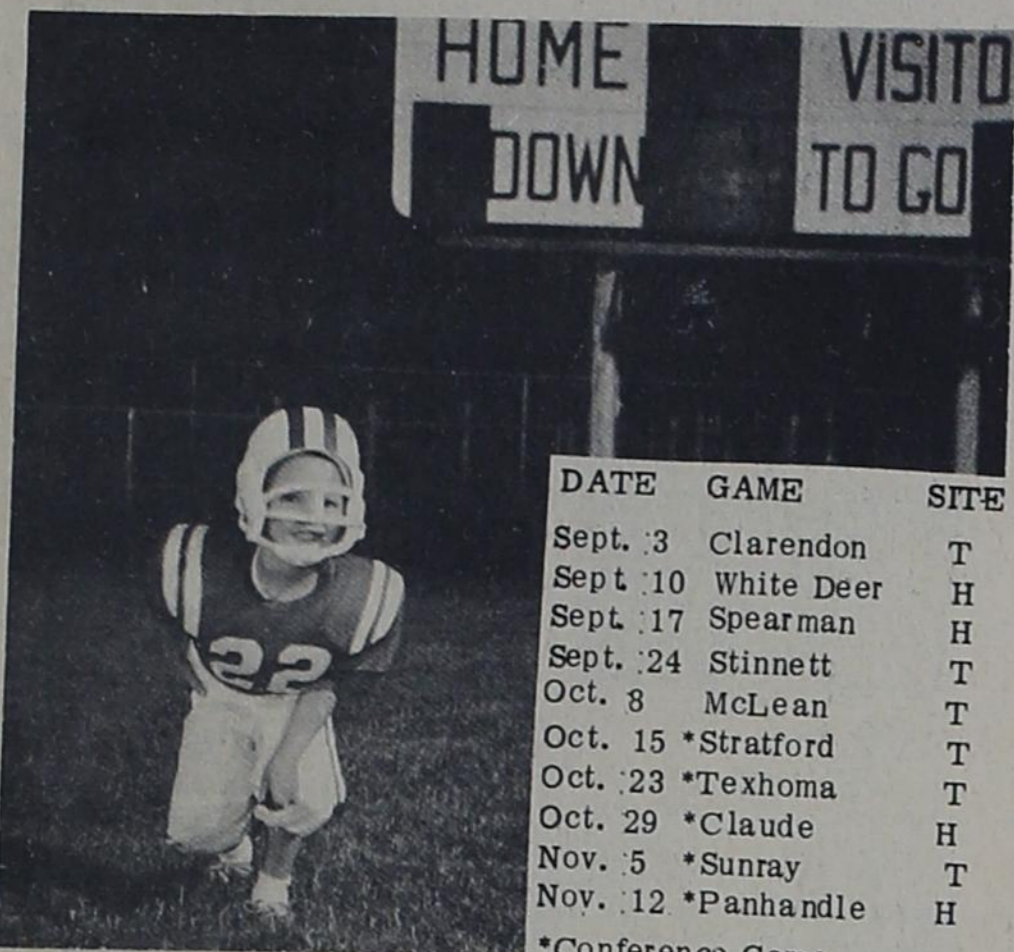

Other returning lettermen are Jim Nobles, tackle Steve Butts, guard; and Dave Cluck, tackle.

