

Panhandle Producers & Royalty Owners Association is a non-profit association of independent oil and gas producers, royalty owners and service companies, many of whom operate in Hansford County. The purpose of this letter on behalf of our 800 members is two-fold: (1) to question the overvaluation of oil, gas and mineral properties in Hansford County, and (2) to question the valuations of oil and natural gas used by Pritchard & Abbott for 1986 tax purposes.

The Texas Constitution mandates that "taxation shall be equal and uniform'' and the statutes provide that "all property shall be assessed on the basis of 100 percent of its appriased value." Section 5.10 of the Property Tax Code requires the State Property Tax Board (SPTB) to conduct an annual study in each appraisal district to determine the level and uniformity of property tax appraisals for each major kind of property. The Report of the Findings of the 1985 Property Value Study of School & Appraisal Districts was released earlier this month, and it is of great concern to PPROA that the category Oil, Gas and Minerals is often assessed values greater than 100 percent while other categories are assessed values considerably less than 100 percent.

Such is the case in Hansford County. The SPTB report lists the median ratio for Category G, Oil, Gas and Minerals, at 1.35, or 135 percent of the value placed on this category by the State Property Tax Board. At the same time, other categories are valued as follows:

Secondly, the problem of overvaluation will be perpetuated this year because of the valuations placed on oil and gas for 1986 property taxes. Although PPROA understands that Texas law provides that all taxable property shall be appraised at its market value as of January 1, we also understand that "each property shall be appraised based upon the individual characteristics that affect the property's market value." There is a great deal of risk inherent in the oil and gas business, not the least of which is the producer's inability to control price. The oil producer is at the mercy of OPEC, while the gas producer is at the mercy of the pipeline.

There existed on January 1 evidence which pointed to the fact that we were facing an oil price decline. Enclosed are articles from The Houston Chronicle, The Houston Post and The Wall Street Journal. In actuality, there was a 54 percent decline in a five-month period. This means that producers will be paying taxes based on \$22 oil but are now receiving only \$13.50 for that oil. Natural gas prices have followed the oil price downward, leaving many producers with meaniingless contracts as pipelines refuse to take gas at a high contract price

This letter is not a formal protest, nor are we requesting a hearing before your board. Panhandle Producers & Royalty Owners Association, on behalf of its members, is simply making its position public and would welcome any explanation you might offer. We desire to work with you to bring the appraisal process into line with the requirements of the law. Sincerely,

WASHINGTON **Chiles & Crack** BY EDWARD H. SIMS

Senator Lawton Chiles (D-Fla) has introduced three bills in the Senate which would sharply toughen penalties for the sale and use of crack cocaine.

This treated cocaine is especially dangerous in that it is highly addictive and relatively cheap. Chiles says stiffening penalties for its sale and use would discourage new users.

Crack, and rock, another form of treated cocaine with similar effects, is an immediate threat to students. Chiles' bill would make it a felony to employ a minor in drug manufacturing or distribution and also to manufacture or process drugs within 1000 feet of a

First offense penalties under the proposed bills would be up to 40 years in prison and a \$50,000 fine

Cocaine and other cocoa leaf derivitives are now defined as second most dangerous category drugs under terms of the present Controlled Substances Act. The Chiles bills would change that and place them in the most dangerous category.

The Senate Judiciary Committee should act swiftly on these bills and report them out to the Senate so that they can become the law of the land as soon as possible. Young lives in growing numbers are at stake.







Constantly soaked by salt water, Callahan developed terrible boils and sores. On a sparse diet of raw fish, he wasted to little over a hundred pounds.

On the seventy-fifty day he spotted land, and the next morning he was picked up by fishermen from an island sixty miles away from his original destination. In seventy-six days he had drifted eighteen hundred miles, the only man in history to have survived more than a month alone at sea in an inflatable raft.

