Call Moose, Deer Pests, So Many in North Woods

St. Paul, Minn.-Moose and deer so thick and so tame that they are a nuisance to his reconnaissance crew, were seen by A. E. Pimpley, state chief of fire suppression, while on a six weeks' stay in the Canadian border country of Minnesota.

"We saw scores of moose and signs of many more," said Mr. Pimpley. "If anyone thinks the king of the forest is fading in Minnesota, he should visit this part of the big woods. The deer were running in groups as high as ten. Both moose and deer were very tame."

The expedition was conducted by the forestry service to obtain data on state-owned timber.

Notes were made on locations for lake shore homesites and tourist camps and the conditions were studied from a fire hazard angle. The crew worked in the territory about twenty-five miles north of Grand

Rarefied Air Used for Killing Moths

Washington .- Mountain climbers and aviators are familiar enough with the disabling and even deadly effect of rarefled air, but it has remained for scientists to utilize thin air in beneficial ways.

E. A. Back and R. T. Cotton of the Department of Agricul-ture have first reported on the work they and others have done in using rarefled air to kill insects in stored articles subject to their depredations. They have found that moths and other insects inside a locked trunk may be killed by exposure for a few days to atmosphere from onefifth to one-thirtieth of normal.

A trunk was placed in a vault from which almost ail the air was exhausted and after two days all the moths were found to have been killed and a few days longer exposure killed other insects.

The method is said to be more effective than fumigation.

Sail to Hunt Pygmy Tribes With Airplane

Batavia, Java, - The expedition headed by Prof. Matthew W. Stirling of Berkeley, Cal., sailed recently or the government steamer Fomalhous for Sourabaya to explore the unknown interior of Dutch New Guinea.

"All the members of the expedition are in good health and ready for hardships," said Professor Stirling just before the steamer cast off. "I have the utmost confidence in our plane's motor to fly and keep flying over the jungles and mountains.

"If pygmy tribes are in New Guines we will find them," declared Stanley A. Hedberg, historian of the expedi "Pilot Hoyt. Mechanic Hame and Reserve Pilot and Photographe Peck are sure our plane will not fall us and will do all we expect."

The Dutch members of the party Dr. Van Lemwen, biologist, and Leroux, cartographer, also expressed confidence. They were most enthusiastic and declared that the expedition would not come back before it found pygmies.

Thickest Bed of Coal From 60 to 100 Feet

Washington.—The thickest bed of coal in the United States, according to the United States geological survey, is Local Surgeon T. & P. Railroad Co. a bed of sub-bituminous coal near Gillette, Wyo., which ranges in thickness from 60 to 100 feet of solid coal. Such phenomenally thick beds of coal are generally of limited areal extent, so that other even thicker beds, it is stated, may lie concealed in areas not yet prospected.

VIRGINIA OPENS TREASURE HUNT

State Ready With \$500,000 to Redeem Missing Old-Time Bonds.

Richmond, Va .- There is a treasure chest of more than half a million dollers in gold, or rather in gold bonds, in this country, and there is no reason why those who are devoting their energies to chasing the will-o'-the-wisp of fortune should not dig down into old trunks and other receptacles of family papers and find out if they are entitled to share in this large sum

Those who are entitled to participate in this chest of gold will not have to employ attorneys to prosecute their claims, nor will they have to make examination of genealogical rec ords. If they find a decument bearing the title "West Virginia Corfficate" the chances are 1,000 to 1 that by pre senting this certificate to Rosewell Page, second auditor of the commonwealth of Virginia, they will receive in return West Virginia 3½ per cent gold bonds, bearing coupons from January 1, 1919.

Mr. Page says that there are outstanding, unclaimed, more than \$500,-000 of these certificates, the redemption of which was provided for in the Virginia-West Virginia debt settle-

Treasure Hunt Advised.

The certificates bear dates of 1871. 1879, 1882 and 1892. Because they were of little value at one time their owners do not realize that today they are so much gold.

An opportunity for the people to indulge in a veritable treasure-hunt game is here furnished. The bonds to redeem these certificates have been They await only the reception of the documents to be issued in exchange.

The history of this transaction discloses the successful effort of a state to redeem its credit. Before the secesof West Virginia from Virginia at the opening of the war between the states, the mother state had issued bonds and owed approximately \$35, 000,000, covering money expended for navigation companies, plank road companies, turnpike companies, bridge companies, state roads, railroad companies and state defense. Virginia claimed that West Virginia should pay a third of this debt, as that secof the old state had received a third of the benefits of the bonds is-West Virginia denied the

State Redeeming Credit.

For a long time the bonds went unpald, and the debt with interest went to \$45,000,000. Finally, on the dates already mentioned, Virginia passed a series of refunding acts, and gave to the old bondholders Virginia bonds for two-thirds of the amounts due them. In addition she gave them, for the remaining one-third, certificates stating that West Virginia owed them the re-maining third. These are the "West Virginia Certificates."

West Virginia laughed at the idea of Virginia issuing "West Virginia Certificates." Of such little value were these certificates considered that many of them were sold for 10 cents per hundred and less. Finally, for the benefit of the bond and certificate holders, Virginia sued West Virginia, and in decisions rendered by the Su-preme court of the United States on March 6, 1911, and June 14, 1915, Virginia was awarded judgment against West Virginia for \$12,393,929.50 with interest at 5 per cent from July 1,

West Virginia settled the debt and interest in 1919, paying \$1,062,867.16 in cash and \$13,500,000 in gold bonds. Of these bonds \$1,133,500 were held "in escrow" by West Virginia to pay certificates that had not been presented. More than \$500,000 of this sum has not yet been claimed.

as the Hurri, and the translation of the tablets was expected by the savants attending the meeting to add a new page to ancient history.

"This race," said Doctor Speiser, "had a law against the direct sale of land. However, much as they tried to legislate against the growth of a cap-Italistic class, the effort failed. Land owners adopted those whose land they wished to obtain. As a result huge land tracts were under one family's jurisdiction. A man had a perfect right to kill his slaves, suffering no consequences whatever.

The tablets, the translation of which has just been completed, cover a period of five generations in one family.

Report of the discovery of two burial tablets, tending to bear out the traditional story of the burial of the bodies of Peter and Paul by Orientals on the Appian Way, near Rome, as related in the apocryphal writings.

was made by Prof. Romaine Newbold. The tablets, he said, bearing Aramaic inscriptions, were found in the Church of San Sebastian, on the Via Appla, about three miles from Rome They are declared to be the first inscriptions in Aramaic found in Italy. and prove, he believes, there were Orientals in Italy during the First

century of the Christian era. Excavators found the tablets buried 30 feet deep. Translation revealed that they were placed there by an Oriental slave woman named Pecora. who buried her master and mistress there and who erected the tablets as

grave markers. The master and mistress of this slave, Professor Newbold believes, were early Christians of the so-called Gnostle sect which tried to gain control of the Roman church.

Professor Newbold said the earliest date on which the burial of Peter and Paul by Orientals is recorded is around 258 A. D. and that the tradition has been accepted by the Roman Catholic church. Latin inscriptions invoking the blessings of Peter and Paul by the earlier Christians of the Third and Fourth centuries have been found frequently. None of them, however, attests to the presence of Orien-
