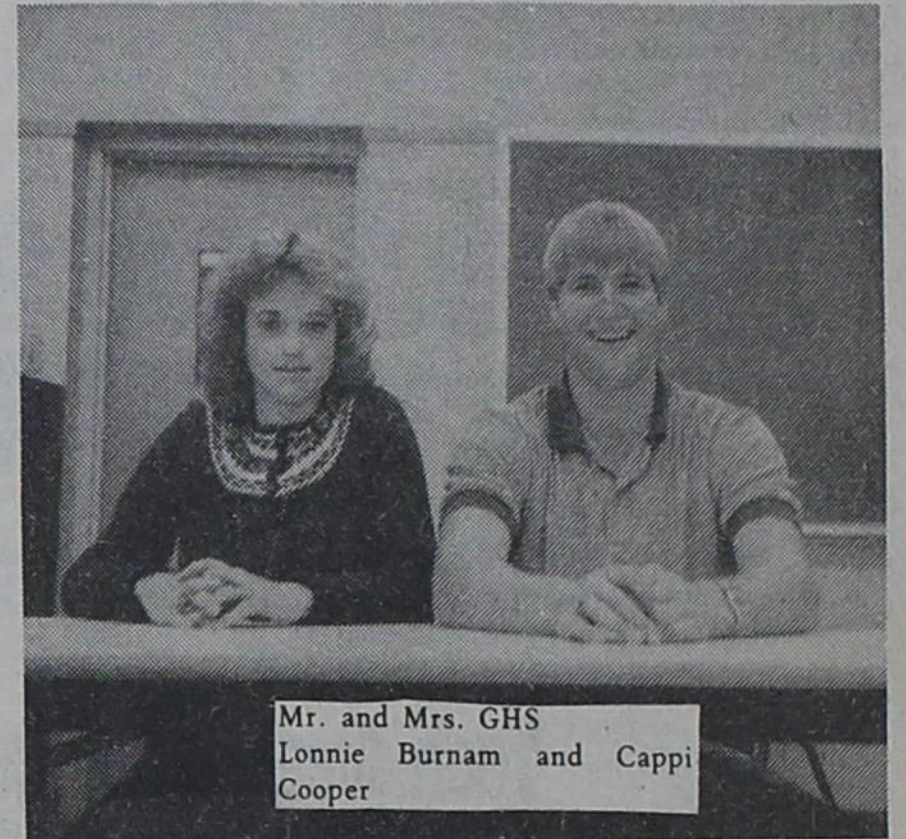

## 1-AA All-District players named

Voting is over for the 1-AA All District players from the six teams comprising the district and Gruver had two in the offensive lineup plus two more honorable mentions followed by three in the defensive lineup and one honorable mention.

As with schools this size all over the land, many players have to "double in brass"—that is, play both offensively and defensively and there was hardly a team that did not have a star—or stars—shining on both sides of the line of scrimmage.

The Greyhounds' Lonnie Burnam was tanned for all-district

offensive lineman and topped out as the biggest as well. Stratford's Jim Jones is as tall but Lonnie had 20 pounds on him. Burnam and Jones were joined by the "Cinderella" White Deer team's Todd Freeman and Stinnett's Luke Bodey.

Greyhound Rodney Clawson was named to the all-star offensive backfield, sharing honors with Tommy Gipson, Stinnett; Sammy Gomez, Stratford and Steve May, White Deer.

Quarterback honors went to White Deer's Darin Bennett while Stinnett's Rod Goodwin

was named all-district offensive kicker and tight end. Wide receiver position on the all-district lineup went to Stratford's short, light Jere Keener.

Billy Murphy, Stinnett got the center position vote but it was close and honorable mention went to Greyhound Johnny Shipp. Mike Burnam was close in the voting and got honorable mention as an offensive lineman.

The defensive all-district lineup included both big Lonnie Burnam and Terry Clingan from the Greyhound squad as linemen.

'Hound Mike Burnam's star really shone in the all-district defensive polling! He was named one of the all-star linebackers then received honorable mention as a lineman.

