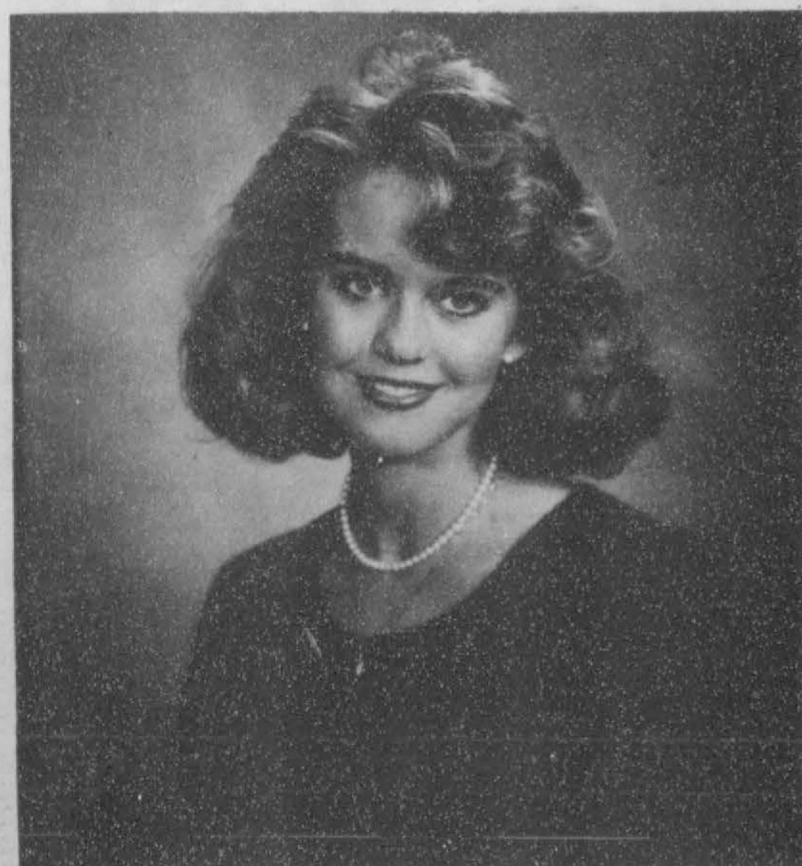

## Karen's Kozy Korner

Putting some method into Christmas shopping madness can make it a more enjoyable holiday season.

People often think that planning for Christmas shopping means you get it all done in August. But you can benefit from advance planning whether you have three months or three hours to complete the task.

Write down the name of each person you intend to give a gift to, and noting a maximum and minimum amounts to be sure that the total is within your budget and that you have some left over for flexibility.

Next to each person's name, list several appropriate gifts within the price range you specified.

Group the possible gift items into categories that will allow you to shop for similar items in the same store and to go from one store to the next without having to back-track.

Finally, check the advertisements to see if the items you want to buy are on sale before heading for the stores.

When you actually start shopping, stick to your list. And as you make selections, check to see if

the item can be returned, especially if you buy it on sale.

Keep the sales receipts. One method is to use a letter size envelope for each gift receiver. Write the person's name on the envelope and place the receipts and tags from their gifts in that envelope.

If you have more than one item on a sales receipt, write what the receipt represents on the back and keep it in a special envelope. Having the receipts will help with returns if necessary.

Having a plan can make the whole process of Christmas shopping easier and give you more time to enjoy other holiday activities.

The three titles we have received for this month (to be rotated each month) are: **CABBAGES AND KINGS**, 17 min. Color. Primary age. This film is based on the Grimm Brothers' fairy tale "Konig Drosselbart," and is the story of a very vain and silly princess who rejected and ridiculed every suitor...until her father said that she would marry the first beggar to appear at the castle. The very next day the princess is married to a young beggar who later turns out to be King Ludwig, one of her rejected suitors.

**THE SORCERER'S APPRENTICE**, 14 min. Color. Primary age. A sorcerer won't teach his apprentice any magic so the boy secretly watches the sorcerer at work. When he tries to use the magic he thinks he has learned things go awry and the sorcerer must come to his rescue.

