




The Gruver area, along with the entire section of the country has been blessedwith a marvelous snow--one of the biggest in recent years.

It was customary white in color, but looked green like dollar bills to the people here. A wheat crop was revived.

The exact amount of snow in Gruver has been estimated between one and two feet deep on the level ground. The moisture content was heavy and estimates ranged from three to six

The snow started falling here Monday morning about 8:00 a.m. and continued steadily until mid-afternoon on Tuesday. High windscaused drifts up to five feet in town.

Motorists were stranded all around the city of Gruver. Many cars were left parked out in the streets where they stuck in the snow. Only those vehicles with chains or good snow-grip tires were able to move at all and many of them had trouble.

The damages of the snow were hard to determine at press time. They won't be known until all the straycattle have been rounded up and other ill effects of the storm analyzed.

But the damage won't begin to measure up to the good expected from the moisture. Wheat was in bad shape and much of it couldn't last much longer. This was Gruver's first real good moisture since last

No one seems sure how much snow fell around Gruver this week but most people estimate between 15 and 20 inches and some many more. The official guage here was

We don't know how much it snowed, but it was the wettest we ever remembered. With Witnesses each time, we took four samplings of snow (unpacked) and each time, came up with an inch and a half of moisture for every five inches of snow.

This sounds unbelievable and may not be accurate, but it points out the fact that the snow was very wet. The fact that the snow didn't drift as much as expected is poof of how heavy it was.

Most people we talked with feel that this will insure some sort of dryland wheat crop this year. It could be a real good one if more moisture falls in the next few weeks. It should also leave enough moisture for past-

Someone mentioned that this moisture may slow down the irrigation well permits. We think it will actually increase irrigation activities. Many farmers with dryland wheat could get wells down in the next few weeks and and use them at least once on their wheat and come out with a crop. This could go a long way toward helping pay

We have never seen the attitude of a town change so much in such a short time. Many ranchers were out Wednesday morning with the worrisome task of rounding up cattle that had strayed. All of them were smiling. *******

Many times we talk to people who live around Amarillo and few of them have ever been to Gruver. This is natural since Gruver has not been on a State or National Highway. Unless someone has business in Gruver they seldom come through here.

All this is due to start changing. Carl Brown, head of the Highway Department here, informed us the other day that the road running north and south through Gruver has been designated State Highway 136. He said the signs wouldn't be changed until the official maps are printed showing the road as a state highway.

This should help tremendously to bring more traffic through here, especially when the Sanford Dam is completed and Stinnett is linked with Fritch by way of the

Most people living north of here around Guymon, Liberal and on up in Kansas, wil probably use this highway on their way to the dam or to anywhere south.

There has also been some talk about highway 15 which runs now through Ferryton, Spearman, Borger and on down to Conway changing and coming through Gruver, Stratford, Dalhart and on to New Mexico.

Also, there are groups working to bring a state highway from Post Texas to the Oklahoma line.

Closed Cooperation Brings Success in Sumpter County, Georgia

There was no stopping a team of 29 business and

local County Program Building Committee, rolled up their sleeves and went to work in 1961, joining forces with the Americus and Sumter County Development Corporation, which has been working on area economic problems since 1955.

The results: A fully equipped 400 acre industrial park creating 884 new jobs lakes for fishing, water skiing, improved community services, and F.H.A. credit to diversify farming and build new rural homes.

Faced with a serious exodus of its rural citizens, people in Sumter County, Georgia, decided to do something rather than just talk their problems In 1955 they formed the Americus and Sumpter County Development Corporation and raised a \$650,000 revolving fund to develop new industry. Here's how it

By issuing 3% debentures, the Corporation raised \$35, 000 to help build a refrigerated body plant. The Corporation put up its lease on the mobile home company in borrowing \$100, 000 from a memorial fund. Two local banks added \$35,000 so the Development Corporation could load \$135,000 to a company that would manufacture mobile home furniture.