It was a foregone conclusion throughout the district before a vote was cast that White Deer's "king-of-the-hill" Coach Paul Wilson was a shoo-in for "Coach-of-the-Year."

Stratford mentor and runner-up, Jack Needham, took honorable mention in the coaching category.

—Oh, some strange stories, maybe...like the new-comer to Darrouzett who said he lived there a year before he discovered children were not really born with a basketball at the end of

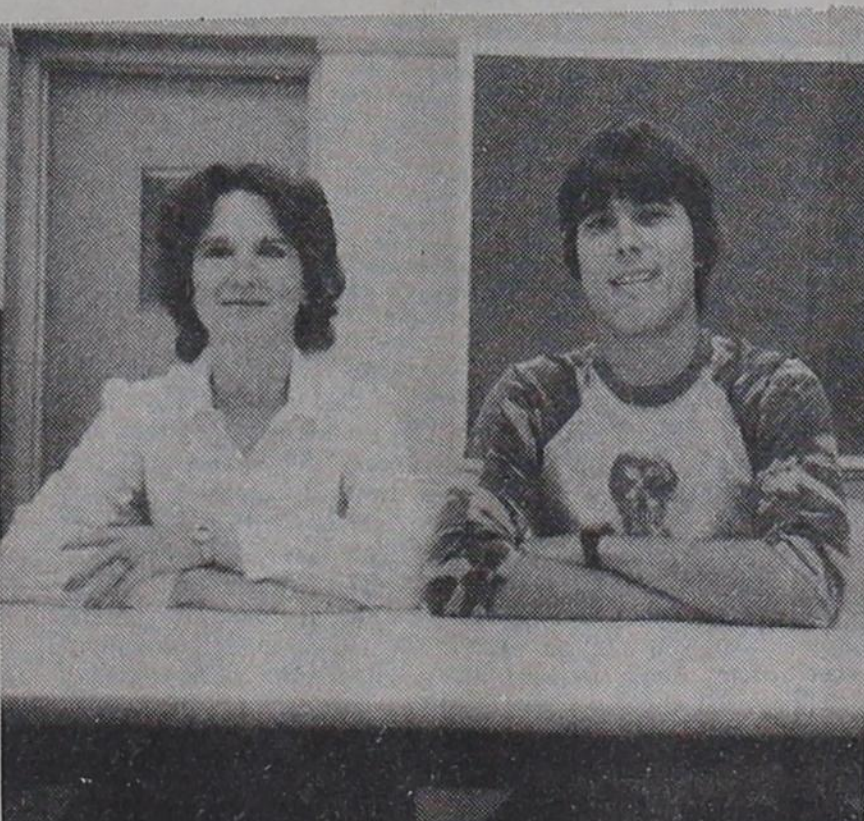
one arm instead of a hand!