## Santa Crossed Unsafe Toys

Before Santa comes to town this holiday season, the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness (TSPB) Amarillo Branch hopes he will have crossed unsafe toys off the request lists children from Texas have sent him.

According to the Society, last year an estimated 5,035 children were treated in hospital emergency rooms for toy-related eye injuries. More than 80 percent of them were under age 15.

"Toy injuries can be prevented," says Gwen Frazee, President of the Amarillo Branch of TSPB. "However, the gifts that Santa—and parents—leave under the tree this holiday should be carefully selected."

The Society recommends that before making purchases, buyers inspect the toy and consider if it is appropriate for the child and his or her maturity level. "Toys purchased for one child often find their way into the hands of younger, less adept children," Mrs. Frazee says. "This can be especially hazardous."

The Society also suggests that shoppers keep a lookout for these potential hazards:

--Check toys for any sharp, exposed edges, points, nails, screws and pins.

--Avoid projectile items, such as

guns that shoot darts or cork.

--Examine dolls, stuffed animals and other cuddly toys for rigid interior frames that can poke through outside coverings.

--Check for loose parts that can become unattached, exposing sharp metal or plastic.

--Avoid toys that can shatter.

The Society is especially concerned that parents and friends continue to purchase projectile non-toys for children. These include air and spring operated guns, slingshots, bows and arrows and darts. Last year, these items resulted in approximately 3,600 people suffering eye injuries that required hospital emergency room treatment.

"This year, keep the holiday spirits happy by only giving safe gifts and toys," says Mrs. Frazee.

For further information on year-round children's eye safety, write for a copy of the Society's free brochure, "Play It Safe," to: Prevent Blindness—P.O. Box 7602, Amarillo, TX 79114.

Founded in 1908, the National Society to Prevent Blindness is the oldest voluntary health agency nationally engaged in preventing blindness through a comprehensive program of community services, public and professional education and research.

If you are interested in information about domestic violence, child abuse, rape, molestation, legal resources, etc., the Panhandle Crisis Center has an excellent library for you. Books must be checked out on your signature. But a number of free pamphlets are well displayed so you can see them easily and make your selection. They are all attractive and readily understood. Even if you don't intend using them yourself, come look them over so you can be better informed.

By now you are aware that the Panhandle Crisis Center helps victims of domestic violence. Another service it offers is to victims of rape.

What everyone should realize is that rape is not a sex act per se. That is, it is not brought on by "unwise" dress or behavior. Rape is an act of rage or deep-seated anger and resentment. Often it is planned in advance. Sometimes it is well thought out and progresses through several stages, beginning with what looks like normal dating. Most rapes are perpetrated by persons who know the victim.

But there is the "opportunist" who takes advantage of an unexpected victim who happens to cross his path and is alone and/or

helpless at the moment.

What to do if you are raped. As soon as possible, report the rape to the police and/or the Panhandle Crisis Center (435-5008). Even if you do not want to prosecute, your information may be helpful in arresting a suspect that some other victim does want to prosecute. REMEMBER: Do NOT bathe or shower or douche. Do NOT urinate or defecate. Do NOT change clothes. Do NOT straighten up or re-arrange anything at the scene. This way, you can be sure of not destroying valuable evidence.

It is important to get a medical examination as soon as possible. If you call the Panhandle Crisis Center, a volunteer will go with you to the hospital if you so desire, to help you get through the process and reassure your friends and/or family, if you wish to inform them. The examination is not only to tend whatever injuries you may have suffered, but to collect evidence, whether or not you wish to prosecute.

Panhandle Crisis Center Report - 2

The Panhandle Crisis Center will help you cope with the shock you have been through, and will help you to speed your recovery period.

THIS IS IMPORTANT, for many persons have come to our attention in our short time of service, who are still suffering from the mental torment of having been victimized perhaps years ago.

If you are one of those whose victimization was in the past, join the support group led by the Director of the PCC. You may not only find yourself helped, but may be of strong help to someone else. Thus you can turn your disaster into a benefit for others.

## Mrs. Reagan accepted invitation

New York, N.Y., Nov. 13—Mrs. Nancy Reagan has accepted an invitation by CARE to serve as Honorary Chairperson for the organization's 40th anniversary in 1986, it was announced today by Wallace J. Campbell, a founder and President of CARE.

