

HOMEMAKING NOTES - #4 by Linda Webb, H.D. Agent

Pre-registration for the advanced clothing workshop will be held Friday, February 19, at 10:00 a.m. in the Home Demonstration Club Room, Spearman. Tentative dates for the workshop are February 22, 24, 26, March 1, 3, and 5th. Permanent dates will be set at the February 19 meeting, so if you plan to attend the workshop please be present at this meeting.

Problems to be worked on at this workshop are pattern adjustment, laying patterns, putting collars and sleeves, interfacings, making maching and bound button holes and belts. Advanced skills in clothing construction help any seamstress achieve a "wellmade" look.

Any interested homemaker who has had training in basic construction is invited to come to the workshop.

With spring right around the corner, it brings to mind plans for house cleaning to rid the home of drab winter dirt and air.

Of course, in most modern homes, a good cleaning is no longer confined to spring and fall. The smart homemaker divides her energy into the remainer of the year as well. When a good cleaning is needed, take only one room at a time, perhaps just one per week, and do a thorough cleaning of each before beginning another.

Many household items today are washable, which is a boon to the homemaker-such things as drapes, curtains, slip covers, and throw rugs. Some of theseespecially the small rugs, may have foam rubber backing which can be fire hazards if dried in a dryer.

These are best air dried Since the foam may build up heat in the dryer and catch fire if left at a high temperature for a long perliod of time.

If these items are accidentally dried in the dryer, lay them aside to cool away from the rest of the laundry. Otherwise folding and stacking them with other items will hold heat, which may continue to build up in the foam until there are flames from spontaneous combustion. So, be careful in cleaning.

To give sparkle to your treasured glass (or plastic household accessories) which give your home its personality, a good sudsing in soap and water will make all the difference in the world. We don't realize much dirt and grease from the air sticks to furand accessories until we see for ourselves what a difference a good cleaning makes.

Keep these hints in mind for a satisfying and "spring" successful house cleaning. ************

Three-in-one yeast recipes are made to order for the home baker who likes variety. They're also the practical answer to the problem of limited time---three different breads in the same time it takes to prepare a single loaf. The secret is in the dough---in this case, a sweet yeast dough flavored with a hint of orange, which lends itself to easy varia-

The simple addition of raisins, chopped nuts, candied fruit and a few spices turns our dough into savory Spiced Fruit Bread. This is the kind of bread that's invaluable when you're hostessing a luncheon or tea.

A sugar and pecan crumb mixture is so good--it turns our sweet dough into Double-Crumb Coffee cake. The crumb mixture is so good it's used for both the bottom and top of this orangeflavored coffee cake.

Last, but not least, is the simplest variation of all--Frosted Orange Loaf. It's the basic dough baked in a loff plan and topped with orange-flavored icing.

SWEET ORANGE BREADS (makes 3 from 0) 1/2 cup milk

3/4 cup sugar 1 - 1/2 teas poons salt 3/4 cup warm water (105 d.) 3 packages of yeast, active or dry or compressed 4-3/4 cup unsifted flour

3/4 cup Margarine 3 beaten eggs 1 tables poon grated orange

Scald milk; stir in 1/4 cup sugar and salt. Cool to luke warm. Measure warm water into large warm bowl. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast stir until diss-olved. Stir in milk mixture and 2 cups flour. Beat until smooth. Cover. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, "ntil light, about 20 minut-.


fy. When yeast mixture is light, stir and beat in margarine, remaining 1/2 cup sugar, eggs and orange peel with spoon. Stir in remain. ing flour; beat hard, until smooth and some what elastic, about 1 minute. Proceed with one or more variations below. One-third of batter makes 1 loaf. SPICED FRUIT BREAD:

Lightly toss together ½ cup seedless raisins, 1/2 cup chopped pecans, 1/2 cup cup mixed candied fruit, 1/2 teas poon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, and 1/4 teaspoon nut meg. Add to onethird batter and mix well. Turn into well-greased 1-1/2 mold. Cover. Let rise in warm place, about 1 to 11/2 hours. Bake in oven 375 degrees 25 to 30 minutes, or until done. Cool. If desired, sprinkle with powdered sugar.

DOUBLE-CRUMBCOFFEE-

Rub together with fingers until crumbly 1/2 cup unsifted flour, 1/2 cup chopped pecans, 1/3 cup brown sugar (packed). 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) margarine, and 1-1/2 teaspoons cinnamon. Sprinkle 1/2 mixture in the bottom of a greased 8 inch layer cake pan. Turn 1/3 batter over crumb mixture. Top with remaining crumb mixture. Cover. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, about 1 hour. Bake in oven 350 dehrees 25 to 30 minutes. When cool, drizzle with powdered sugar icing. **********

FROSTED ORANGE LOAF: Turn 1/3 of batter into well-greased 9x5x3 inch loaf pan. Cover. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, about 1 hour. Bake in moderate oven 375 degrees 25 to 30 minutes, or until done. Cool and frost with 1 cup

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

Cattle on wheat pasture in Hansford County have been bothered with lice and it costs money to feed cattle lice. These parasites are among the most damaging to beef cattle.

Cattle infested with lice spend a lot of time rubbing against fences, posts, or other objects due to the annoyance caused by the insects. Cattle on feed do not gain as they should and require more feed for a pound of gain when infested.

Infested cows lose weight and their calves become prime targets for the pests. Reduced weaning weights of calves is one spot that really hits the pocketbook hard.

Cattle lice are common over the entire star and their populations build up rapidly after cool weather arrives in the fall, and include both biting and sucking types.

Sucking lice, short and long-nosed, pierce the animals skin and feed by sucking blood. They are usually found on the sides of the animal's neck, on the brisket, back, inner sur-

face of the thighs, tail and around the nose, eyes and ears. Chewing lice are smaller and are usually found on the top of the shoulders and around the root of the tail but may also infest other parts of the body.