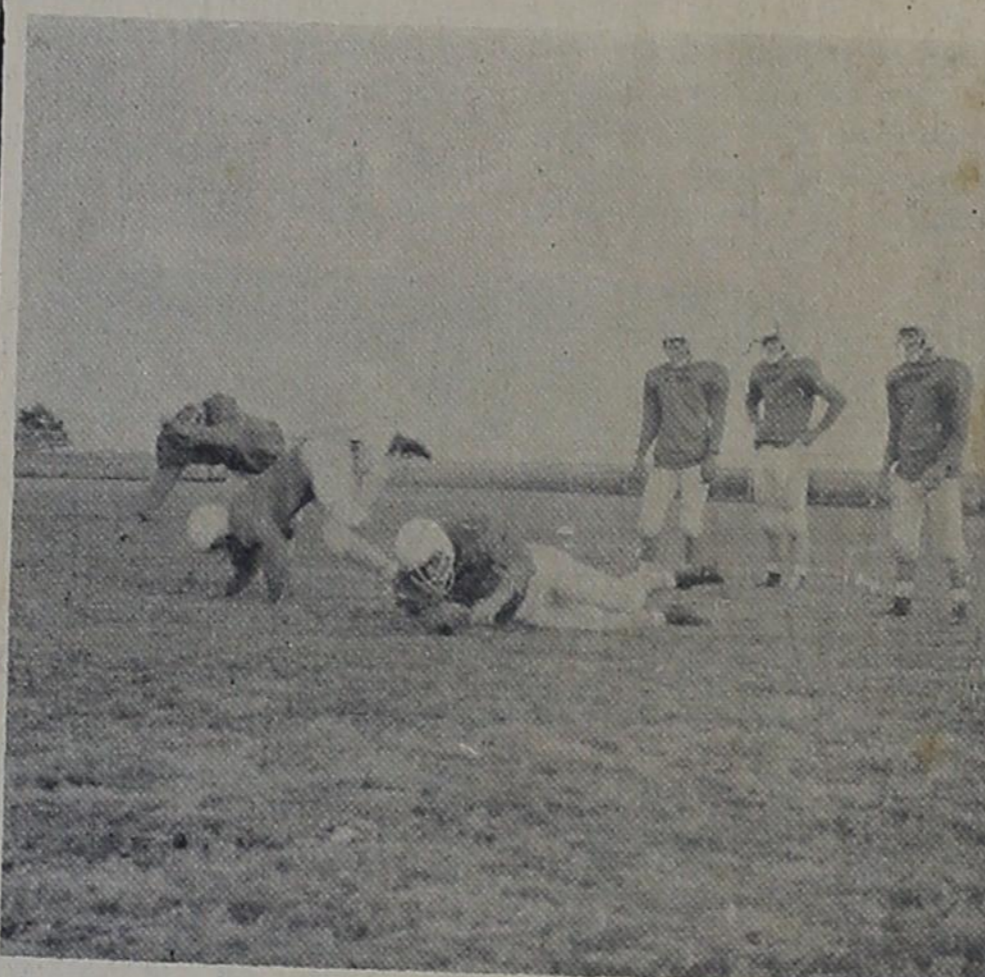

SCHOOL DAYS END VACATION DAZE

8:30 A. M. Monday, August 30th looms as D Day for students and faculty of the Gruver School District with classes in all buildings set for that time according to Gruver School officials.

Registration for all High School students, even though they may have registered last Spring, has been set for August 24, 25, 26 from 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 P.M. to 4:00 P.M. each day. Locker assignments will be made, books checked out, and any needed changes made in schedules. New High School students should bring book cards, report cards, etc. from last school attended.

Junior High School students will register Thursday, 26 August from 8:30 AM-12:00 and from 1:00 PM-4:00 PM. Students out of town on this date will be enrolled on Monday, 30 August.

Elementary School students will start enrolling at 8:30 A.M. Monday, August 30th, according to Elementary Principal Turner Hoy. A list of students will be posted on the door of each classroom.

Beginners will enroll and then go home for the rest of the day. Do not plan to leave them at school. Parents will present shot records and birth certificates to the 1st Grade teachers. To start school in Texas, a child must be six years old on or before 1 September 1965. A child who is six on 2 September 1965 will not be able to go to school until next year.

Lunchroom Manager. Lunches for Grade School students are \$7.00 per month and milk is 60¢. Daily lunches cost 35¢. Lunch tickets for Junior High, High School students, and adults are \$8.00 per month with daily lunches, 40¢.

GRUVER POSTMASTER MARKS 30 YEARS

From penny postcard to zip codes; from dusty trails to paved roads! from 1935 to 1965—thirty years of service as Postmaster for Gruver is the outstanding record for Blanche Taber on August 26th with an extra two and one half years served earlier thrown in for good measure.