In accepting her role to mark CARE's founding, the First Lady said: "It is a great pleasure for me to help lead CARE's 40th anniversary celebration. To many people the organization's name calls to mind the famous CARE packages which victims of World War II received from concerned Americans; to much of the world's population, born since 1946, care continues to be an organization offering technical assistance, education, and training to developing countries."

CARE's anniversary begins on May 11, exactly 40 years after the first CARE packages were delivered to Le Havre, France to help survivors of World War II rebuild a ravaged Europe.

According to Mr. Campbell, the theme for the 40th anniversary is "Forth Years of Caring." The focus of the commemorative year is to create greater awareness of CARE's many roles in helping less-developed countries through emergency aid and long-range development programs, and to thank the many Americans who make CARE's work possible.

CARE's work was recently cited by President Reagan, who presented the organization with the Presidential Word Without Hunger Award for 1985 in a ceremony in Washington, D.C.

Mr. Campbell explained that "a highlight of the 40th anniversary celebration will be a CARE anniversary ball in Washington, D.C. on May 9, 1986. The event will be attended by members of congress, cabinet members, the diplomatic corps, and other government and international officials.

# "Back to the Basics"

Texas' education reform movement features a "back to the basics" curriculum, but two educators wonder if the reform effort will produce brighter and more creative students, a state teacher association magazine reports this month.

In the November/December issue of ATPE NEWS, official publication of the 42,000 member Association of Texas Professional Educators, Dr. Richard Sutch of the Austin Independent School District and Dean C. Corrigan of Texas A&M University cast doubts on whether the Texas school reform movement will produce students with the creativity, critical thinking, and problem solving skills America will need in the year 2000 and beyond.

Sutch, coordinator of fine arts for the AISD, says that Texas schools are doing nothing more than repackaging existing courses and requiring students to take more subjects.

"Unfortunately, many in this movement are missing the real issue," Sutch says. "They are looking at a return to the basics and an increase in credits required for graduation." He says a different kind of restructuring is necessary to prepare students for the future.

"Schools cannot be restructured for the information age merely by repackaging the old basics and requiring more of the same course," Sutch explains. "Any real restructuring must be much more fundamental. It must address what young people need to learn and how schools need to instill the ability to learn."

In a recent newspaper article, Corrigan, dean of the College of Education at Texas A&M, wrote that the reform movement places too much emphasis on improving scores on standardized tests, and that such an emphasis might force low-achieving students to drop out of schools.

"One of the most frightening aspects of the current emphasis on testing is that the push for high test scores may become a device for weeding students out of the school system," Corrigan wrote. "The worst thing that could happen is that in five years the average SAT score or state-mandated score increases and we learn the reason for the increase is that the 20 percent of students who needed help the most were pushed out of school."

Corrigan also warns that Texas'

use of test scores to identify slow or fast learners often is the "kiss of death" for many students.

"Studies show that once a child is tested and then placed in a group called 'slow learners,' there is almost never movement up," Corrigan wrote. "It is side ways, down to another group, or out of school entirely. Tests are used as an excuse to justify why the child did not learn rather than a way to diagnose the child's learning needs and design appropriate curriculum and teaching strategies."

In other stories, ATPE NEWS explores Reading is Fundamental, a project which seeks to combat the problem of illiteracy by making reading a fun activity for young people. The magazine also reports on how no-pass, no-play has affected Texas high school football teams, and provides educators with tips on conducting successful student science fairs.

### EGGNOG MOUSSE

Makes 4 servings, each providing: 1 Milk Exchange; 45 calories Optional Exchange

- 1 teaspoon unflavored gelatin
- 2 cups skim milk, divided
- 2 envelopes (two 4-ounce servings each) reduced-calorie custard mix
- 1 teaspoon each brandy and rum extracts
- 2 egg whites (from large eggs)
- Dash salt
- 1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon granulated sugar
- 1/4 cup thawed frozen dairy whipped topping
- Ground nutmeg

In small bowl sprinkle gelatin over 2 tablespoons skim milk; let stand a few minutes to soften. In 1-quart saucepan heat remaining milk to a simmer; stir in gelatin mixture and custard mix and cook, stirring constantly, until custard and gelatin are dissolved, about 2 minutes. Stir in extracts and pour into medium bowl; refrigerate stirring occasionally, until mixture begins to set, 30 to 45 minutes.