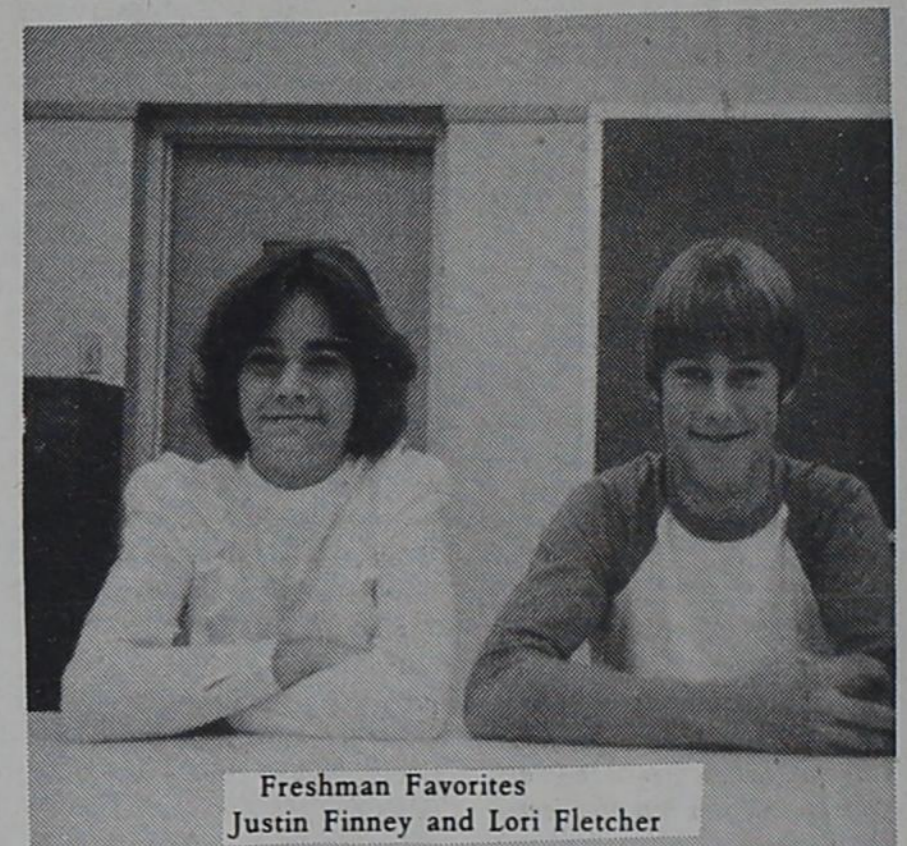

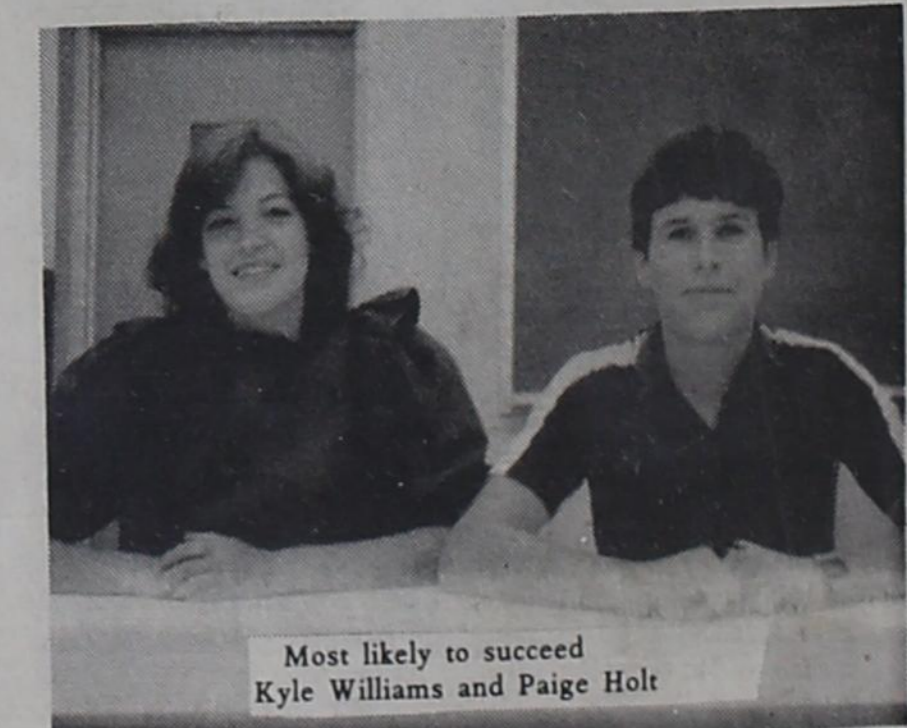

## Traffic safety task force recommendations

Tougher penalties for DWI offenders, increased use of child auto safety seats for infants and children under four and strengthened driver education in Texas were among the legislative recommendations unanimously approved by the Texas Safety Association Board of Directors recently.

Responding to Texas Department of Public Safety Chief Col. Jim Adams' call for tougher laws and greater enforcement of those laws to deal with DWI offenders in the Texas, the directors of the 1400 member safety group approved all of the Task Force on Traffic Safety recommendations and pledged to work for grass roots understanding of the recommendations and their safety benefits.

