The Alamo

On the sixth of March, 1836, Mexican General Santa Anna committed an error which made certain independence for Texas. Texans had proclaimed a revolution (with an eye on later admission to the United States) and Mexican soldiers were seeking to put down the insurrection. The Mexican Government had a good legal case.

General Santa Anna arrived before the Texas-manned mission, which had been converted into a fort, with several thousand troops. For ten days he bombarded the Texans but failed to breach the fort's walls. During this time, also, thirty-two volunteers arrived to bolster the defenses.

On the 6th, Mexicans attacked in overwhelming force. The Texans and other U.S. defenders turned them back. The Mexicans attacked again and were repulsed

a second time. But Santa Anna persisted. His third wave overran the fort. Only five defenders were taken alive, one of them being David Crockett. Santa Anna ordered them executed.

The cold-blooded order infuriated Texans, and U.S. citizens everywhere. Six weeks later a revenge-minded force of Texans and others met Santa Anna in the battle of San Jacinto, sweeping his forces from the field to the cry of, "Remember the Alamo," and winning independence for Texas.







1986 FARM PROGRAM

Producers may sign up in the 1986 wheat and feed grain program between March 3 and April 11, 1986. Since this is a short sign up period we are going to ask that producers call and set up an appointment to sign up. If we work together this procedure should avoid the long waiting lines we have experienced in the past. We will allow 30 minutes per farm but we expect that if you will know what you are going to do it will only take 15 minutes per farm, and this will give us extra time to figure

Older worker week observed

Focusing attention on the importance of meaningful employment for senior Texans, Governor Mark White proclaim March 9 through 15, as Older Worker Week in Taxes

Older Worker Week is an annual event designed to spotlight the valuable contributions of older Texans as productive members of the State's work force. Representatives of the Senior Community Service Employment Programs, Texas Department on Aging and the Department of Labor joined the Governor in acknowledging that senior workers are among our most important resources.

Senior Community Service Employment Programs employ over 3,000 seniors, 55 years of age or older, who provide needed services to non-profit organizations; such as senior centers, local school districts, public libraries and municipalities.

'Older workers possess unique skills and capabilities acquired through years of experience and hard work", said Joe Rankin, President, Texas Farmers Union, "and we support both private and public efforts to provide older Texans with gainful employment opportunities." Texas Farmers Union sponsors the State's two largest older worker programs, Green Thumb and the Senior Texans Employment Program. Green Thumbers in Hansford County are Dimple Jetton and Floydean Gatiin at Golden Spread Center, Ernest Newcomb and Virgil Floyd at Stationmasters



Recognizing the important contributions of senior workers, Governor Mark White proclaimed March 9-15, as Older Worker Week in Texas. Joining the Governor for the proclamation signing were J. D. Legler, City Manager, LaGrange; Charlie Jungmichel, Mayor, LaGrange; Diane Parrish, Green Thumb Director; Jack Davis, Older Worker Contract Officer, Department of Labor; Jebron Hopper, Texas Department on Aging; Bob Girard, Senior Texans Employment Program Director; Dan Stewart, Texas Department on Aging; Murphy Giles, Green Thumb Enrollee, LaGrange; Joe Rankin, President, Texas Farmers Union; Bert Kruger Smith and David Dennis, representing the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

Personal Income Changes in County

Few figures are more carefully noted by business and government then changes in personal income. Information regarding personal income is considered vitally necessary to future planning of both business and all levels of government. The Department of Commerce defines personal income as the total of all income received by persons from all sources. This includes all wages and salaries, rents, interest, dividends, proprietors' profits, transfer payments from governments, and all other sources of money income received by individuals.

According to figures released by the Department of Commerce, total personal income in the Untied States increased from \$2,735 trillion dollars in 1983 to \$3,020 trillion dollars in 1984 or by 10.4% . Total personal income in Texas increased from \$182.9 billion dollars in 1983 to \$201.0 billion dollars in 1984 or by 9.9% over this same period. The Department of Commerce did not provide detailed personal income data on a local basis for 1983 or 1984, but independent sources indicate that total personal income in Hansford County increased from \$64.8 million dollars in 1983 to \$89.2 million dollars by 1984 or by 6.8%.