In mixing bowl, using electric mixer on high speed, beat egg whites with salt until soft peaks form; gradually beat in sugar, beating until whites are stiff but not dry. Carefully fold whites into custard mixture; spoon custard into 4 sherbet glasses. Cover and refrigerate until chilled, about 2 hours. To serve, top each portion with 1 tablespoon whipped topping and dash nutmeg.

### FENNEL CASSEROLE

Makes 4 servings, each providing: 3-3/4 Vegetable Exchanges; 1 Fat Exchange; 15 calories Optional Exchange

- 1 tablespoon olive or vegetable oil
- 1 1/2 pounds fennel, cut into 3x1/2-inch strips (about 4 cups)
- 2 cups sliced onions (thin strips)
- 1 to 2 small garlic cloves, minced
- 1 1/2 cups canned Italian tomatoes (with liquid), drain and coarsely chop tomatoes, reserving liquid
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh Italian (flat-leaf) parsley
- 1/4 teaspoon each salt and pepper
- 1 tablespoon each plain dried bread crumbs and grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon margarine, melted
- 1/4 teaspoon grated lemon peel
- Garnish: chopped fresh parsley

In 12-inch nonstick skillet heat oil over high heat; add fennel, onions, and garlic and saute, stirring occasionally, until fennel is tender-crisp. Stir in tomatoes, reserved liquid, parsley, salt, and pepper and cook until heated, 1 to 2 minutes; remove from heat and transfer to 1 1/2-quart flameproof casserole. In small bowl combine remaining ingredients; sprinkle crumb mixture evenly over vegetables and broil until topping is browned, about 1 minute. Serve garnished with parsley.

### ENDIVE AND ARUGULA SALAD

Makes 4 servings, each providing: 2 Vegetable Exchanges; 1 Fat Exchange

- 4 medium Belgian endives
- 2 cups arugula leaves
- 2 tablespoons rice vinegar
- 1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 1/2 teaspoon Dijon-style mustard
- Dash each salt and pepper

Trim root end of each endive; wash endives well in cold water and drain. Separate each endive into individual leaves. Line a serving plate with 3/4 of the endive leaves, facing tips of leaves toward rim of plate like flower petals. Set aside one arugula leaf for garnish; fill center of plate with arugula leaves; top with remaining endive leaves and garnish with reserved arugula leaf. In small bowl, or jar with light-fitting cover combine vinegar, oil, mustard, salt, and pepper; mix or shake well. Pour dressing over greens and serve.

## Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

A reception was held and during this time, Ayers was interviewed over channel 5. Ayers now makes his home in Irving with wife Cathy and two sons Scott Glen two years old and Trevor Austin who is 6 weeks old. Glen was reared in the Spearman Area and his parents, Flavil and Josephine Ayers now reside in Gruver.

In observance of Veteran's Day in 1973, Cpt. Ayers wrote a letter to the People of Spearman, which was also published in the Faith Independent of Faith, South Dakota the residence of his parents at that time. Since Veterans Day was observed about 3 weeks ago and Thanksgiving just last week, the editor of the Gruver Statesman would like to reprint this letter that was written over 12 years ago.

Dear People of Spearman. This letter is a letter of appreciation to a town called Spearman and the people who live there.

I have been in Viet Nam eight months now and I will be very glad to get back home. Every once in awhile, a fellow Marine asks me where I am from. I tell him. Of course he asks me where that is, which makes me a little mad, but I am proud of my little home town with its one little stop light, which seems to be the pulsating heart of a happy town.

A town floating in a sea of wheat with a proud banner called an elevator. It is a town far from killing and hunger. It only seems to have to worry about the next wheat harvest.

I hope my little town never has to run to a foxhole everytime the fire whistle blows. The most important thing I don't want the people of Spearman to experience is the cold, weak terrifying feeling a human gets when bullets are buzzing all around him or mortar rounds are walking toward the foxhole he is in.