Automatic Washer

During the active summer season, many homemakers face the laundry problem of removing perspiration stains from clothing. According to home economists from Whirlpool Corporation, this hard to remove stain can usually be taken care of by soaking the item in warm water with en enzyme pre-soak product and then washing in the hottest water safe for the

material. If the stain remains, the home economists recommend dampening the stain and then sprinkling meat tenderizer on it. Let stand 30 to 60 minutes. Treat with a non-flammable drycleaning solvent. Rub stain with detergent and wash. Grass stains are another common summertime laundry problem. These stains can be taken care of by soaking the item in warm or cold water, or sponging the spot with denatured alcohol. Wash in water temperature and bleach safe for the fabric. For colored fabrics, check color fastness before applying alcohol. Ink spots from ballpoint pens seem to be

a problem no matter what time of the year. The best recommended solution is spraying the stain with an aerosol hair spray. Sponge continuously until all bleeding stops and then let dry. Repeat the process if the stain remains. Use chlorine bleach if it is safe for fabric.



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PDRA talks bond vote Tuesday! \$11,500,000 Bond Issue

An \$11,150,000 bond issue to build the Palo Duro Creek dam in Hansford County, creating a water reservoir for North Plains cities, was considered Tuesday by the board of directors for the Palo Duro River Authority.

The second and a second s

The regular meeting of the board was held at the PDRA offices in the Pittman-Shieldknight building in Spearman where the river authority is headquartered. The meeting began at 2 p.m.

A date in August is anticipated for the bond vote in Moore and Hansford counties and the City of Stinnett, the member entities in the authority

Voters will have two issues to decide -- whether or not to approve the bonds and a tax rate to pay off the note.

The Palo Duro authority has a proposal from the **Texas Water Development** Board to buy the bonds for 7.6 percent - about one percent below the conventional bond market, reports Johnnie Lee of Spearman, PDRA manager.

He adds that the payback period would run for 25 years.

"Ths will save the river authority a considerable amount of tax dollars," he reports. "The municipal bond market is currently at 8.5 percent for periods of 15 to 20 years."

The proposition to use Texas Water Plan funds to purchase the PDRA construction bonds has developed over the past three to four weeks in meetings between Lee and Charles Neimer, executive director of the Texas Water Development Board; Reg Arnold, executive director of the Texas Water Development Fund, and Dr. Herb Grubb, chief planner for the Texas Water Development Board.

Lee explains that the

from the water development board, PDRA directors will also amend a request to the state agency for \$22.3 million in Texas Water Plan funds for the North Plains lake project.

That request is due a public hearing on July 17 in Austin before the Texas Water Development Commission.

If approved, the project to develop a municipal water reservoir for the cities of Dumas, Cactus, Sunray, Stinnett, Gruver and Spearman will become the first in Texas to use the water fund which Texans approved last November.

The lake project advanced by the PDRA calls for construction of a 4,900-foot long earthen dam at the junction of Palo Duro Creek and Horse Creek, which is located northwest of Spearman in Hansford county

The dam will create a lake with 2,500 surface acres with much of the shoreline surrounding the lake developed for recreation use.

PDRA board members are advancing a plan to build the dam now and develop the municipal water supply system at a future date when the lake begins to fill.

Reagan & South Africa

One reason President Reagan doesn't think broad economic sanctions are the best answer to South Africa's segregration policy is that they will hurt more blacks than whites.

They will hurt especially the countries bordering South Africa. Zimbabwe (Rhodesia), to the north, is a perfect example. Experts say South Africa could bring Zimthe "Christian Science Monitor" says some top officials in these states admit they oppose tough sanctions, though publicly supporting the idea. That's because blacks would suffer much more than whites.

This is probably why the "Iron Lady," - Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher - stuck to her guns and, with West German support, successfully thwarted a move by the European Community in June to impose broad sanctions. Despite the threat from one commonwealth prime minister to leave the commonwealth, Thatcher held to her policy, convinced that sanctions will not work and will harm blacks, in South Africa and elsewhere, more than whites.

It's easy to demagogue on this issue and charges of hypocrisy fly back and forth. Reformers in the U.S., such as Gary Hart demonstrating in front of the South African Embassy in Washington, should remember that it costs them nothing if the economy of Zimbabwe collapses, and those of other black states. And it costs them nothing if large numbers of jobs, black and white, are lost in South Africa.

