

FUNERAL SERVICES HELD FOR RONNIE RILEY

Funeral services were held Monday March 15, 1965 in the Gruver Church of Christ for Ronnie Riley.

Ronnie died Saturday night March 13 from injuries resulting from a car wreck Friday night. He died in

North West Hospital in Amarillo. Ronald Wayne Riley was born February 10, 1944 in Gainesville, Texas, to the couple of Roy and Joette Riley. When a small child he accompanied his parents to Gruver where they made their home. Ronnie began school in Gruver and graduated in 1962 from Gruver High School. An active participant in sports, he played both on the Greyhound football team and Basketball team and the track team. He sang throughout his high school years with a boy's quartet. He was a member of the Gruver Church of Christ.

Upon graduation Ronnie married Donna Sue Cluck on July 12, 1962. The couple made their home in Gruver for a short while and then moved to near Logan, New Mexico where they ranched. In the latter part of 1964 Ronnie completed Insurance School at Waco.

He then returned and the couple moved to Hereford where they lived until their move to Stratford where Ronnie was also associated with the Farm Bu-

reau Insurance. Brother Elmer Adcock minister of the Church of Christ of Kress, Texas officiated with the services. A mixed choir provided the music for the services. They sang "It is Well With My Soul", "Going Down The Valley" and "What A Friend".

Many of the contestants sold their cakes at the bake sale on Friday during the livestock show.


Entry prizes were furnished for each contestant by Mr. and Mrs. John Bishop of the Spearman Hardware. The prizes this year were sets of measuring cups.

COUNTY STOCK SHOW A SUCCESS

The Hansford County Livestock Show was held in Gruver Friday March 12th at the barns of T. C. Harvey and Dean Cluck. The show was predicted to be "dust free" and that it was as a slow rain lasted throughout the day. Total received by 4-H and FFA members was \$21,723.08 for 103 animals sold.

Dee Green, last year's reserve champion winner, took the Grand Champion of the light-weight division cattle. His calf was a 694 pound registered Hereford he also held the first place of the light weight division. Reserve Grand Champion honors with a heavy weight black Aberdeen Angus calf went to Alva Henderson of Morse. His calf weighed 776 pounds and also took first place in the heavy weight division.

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

The filing for the Gruver School Board closed March 3rd as seven names will appear on the ballot of April 3rd.




Tommy Gumfory with his third place Heavy-Weight Calf.