There is one particular group in my town I would really like to say something about. They are called Veterans. I know there are many in our town alone. Chances are they are solid citizens in the community and very glad to be a part of the town. Chances are they appreciate life very much and are doing a lot to help the town.

When I first came to Viet Nam, there was a sign over my bed. It read "to live you almost die, to those who fight for it, life has a savior the protected will never know." To you as Veterans you know exactly what those words mean. To you who are not Veterans, go find a veteran and shake his hand. You can bet he will appreciate it and the fact he is able to shake your hand.

In conclusion I must say something about the men who have given their lives to Spearman. They are monuments now, an inseparable part of Spearman. A monument along with Spearman. A monument along with the elevators and the wheatfields. They are truly Spearmanites and will never be loyal to another town and truly will be remembered as long as Spearman wants to remember them.

### Nursing Cap



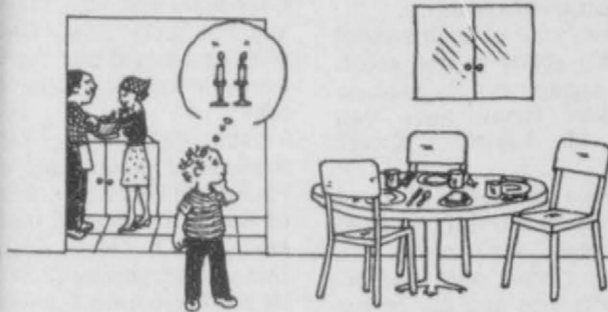

### How It Happened

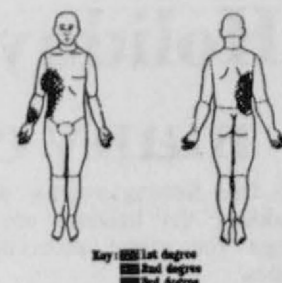
On Tuesday, Sam decided to surprise his wife Sally by making dinner for her birthday.

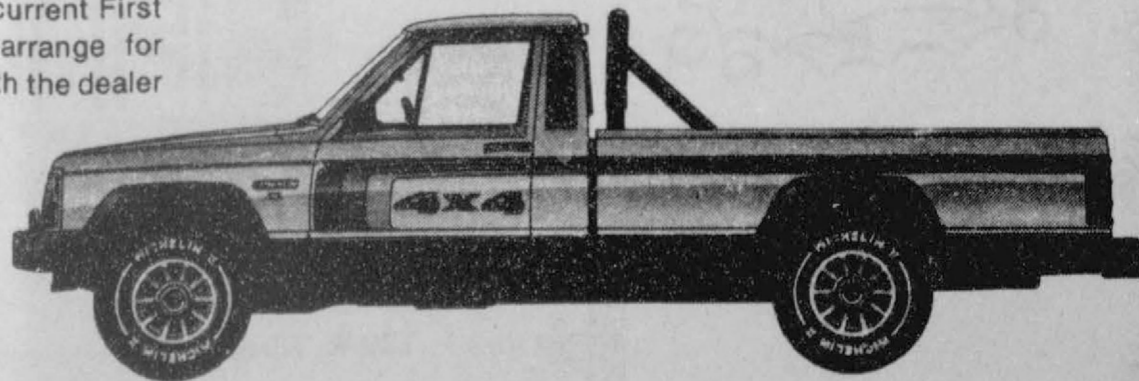

# Holidays present many challenges

With free flowing eggnog and hot toddies, the holidays are a challenge for many recovering alcoholics.

But they are especially difficult for those experiencing their first sober Christmas as others freely imbibe and lively television ads promise an especially jolly season with Brand X Beer.

"There's often a sense of dread about the holidays among the newly recovering," says Kay Kropff, Program Manager at Palo Duro Hospital Care Unit of Canyon, Texas.

"On one hand they remember the Christmas spoiled by alcohol. Yet, on the other hand they have trouble envisioning the holidays without it. All they know is that the season was always a license to drink," she says.

But with the proper attitude and support of family members, the recovering person's anxiety can be replaced by tranquility, Kropff says.

She explains that the newly sober person's fears are usually based on hazy, unpleasant memories of previous holiday season.