Turn Leftovers Into "Planned-Overs"

Most of us refrigerate left-over food for one of two reasons: either we want to postpone washing the dish it's in or we feel guilty about throwing away perfectly good food. But when food sits in the refrigerator too long, we often wind up throwing it away anyway - and the dish still has to be washed!

A better system for handling leftovers is to think of them as "plannedovers." Here are some suggestions for planning to make good use of leftover food before it goes to waste:

Know the appropriate amount of food to buy for your household. If you buy an extra amount of a certain food because it's on sale, perpare two batches of the same dish and freeze one. Label and date the frozen dish. Then keep a running list or card file of frozen items so you can remember to include them in future menu plans.

Decide immediately after a meal whether you can incorporate any leftover food into the current week's menus, or it you should freeze it for future use. Family members may be more accepting of leftovers if they







Farm Credit Banks of Texas Respond to FCA's Call to Lower **Interest Rates**

The Farm Credit Banks of Texas, responded to a notice this week from its regulator in Washington, D.C. that the agency is ready to consider lowering interest rates for farmers.

James A. Rogers, chief executive officer of the Farm Credit Banks of Texas, today in Austin, said the Texas Federal Land Bank, which has been locked into an interest rate freeze for more than a year, was sending a request today to the nation's capital. The Texas bank first asked its regulator for an interest rate reduction in September of 1985.

The statement follows a news release issued by the Farm Credit Administration (FCA) that alerts district banks that FCA will approve interest rate reductions if the banks meet certain criterion.

"We're pleased that FCA has approved this plan for reducing interest rates to farmers," Rogers said. "We hope that they will act quickly in response to our request.' FCB of Texas respond


Rogers said the release didn't mean that FCA would grant blanket interest rate reductions for Farm Credit System borrowers. District banks wanting to lower interest rates must follow FCA

guidelines.

In previous requests to lower interest rates, the Texas board had been asking for a 1 percent across-the-board decrease for the Federal Land Bank. The last request was for a one-half of one percent reduction which is all FCA says they will allow at this time.

Some criterion the banks must meet to get a favorable ruling on interest rate reductions include disigning and implementing a program to obtain current financial statements from borrowers and effecting a program for restructuring loans for borrowers. FCA also urged the districts to offer programs based on differential interest rates, determined by borrower credit quality and classification

The Texas Farm Credit System is comprised of the Federal Land bank of Texas and its 44 Federal Land Bank Associations, the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Texas, 28 Production Credit Associations and the Texas Bank for Cooperatives. Collectively, they have \$4 billion in loans outstanding to 40,000 of the state's farmers, ranchers, aquatic harvesters and 147 rural utility cooperatives.





Major Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today the DPS is accepting applications for the position of State Trooper. Applicactions may be picked up any DPS office.

"The entrance examinations are being administered in the Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls offices on Tuesday and Thursdays for this area of the state and continuing until October 16, 1986 for the Recruit School beginning sometimes in 1987," according to Cawthon. The test will start at 8:30 a.m. and take most of the day to complete. Applicants are advised to wear comfortable running footwear and be prepared to give their best mental and physical effort.

Major Cawthon said, "General qualifications for DPS Troopers are: Applicants must be 20 through 35 years of age; good moral character; excellent physical condition; weight not less than two pounds nor more than three and one-half pounds per inch of height; visual acuity no worse than 20/40 correctable to 20/30; and a citizen of the United States. Educational qualifications are a minimum of 60 semester hours of college. College hours may be substituted by having 2 years of law enforcement experience or 2 years of military experience or any combination of the three. Qualified female applicants are also being accepted for the uniformed services of the DPS. The Department has been increasingly successful in recruiting persons from minority groups and the DPS is an Equal Opportunity Employer."

Smoking Down

The news on the tobacco addiction front is good. The Army recently banned smoking in all its buildings except in specially designated areas. It's estimated that in the last five years one-third of all American businesses have restricted smoking on the job.

Another 21 percent, according to the Bureau of National Affairs, plans to do so.

A survey of high school seniors shows that by 1984 the percentage of students who smoked dropped to 18.7 percent - down from over 20 percent in the seventies.

Nationwide, the percentage of all Americans who smoke has dropped significantly. The percentage of adult men who smoke is down to about one-third, from more than fifty percent in 1965.
