McKnight community in Donley McK night community in Donley
County in 1920. He finished High County in 1920. He finished High School locally and Ir. College in Carechaon Tx. After deciding on
watchming es his profesion he attended Bradley Horolgy Instituion in Peoria, Ill., one of the oldest watchmaking schools in the United States.

Hs early career began as a watch maker for Zales in Pampe
and Amarillo. He later opened his first bussiness with a close friend in Fort Worth. Due to the illness of his partner the bussiness was
soon terminated. His seconed soon terminated. His seconed
bussiness began in Bob Queeners variety store in Memphis, Tx. in 1947. Later, with the Northern Puilt refinerys and gas plants, he made his move to Sunray.

Looking back with fond memor ies to the one bench placed in the
back of Pat Hills drug store, he back of Pat Hills drug store, he remembers the store not only
being only the drugstore but his jewelry corner, Justice of the Peace, local coffee shop and Drug store was the gathering place for hot coffee, good conver sation, and relaxing around a old black pot bellied stove.

In In 1955 J.C. married Faye their family, one son. Elbre he has acquired his own building now, which also served as their home. The bussiness soon began prospering.
J.C. built the Hickersons first
Jewelry store building in Jewelry store building in 1963. I served as a jewelry store on one side as a restaurant, "Tasty Kitchens"'.
He became quite diversified in He became quite diversified in
his ambitions. He owned the local ice house, which served ice to the railroad and Shamrock plant, he ran a snowcone shop in the
summers, he also sold 45 lp summers, he also sold 45 lp
records and the latest Hi Tech 8 Track Tapes. He tried many ways
in making a honest living in Sunray, after 20 years, the Hicker Spearman offered many things Spearman offered many three times the size of Sunray.