Among those recommendations are raising the drinking

age to 21, banning open containers of alcoholic beverages from the passenger compartments of motor vehicles and stiffer penalties for driving while intoxicated. Several Texas Safety Association members, including the immediate past president, Dave Coslett of Dow Chemical in Freeport, served on the task force.

She cautioned the youths they must try to decide if a goal they seek is worth the cost of attaining.

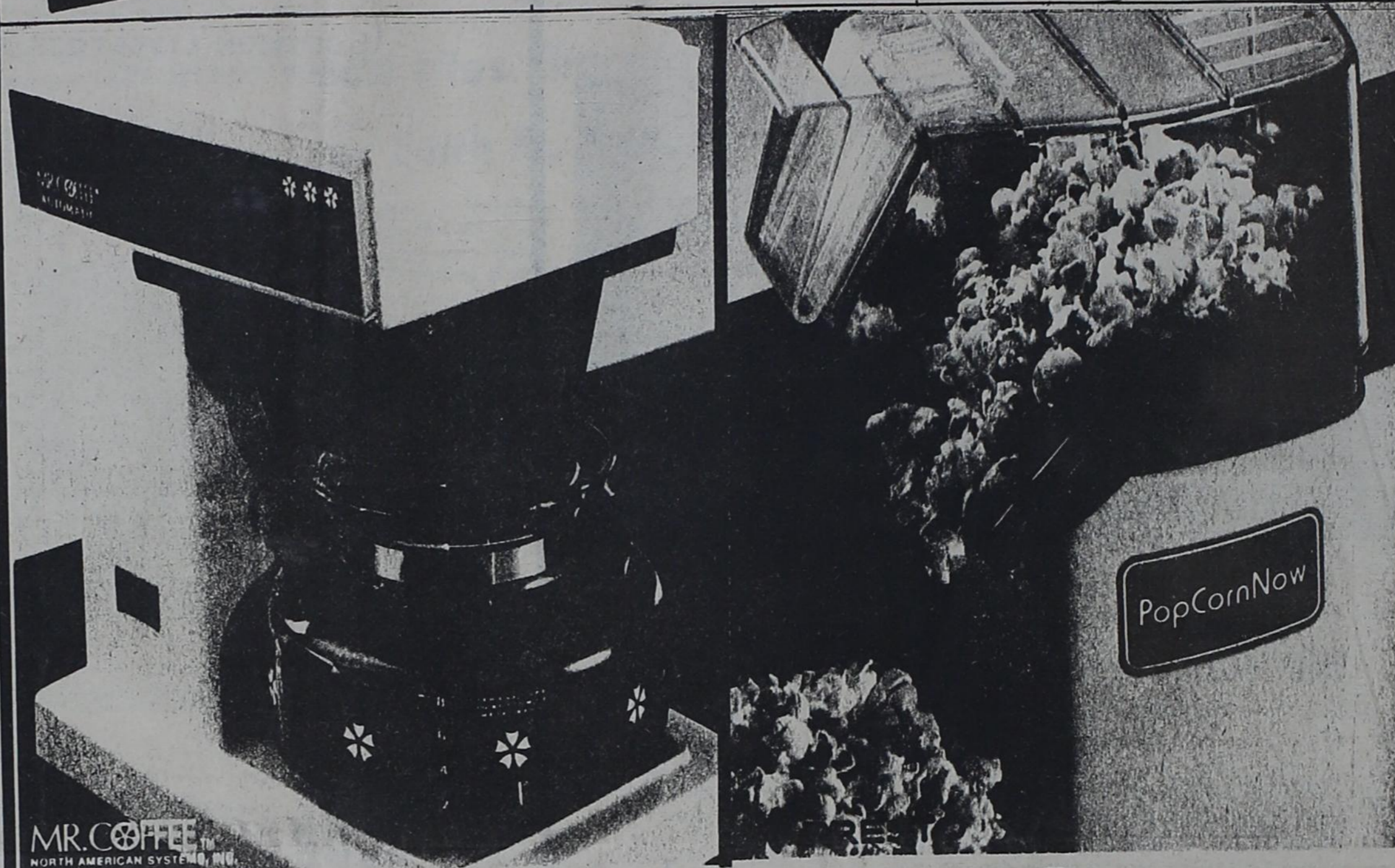

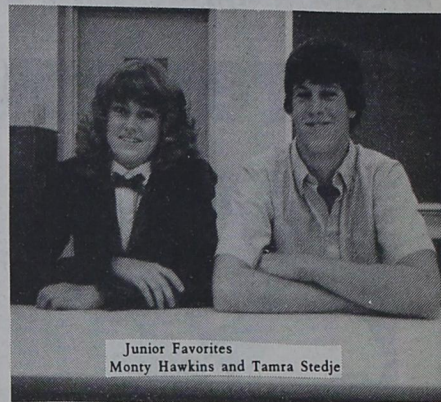
The Smokeout annually fo-

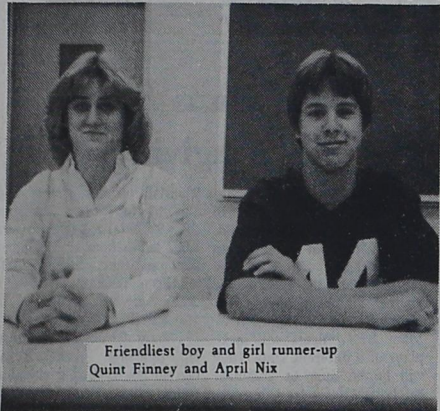

# Greyhounds' Coach Rick Nix resigns

At the end of the Gruber-Sunray football game Nov. 5, two men met on the field and shook hands, then one of them followed his defeated team to the locker room while the other lingered on the field...

Finally, the other man left the field on leadened feet--for "finally" was the key word for Rick Nix, Athletic Director and Head Football Coach for Gruber High School Greyhounds the past five years.

He had quietly tendered his resignation Oct. 8 just before the Stratford game.

"I knew before the Sunray game started it was my last at Gruber," Coach Nix said. "After shaking hands with the Sunray coach, I lingered awhile on the field. I didn't want to walk off."

"It hurt."

Using those moments as a springboard, Nix shared some very thrilling, some very trying,

some very poignant times out of his five years at Gruber, naming the Sunray game as the one he would remember most--for obvious reasons.

Fortunately, it was a victory to close out his final season at Gruber.