Because personal income is measured in dollars, inflation has a major impact upon real personal income. Unless personal income increases at a greater rate than the value of the dollar declines, real personal income decreases. After adjusting for inflation, real total personal income nationally increased by 5.7% from 1983 to 1984. This was the greatest real increase in total national personal income since 1972. Real total personal income in Texas increased by 5.3% during the period while real total personal income in Hansford County increased by an estimated 2.3% from 1983 to 1984.

Per capita or per person personal income also increased during the period. National per capita personal income increased from \$11,690. in 1983 to \$12,789. in 1984 or by 9,4%. Per capita personal income in Texas increased from \$11,590. in 1983 to \$12,572. in 1984 or by 8,5% while per capita personal income in Hansford County increased from \$9,972. in 19£ to \$10,651. in 1984 or by 6.8%.

After adjusting for inflation, real national per capita personal income increased by 4.8% from 1983 to 1984 while real per capita personal income in Texas increased by 3.9% and real per capita personal income in Hansford County increased by 2.3% during the period.

2.3% during the period.

Most Analysts consider disposable personal income figures to be at least as significant as overall

personal income statistics because disposable personal income more accurately reflects the amount of money actually available for consumer spending. Disposable personal income consists of total personal income less personal taxes and certain other non-tax payments. Non-tax payments include government fees, fines and penalties as well as donations and fees paid to government operated entities such as hospitals and schools. Disposable personal inincome nationally increased from \$2.332 trillion in 1983 to \$2.586 trillion in 1984 or by 10.9%. Disposable personal income in Texas increased from \$156.9 billion in 1983 to \$173.0 billion in 1984 or by 10.3%. Disposable personal income in Hansford County increased from \$55.7 million in 1983 to \$59.5 million in 1984 or by 6.8%.

After adjusting for inflation, real disposable personal income nationally increased by 6.2% while real disposable personal income in Texas increased by 5.6% during the period. Real disposable personal income in Hansford County increased by 2.3% after inflation is taken into consideration.

Nationally, per capita disposable personal income increased from \$9,968. in 1983 to \$10,951. in 1984 or by 9.9% Per capita disposable income in Texas increased from \$9,941. to \$10,818. or by 8.8% during the period while per capita disposable personal income in Hansford County increased from \$8,575. in 1983 to \$9,158. by 1984 or by 6.8%.


After adjusting for inflation, real national per capita disposable personal income increased by 5.2% from 1983 to 1984. Comparable figures for Texas showed an increase of 4.3% during the period while real per capita disposable income in Hansford County increased by 2.3% after inflation is taken into

It is clear that real and substantial increases occurred nationally in both total and per capita personal income from 1983 to 1984. Increases in personal income in Texas were slightly less pronounced during the period. Total and per capita personal income in Hansford County increased less than personal income in Texas or the nation as a whole.

TECAT UPDATE

Test dates have been scheduled for individuals who are not currently employed in public education, but who want to have continued certification to remain eligible to teach in Texas schools after June 30, 1986.

The first four test dates -- April 12, June 28, July 12 and October 4 -- are part of a statewide program to continue certification of all holders of valid Texas teacher certificates. Because only a limited number of individuals can be accommodated during each of the examination sessions, assignments to test sites will be filled on a first-come, first-served basis.

March 1 is the deadline for registering to take the April 12 Texas Examination of Current Administrators and Teachers (TECAT) test.

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We welcome your patronage

Some 210,000 teachers and administrators who are currently employed in public schools will take the TECAT on March 10.

State education administrators estimate that another 300,000 individuals throughout the state hold valid teacher certificates, but are not working in public schools this school year.

Following the March 10 administration, test sessions will be open to all individuals holding Texas teacher certificates issued prior to February 1, 1986.

The tests will be administered at 125 sites across the state. Most test sites will be within 75 miles of an individual's residence.

A \$30 fee for the test will be charged, covering registration materials and the official study guide. Registration packets include information about the test, a registration form and TECAT study guide, and may be obtained at any public school district personnel office or at any of the state's 20 regional education service centers. Individuals must be registered to take the exam.

Beginning in 1987, the TECAT will be administered in February, June and October, for individuals who do not take the test this year.
