

Bush brought forth all the important issues of the day and left little doubt of how he stood on each.



We feel that Gordon McLendon, though beaten badly, hurt Yarborough and that many people voted against the Old Scotchman", rather than for Yarborough.

Bush brought up one subject that we questioned. That was the controversial prayer in school issue. Like Wes Izzard and many others he spoke as though our school children had been denied the right to pray at school and that prayer of any type was banned from our schools.

After reading the instructions sent to schools in Texas, we interpreted the ruling a little different. To our knowledge it doesn't say anywhere that prayer is forbidden in school, but that the state or federal government is forbidden to dictate a prayer.

Maybe there is more to the ruling than we have read, but it would be a sad situation if the state could senda prayer to Gruver High School and force everyone to recite it. How the prayer was worded would likely depend on who was in power at Austin at the time. *****

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


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

One of the quite outstanding honors which has been bestowed upon Euline is being on the Dean's Honor List throughout his four years of college. He has maintained an extra high average through the years.