For the next few minutes, Rick Nix fielded questions covering everything from his greatest players down the gamut to his greatest frustrations.

The spectrum of contrast was displayed between Nix' greatest thrill of his five-year tenure and his greatest disappointment.

"My biggest thrill?" Nix mused. "It would have to be a trio of wins--two in 1979 and one this year. Back in '79 we were facing a tough Dalhart team. Late in the game we came from far behind to make the score 13-14. We went for two points, made it, and won 15-14!"

"Sunray and Stratford had

become 'hot' teams in the district and Gruber had not beaten either in a long time. In '79, we beat Sunray 7-6 and this year, Stratford became our first victory of the season and district play at 21-0. It was a double thrill considering how this season wound up for Stratford!"

Biggest disappointment? Nix said it would have to be a chain reaction thing beginning with the 1981 Stratford game and the dissention and the animosities that infiltrated the Greyhound squad.

"I do not believe I was the cause of it," Nix declared, "but I blame myself for not handling the situation better."

How about the 1979 win over Dalhart; over Stratford this season--or even the 1979 close loss to Panhandle. That was a good defensive game.

Before closing the interview, we went to two other extremes. The first was to ask Nix' biggest thrill in coaching. Here the answer really reveals the man:

"Watching a kid develop into a mature young man mentally and physically and feeling that his coach might have had a hand in it," Nix said. "I have a very deep feeling for athletes that perform up to their abilities and am in awe of those that perform beyond their abilities to do so!"

His biggest coaching disappointment?

