Here's all you have to do: Take about 27 years out of your life, clear off the various breeds of oak and brush, plant 1,000 pecan trees and 20 acres of grapes, and then go making a living elsewhere while the trees and vines grow enough to pro-

Harris' 240 acres of land, two miles south of the Eula school, was settled by his family in 1898. It was good land but covered by solid brush. Harris' father built a house — which could not be seen for the thickets and worked for 15 years clearing land acre by acre. By renting outside land, the family made a

But in the process, the lack of conservation and crop rotation, the shinnery-like sand became non-productive.

When Harris was discharged from the service in 1918, he returned to Callahan County and the farm, After serving with the heavy artillery for 15 months in France, farming seemed a little slow. And facing the type of farming he had in Callahan County was not encourag-

He sweated it out for a while and then decided to make an investment in the future. He planted 1,000 native pecan seed in a nursery block, and after they came up, transplanted them in the fields and budded them with paper-shelled Burketts. That was in 1923 and the trees are now 27 years old and still

Stand Against **Bill Expressed**

AUSTIN — A strong stand against the Graham Bill to divert from the counties their share of the state gasoline tax was expressed today by Senator Wayne Wagonseller of Stone-

Senator Wagonseller said the bill, which now is in a House committee, would seriously endanger the economics of the counties in his district by taking away from them more than \$200,000 a year they otherwise would receive.

Records in the County and Distirct Road Bond Indebtedness Board show that the ten counties in the proposed 22nd Senatorial District last year received \$314,922 from the surplus fund and this year will get \$355,-936, Senator Wagonseller said.

The House committee on Highways and Roads voted the Gra-ham Bill out of the committee with a recommendation that it do not pass. However, by a suspension of the House Rules, the disputed bill was revived and sent to an entirely new commit-

tee, therefore, is very much alive. "If this Bill ever passes the House and is sent to the Senate, I will do all in my power to defeat it," the Senator declared. Not only would it seriously cripple the county governments, but it also would slow down the rural road program all over the

IT OUGHT TO BE A LAW

With the city election coming up, we have heard it said on a number of occasions that every businessman in our town should be compelled to serve on the city council for at least two terms during his lifetime. With this we heartily agree, but we would add a phrase to the effect that his term should be served while he is yet in the early part of his life. Then, for the balance of his years, he would look upon the efforts of the city officers with respect, or at least, have a kindly feeling toward those who are serving on the council.

It is not an easy thing to work at the job of mayor or alderman of a growing town. (And who wants to spend his time on the council of a town that is not growing?) A town that is suffering growing pains is in a healthy condition. When we see a town that is growing, we can look closer and see that there is a cause for its growth. In almost every instance the growth of a town can be traced to a wide awake city council which has the confidence and support of the citizenship.

Barton, F. E. Neel and Russell L. Warren. Mr. Barton is running for his second term. All three of these candidates are in business here, and are well qualified to conduct the city's business. They are the type that will give their valuable time and effort and thought to promote the best interests of the city.



Merrill said. An additional 8, 430 pounds of KR seed were harvested from the Soil Conservation Service nursery at San Antonio and U.S. land utiliaztion project areas.

From Texas' more than 41/2 million acres in close-growing soil-conserving legumes, a total of 25,216,000 pounds of legume seed was harvested during 1950.
