ups operated in the vicinity of Rockwood and were successful in getting away with some \$75 in money, two watches and a revolver. They first made their appearance in Rockwood about 9:30. Mason Jackson, who is postmaster and keeps a store at this point, had been entertaining a number of friends in his store and all had left the place excepting Pete Jensen, the stage driver, who had stepped into the office to write a letter. The office is near by, but not in the store. Jackson locked the front door and had made his bed and stepped to the back door for the purpose of closing and locking it, but just as he reached it, two masked men stepped from the shadow, covered him with their pistols and told him to keep quiet. They had hardly given their orders when one of them struck him a sounding whack on the head, which partially stunned him. They then made him go to the safe, which was unlocked and on swinging open the doors it was found empty. They secured about \$15 in money from the postoffice, Jackson's silver watch and chain, took some cartridges from his shelves and left. Jackson immediately loaded a gun and ran to the depot, thinking they would try to hold up John Atkinson, the station agent, who had a large amount of currency in his safe, but they had left the place. In 15 or 20 minutes Jackson and Jensen heard firing up the road and ran in the direction of the shooting. They met Mark Munyan on horseback, who told them that two men had held him up at the spring on top of the grade and took \$60 in money, his watch and a Colt's 45 calibre pistol. They had placed pistols close to his head and fired several times, and talked of killing him. The spokesman told him in broken Dutch that they had knocked Jackson down and left him lying on the floor and would "kill him before to-morrow night." He also said "My name is Clabe Jones, and if anybody wants to follow me tell them what my name is. I come from Arizona, and can shoot with the best of them." Munyan is toll keeper on Lamb's toll road.

About midnight the sound of horses feet on the road was heard at Neary's, four miles this side of Rockwood, coming toward Rico. Two horses that had been turned out there were missing yesterday morning, but they may have merely strayed away. As the men were masked and no suspicious characters had been seen near Rockwood, there is no clue whatever to their identity and suspicion attaches to no one. The start toward Rico was very probably a blind. It might possibly be that they laid in wait for the outgoing stage yesterday, and if so may have made a big haul. G. S. Garret left here yesterday with between \$1,000 and \$1,500 in currency, but he would be on his guard after meeting the other stage at Wason's and hearing the news. Following is a letter from Mr. Jackson to P. M. Thompson:

Rockwood, Colo., Aug. 28th, 1885. Last night two men suddenly rushed in my back door as I was alone and they with drawn revolvers pointed at my head, and upon not moving to open safe soon enough, one struck me a blow on the head that brought me to, so I soon let them have possession. They ransacked everything, but only found my watch and postoffice money drawer, taking it and leaving money drawer in the center untouched. I have a sore head, no watch and as near as I can tell, about \$15.00 cash. Parties went toward Rico and when one mile above Rockwood met Mark Munyan, Lamb's toll collector, and downed him for sixty dollars, watch and gun. Let Rico and vicinity look out.

Very truly yours, MASON JACKSON. J. F. WANNEMAKER has gone to Del Norte to be present at the opening of U. S. District Court there next Thursday. Mr. Wannemaker was summoned as a juror at the preceding term and failed to put in an appearance, for which the U. S. Judge fined him \$50 for contempt of court. We believe Mr. Wannemaker is now in attendance as a witness in some case, and will endeavor to explain to the judge the cause of his absence and have the fine remitted.

THE Newman hill is somewhat noted for its eccentricities in the way of land slides, and was on one of its periodical tantrums yesterday. About 10 o'clock in the morning an extensive land and rock slide ran down over the mouth of the Newman tunnel, and smaller slides continued to run in its track throughout the day. As so many slides have been cleared away from the mouth of that tunnel, the lessees have concluded to allow this one to remain until the moisture in the earth is considerably evaporated—the rainy season being supposed at an end. Sufficient opening to admit workmen will be the extent of dirt handling for the present.

THEO. BARLOW is on his pilgrimage to Del Norte where he takes his seat as one of the jurors in the U. S. District Court next Thursday. These jurors receive \$3 per day and 5 cents mileage, which latter item amounts to \$29.10, both ways. As the fare is considerably more, the jurors will have to serve a good many days, live on crackers and cheese and sleep under the Rio Grande bridge to even up their expenses. Members of the state legislature are allowed 15 cents per mile for each mile necessarily traveled in going to and returning from the capital. Why should the amount allowed a U. S. juror be one-third that amount, when his expenses are the same?

The Great San Juan—With a Little Puff on the Side for Rico.

Tribune-Republican. All the mining sections of southwestern Colorado have for years been spoken of as the San Juan country. It embraces the counties of Hinsdale, Ourray, San Juan, San Miguel, Dolores and La Plata. This great section had long been inaccessible, but the completion of the Denver and Rio Grande to Durango and thence to Silverton was the first great step towards bringing the San Juan country to the attention of capitalists. This was soon manifest in the erection of reduction works at Durango and Rico, and the establishment of samplers and ore markets at these points and Silverton. Another most important aid to the development of the country is to be seen in numerous and magnificent roads. It is no discredit to other parts of the state to say that, in the opinion of many of our best mining experts, the San Juan country in native wealth is the peer of any equal area known. In bulk of both high and low grade ores this section is unsurpassed. In silver, gold and lead its possibilities are immense and its isolated position warrants the belief that large reduction works can be profitably carried on in that country. The Pasadena works at Rico have already shipped out fifty car-loads of bullion, thus demonstrating the feasibility of smelting near the source of supply. Rico has all the requirements necessary for economical smelting and can thus compete with Pueblo and Denver. With capital in the hands of experienced men a large quantity of San Juan ore is liable to come out in ensuing years in the shape of base bullion. Capitalists will be forced to acknowledge that Southwestern Colorado is now not a whit behind Northern Colorado as a promising field for investment, and with equal chances for permanency. It seems a trifle strange that there has been so much gush and so little actual progress in raising a fund for a monument to the lamented Grant. A Denver paper says: "For nearly four weeks four of the leading papers of New York have been steadily soliciting subscriptions for the Grant monument fund and their total collections amount to less than \$1,400. When it is known that the proposed monument is estimated to cost \$500,000 it will be seen that there is no hope of raising a sufficient Grant monument fund by popular subscription. We are not surprised at this result. Indeed we foretold it when the project was first undertaken. Somehow, although we may be a sentimental people, our sentimentalism does not take kindly to costly public monuments. This has been proved in the case of Washington, Jefferson, Jackson, Lincoln and Garfield. If Grant is to have a monument worthy of his public services it must be built by Congressional appropriation."

SHE WANTED CHANGE.—The conductor on a southwest Georgia railroad was rolling along at a good rate about half way between stations. Suddenly the engineer blew "down brakes," and as the train slowed up the conductor saw an old lady who lived in the village, waving a handkerchief. The conductor advanced to meet her to thank her for heroic presence of mind in saving his train when she drew out a dilapidated bill and said: "I want \$2 in change; heve ye any dimes and nickles?" The change that came over that conductor's countenance would have broken up a \$7,000 Government bond.

The cowmen in Montana do up the depredated Indians in elegant style and their example and methods are respectfully referred to the cow-punchers of southwestern Colorado. A letter from an old Rico boy sends us the information that Ed Goulding and two other cattlemen met twenty marauding Piegans on the Mussel-shell between Half-breed and Razor creeks. The Indians had 75 stolen horses and the three whites fired on them, killing one. They were compelled to go for reinforcements and then killed the entire outfit, as well as recovering all the stolen stock.