"They remember falling drunk into the Christmas tree and the disastrous holiday dinners that turned into family feuds," she explains.

Kropff says many also found Christmas a depressing time when their flaws as parents and spouses were particularly apparent.

"They wonder, 'Is that depression going to come back,'" she says.

Many recovering people wonder how they'll cope with holiday party-hopping without alcohol.

Kropff adds that the newly sober may also have to contend with the party host who's offended by the refusal of his double martinis and the co-worker who playfully spikes the office party punch.

"That first Christmas can be scary when all you know is what has happened before," Kropff says.

She adds that the Christmas season is also difficult for the recovery alcoholic's family.

They have a lot of doubts about the person's ability to stay sober. They're saying to themselves, 'How many times have you promised this before,' "Kropff says.

"They also feel awkward about whether they should drink in front of them or not," she explains.

However, Kropff says, the recovering alcoholic and his or her family can do several things to ensure that person's sobriety during the holidays.

"Stay close to recovering people," she says. "A lot of people think Alcoholics Anonymous is just meeting after meeting. But A.A. has lots of social gatherings and home parties around the holidays."

She says that one should also anticipate uncomfortable situations -- such as parties where alcohol may flow freely -- and develop strategies for dealing with them.

Most important, Kropff says, the recovering person should learn to say no to a drink without feeling compelled to explain.

She says the family should attend Al Anon or other support group meetings.

"A lot of people feel they're dealing with a total stranger because they've never seen the person any way but drunk around the holidays.

"The family needs to talk about that uneasiness and ask the recovering person what is and isn't comfortable with them," she says.

"Basically, both the recovering person and family have to plan one day at a time."

"Activities should be low-key and family-oriented, she adds.

Kropff says that recovering alcoholics usually realize that "the holiday can be fun with out falling in the Christmas tree."

"But most of all, they're grateful they don't have to get caught up in the madness again," she says.

# Experiments on the effects of weightlessness

LOUISVILLE, KY.--A student experiment to study the effects of weightlessness on chicken embryos will fly on the space shuttle Challenger Jan. 22, and its sponsor, Kentucky Fried Chicken, is offering a lesson plan for teachers, available free by calling 1-800-532-5767.

John Vellinger, a sophomore mechanical engineering major at Panhandle University, has designed and built a special incubator to cradle the 32 fertile chicken eggs that will accompany Challenger on its six-day journey through space.

The plan explains how basic principles of physics were used to build the incubator and control all the variables of incubation except weightlessness. With slight modification, it can be used for students ranging from fourth grade through secondary school.

Another educational event aboard the Challenger will be live "lessons from space" beamed down by the first teacher to fly on a space shuttle, Christa McAuliffe of Concord, New Hampshire.

The lessons will be carried over 80 to 90 school systems that have satellite dishes. Some cable channels and Public Broadcasting Service stations are also planning to carry the lessons, offering another tie-in opportunity for teachers.

Vellinger's experiment will compare chicks incubated under zero-gravity conditions with chicks incubated under identical conditions on earth.

"This can help us determine if other animals, and even humans, can reproduce in a weightless environment," he explains.

Vellinger, a 1983 national winner of the Shuttle Student Involvement Program sponsored by NASA and the National Science Teachers Association, first entered the competition as a ninth-grader. Twice he was a regional winner, and each time he refined the experiment and entered again, winning a national spot the third time.

The incubator he has designed to fit into one of his shuttle's lockers

has a system of springs and shock absorbers as well as temperature and humidity controls to protect the embryos.

Chicken eggs were selected for the experiment because of their relatively rapid development which is well-suited to the length of the mission.


During the mission, Vellinger will be turning the earthbound eggs to simulate the movement of the hen in the nest. The hen's movement corrects the effect of gravity, which causes the yolk to settle to the bottom of the egg.

"Since there's no gravity in space, the yolk will be suspended inside the egg," he explains, "which may make a difference in the way the chick develops."

"My hypothesis is that without gravity dragging the yolk down, the embryo will develop more efficiently, producing a bigger or better developed chicken."


Vellinger adds, "It takes 21 days for an egg to hatch. But the embryo's main development comes in the first 11 days. If differences occur, it's going to be during that time."




