

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE PAST TO THE PRESENT

It's time again to venture into the history of Hansford County as Highlights from the Past to the Present brings another family from the past into the focus light to reacquaintthem with the readers. This week our story centers on the Barnes Family.

The spotlight begins on the J.F. Barnes family. They had four sons, Albert, Jim, Pete and John. The family lived in Iowa before moving to Boyd County Nebraska. In 1901 the Bames family moved by covered wagon to three miles north and three east of Cushing Oklahoma. Another family made the trip with them. For their travel and move the two families came in four wagons and a buggy and traveled for six weeks before they arrived at their destination.

In Oklahoma the family farmed raising cotton until 1906. They then shipped their belongings by two imigrant cars to lamar, Colorado where they homesteaded some twenty three miles south of Lamar.

After remaining in Colorado the Barnes family made their move to Hansford County in 1906 bringing everything by wagon, including machinery, well drill, household good and furniture. They settled on the Sergeant place on the Cold Water north of where Gruyer is now located. They remained here until they fences their land and dug a half dugout for their home, they moved to a neighboring section which cornered with the Maddox place.

Until their Water well was dug the family carried water from the Maddox place where Ben Harris now lives. Soon after their move the men began breaking ground for their crops. They bought a steam engine in about 1909 to aid with their farming.

Later the family ordered a threshing machine which came through Guymon and they did custom threshing for areas south, east and west of Guymon. In 1910 they plowed sod from Lucern to Oslo and threshed in the R.D. Tomlinson Community. Farming also for themselves, the family broke sod and threshed in the area east of Old Hansford to Old Ochlltree in 1911.

Water well drilling was also a business interest which the family had, for they drilled many wells in Hansford County as well as the surrounding areas. Also the men freighted to Texhoma during the winter.

Pete recalls the snow of 1912 remembering how it remained on the ground for such a long time. Also he recalls how the county paid bounty for jack rabbit pelts as well as for pairs of rabbit ears. At that time Lee Mc-Clellan was county clerk and Pete often wonders if He didn't make soup from them.

Mr. J.F. Barnes bought an Emerson gas tractor in Amarillo which had big wheels higher than a person's head. To get the tractor home it had to be driven overland through Dumas on a four day trip. They spent the first night on the Canadian River breaks for they were the first to cross the Canadian River bridge. Because of the size of the tractor they were required to call Amarillo to see that the tractor was not too heavy to cross the bridge. Pete recalls how the coyotes howled half of the night and summed up that the coyotes didn't like them. Their second night was spent in Dumas, for at that time the town had a windmill and water tanks for city water, wagon yard, blacksmith shop and the Phillips General Store.

In March 1918 Pete entered the service of World War I where went to San Antonio to camp along with Clarence Winder. Pete later volunteered for overseas service with the 90th division and 315 Supply Train. He served in the Army of Occupation in Germany and at St. Mehiel and Meuse-Argonne Offensive and in the Puvenelle Sector of France. On June 24th 1919 Pete returned home to find that his parents had traded and sold out moving back to Arkansas.

Pete went back to farming and bought the land from Bum Tomlinson which had already been planted with wheat some two miles north of where Gruver is. Carrying on with his well drilling, Pete remained quite busy. In 1920 Pete drilled the water well for Mr. Will Harris. J.C. was a young boy at the time and drove the team of horses which made up the power for the drill. Pete recalls having to wake J.C. up several times inorder to keep the well drilling in progress. Since the well is still pumpingwater Pete has been accused of hauling a lot of water to fill the hole.

While drilling a well in the Coldwater draw, Pete used the form of a sun dial to tell the time of day for he had no watch. He took an alarm clock and drove stakes into the ground each hour and from there he could tell from day to day the time by the shado, w on the ground.

On February 26, 1933 Pete Barnes and Deana Barlow were married in Perryton. Deana was the daughter of H.C.

Barlow and was one of nine children. Two of her sisters make their home in Gruver, Mrs. Guy Cooper and Mrs. Guy Gruver. The other children live in Perryton and are Vertie Copel and, Mary Dietrich and Robert, Harry, Alex and Leonard Barlow.

Deana was born December 6, 1895 in Boonville Missouri. She moved with her parents in 1907 to Ochiltree County. The family came from Missouri to Glazier and by "mail hack" across the country to their home north of Perryton. They later returned to Missouri but came back to Texas in 1916 to make their home.

Ottstanding was one of the Christmas experiences recalled by the Barlow family. Looked forward to by the whole country community, the Christmas programs included Santa Clause giving toys to the youngsters. Usually just before Christmas some of the boys in the family would go down to the breaks some 20 miles away and find a tree to be decorated. One Christmas a snowstorm beat the holiday and the snow was so deep that they were unable to get a tree. One practical neighbor suggested, decorating a ladder. So an eight foot ladder was leaned against the wall and decorated with strings of cranberries. Gifts were hung on the rungs of the ladder. The children agreed it was the nicest tree they had ever had. Another tradition carried out in the family was each Christmas eve the "Night Before Christmas" would be read to the children by their mother ..

After Pete and Deana's marriage they moved to Arkansas where they put in one crop of cotton and corn. but decided they didn't like the country and moved back to Perryton in the fall. Once in Ochiltree county they rented a place north Perryton to where they began farm-ing raising one of the first crops of cotton in 1923. In 1924 they made another move which brought them back to Hansford County to the Prevo place in the fall of 1934.



George Dietrich and Pete bought a John Deer tractor in 1927 and George Dietrich moved to the Selsor Place east of the present Ben Harris place. The two men farmed together until Pete and Deana bought another farm in the wast side of the county in 1930. Dry weather and the cheap wheat market made them sell to A.P. Borger. They then bought land in the west corner of Sherman County they have farmed since 1935. They have made their home one half mile west of Gruver since 1943.

One incident remembered just after Pete and Deana's marriage was when they made a trip to Guymon on a hot dusty day and went to the drugstore to get a cold coke. the waiter asked if they wanted the cokes frosted and they decided they did, not realizing it cost 20¢ more. When they were ready to pay neither of them hal enough change and they had to write a check, realizing hey were spending their last dollarin the bank.

Pete and Deana attended the Grand Plains school for church before Gruver began and moved their membership to Gruver when the Methodist Church began in the newly established town.

Deana passed away July 12, 1963 following several years of illness. The couple have both been outstanding assets to the town of Gruver as well as to Hansford County. They both enjoyed fun and it was not uncommon to See Deana dressed in halloween fashion of Halloween night going from door to door "trick or treating" or riding down main street on Christmas morning dressed as Santa ringing her bells and wishing everyone a Mery Christmas

Good neighbors and friends to everyone, Deana and Pete are outstanding pioneers to Hansford County. They have struggled through the good and lear years with their radiance being an inspiration to everyone.