"It is exactly at the opposite end of the stick! The biggest disappointment, the biggest frustration to me as a coach is the kid with a natural, God-given talent, is perfect physically and mentally...and refuses to produce!"

Nix said one of the handicaps to a coach are those parents who think the coach should raise their boys--make them get their hair cut--make them come in earlier at night--and generally control their behavior.

"I think these are the responsibilities of the parents, not the coach," Nix said emphatically.

Then the resigning coach voiced a strange frustration for a coach: the parent or other adults who think athletics are the single most important part of the lives of young people.

This man who has dedicated his life to the athletic phases of the lives of young people said he thought more important was God, country, family, education and consideration for their fellow man.

The interview was drawing to a close. The coach had touched on friends, remembrances away from athletics, many things. Then he ended with perhaps the greatest revelation of hurt to a person in the public eye:

"My final frustration is the person that blames my family for decisions that I make!"

Which just might be Rick Nix' way of saying: remember him as his own man.

## Sheriff's Dept. conducts seminar

The Hansford County Sheriff's Department--assisted by area firms involved in agriculture--is sponsoring a seminar for law enforcement on the theft of farm equipment and grain, beginning at 6 p.m. Thursday night in the Junior High School Cafeteria.

Officer Larry King, Potter County farm theft specialist will also take part in the seminar.

Sheriff R.L. McFarlin, host law enforcement officer, said the seminar would also include input from officers over the broader area of the high plains and other sectors of the state with a high incidence of farm thefts--particularly those with records of significant solution of thefts in the field of agriculture.

While Hansford County has earned high praise from law enforcement officers and de-

partments over the area for seminars conducted in the past, Sheriff McFarlin said these were not undertaken with recognition in mind.

"We have geared each seminar to a particularly sensitive area of crime and loss," McFarlin noted. "One of our most successful seminars--and a recent one--dealt with the theft of oil field equipment. Input absorbed and contacts made with other officers helped solve quickly the recent theft of drill bits from Baker & Taylor Drilling Co."

## DPS Plans For Thanksgiving

Major C.W. Bell, Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region 5, said, "As we approach Thanksgiving Day weekend, all of us are making plans of one kind or another for observance of this traditional season of the year. Many DPS officers will make plans of a different kind. They will be on duty to stimulate safety-consciousness throughout this festive holiday."

During the last Thanksgiving holiday weekend, Texas experienced 53 fatal accidents and 57 traffic fatalities. Major Bell said, "Speed and alcohol are the main contributing factors in the majority of traffic deaths in Texas."

A total of 4,701 fatalities was recorded on our streets and highways for 1981 and statistics show 923 fatal accidents caused 1,082 deaths and 17,343 injury accidents that caused 27,907 injuries in Texas that involved a drunk driver, according to Major Bell.

"Many drivers are not tested," Bell said, "because Texas has no law requiring chemical test on drivers in fatal accidents and it is probable that more than 50% of the deceased drivers in Texas were driving while intoxicated and were not reported as DWL."

The Texas Department of Public Safety urges all motorists to avoid the use of alcohol when driving. Let's all slow down a little and live a lot.

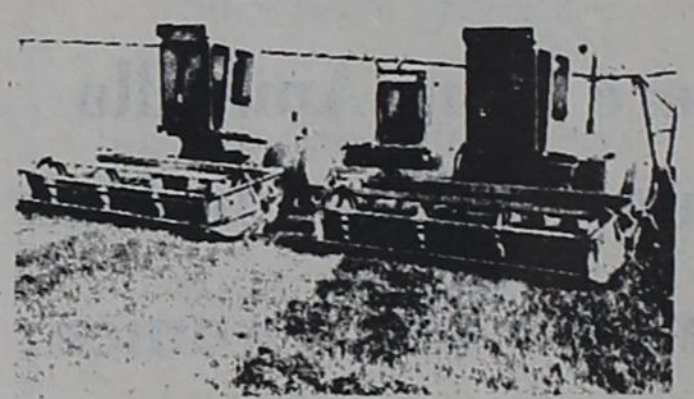