It was on October 19, 1927, that Postmaster Blanche Taber, then Miss Blanche Jones, stepped into the Townsite office which had been moved to Gruver site in 1927 from Signal Hill near what is now the town of Borger and located at the 'intersection' of Dusty Trail South and equally Dusty Trail East (located approximately across the street from the present Shamrock Station) to begin her duties as the first Postmaster for Gruver.

The only other building within binocular distance at that time was the Cooper ranch home where the Corky Chapman's now live. Blanche roomed (a cot folded up during the day to make room for business) and boarded with Townsite Manager Will Turner (uncle of Mrs. Dan Shrader) and his son, Marshall, and his wife.

Enjoying the glimpses of the 'outside world' while tending the 30 or 40 boxes, dreaming of the time Gruver would attain a city status with paved streets, city blocks, and lovely new homes, Blanche received a recompense for her labors of all of the money received from selling stamps—for that is how her salary was based in the 'good old days'!

Water for the townsite office and 'home' was hauled from the Cooper's well hauled in barrels fixed on runners. An Amarillo quartet of Amarillo business men, A. P. Borger, A. S. Stinnett, and Williams, and Mr. Adams, an engineer with the Rock Island Railroad comprised the Townsite.

They bought and laid out all the townsites from Amarillo to Liberal along the Rock Island right-of-way which they had obtained previously from landowners. Marshall Turner and Lucile were working the Townsite Company at the time of the opening of the Gruver postoffice and Mr. Will Turner was the manager who did all of the laying out of the town. He was joined by Ed Hudson of Sarcoxi, father of Don Hudson, who arrived to help him. Mr. Borger made frequent visits in his chauffeured Cadillac—highlighting life for the 'townspeople'. The first filling station (not horse trough, that is) was built and run by E. C. Greene of Spearman.

More High School Faculty members are Eddie Gipson, Drivers Ed, Football Assistant Coach, and Basketball; Mrs. Pauline O'Keefe, Homemaking; Neal Flathers, Voc Ag; Mrs. Orveda Chisum, English and Library; Mrs. Jeanne Williams, English and Library.

Also on the High School Faculty are Mr. Bonnell Riley, Speech and English; Jim Chockley, Biology and General Science; Mrs. Nancy Barber, High School Secretary; Mrs. George Stone, School Business Manager and Tax collector; High School Principal, Clyde Barber; School Superintendent W. H. Willoughby.

The first mail carrier was an uncle of W. A. Bratton and the second to see that the mail went through come heat or high water was none other than former Gruverite, Curt Lowe.

First postoffice in Hansford County was located at Zulu, and was officially opened on December 29, 1880, with Robert Cator, one of the three Cator brothers from England, named as the first postmaster in the County. In 1887, James H. McGee was named postmaster for Hansford on August 22nd, and on May 2, 1881, Robert Rosenthal was named the postmaster for Farwell, located on the site of the W. E. Maupin ranch.

Other postmasters officially designated in the late 1880s were Addie L. Bayne, Appleton, December 2, 1887; Ballard P. Ward, Waverian, February 17, 1888; Ada Ward (Mrs. Gus Ward, aunt of Mrs. James and Mrs. Gordon Stedje, (Old Hansford, 8 October 1897 James H. McGee, Hansford, August 22, 1887; James H. Wright, great uncle of Butel Hale, Hansford, 16 May 1888; Melvin B. Wright, grandfather of Mr. Hale's, Hanford, 28th September 1889.

The first postmaster named to the Spearman post on May 17, 1917, was Mattie Maize, followed by Mrs. Clay (Hazel) Gibney; for Hitchland, the first postmaster was Myrtle L. McComas, named 1 July 1930, for Morse, Ruth Etta Powers, named on 1 November 1929; and named on 5 December 1925 was Lura Spivey for

Record which was discontinued on April 30th and moved to Gruver.

Following Postmaster Taber at the Gruver Postoffice was Mrs. A. W. (Josie Hart) Evans who served from May 28, 1929 until March 2, 1931, to be followed by William T. McRee who was assisted by Mrs. Ernest Spivey, Mrs. Bob Brooks, and Mrs. Lola (Ayles) Baskin. Postmaster Blanche was re-appointed on August 26, 1935 and has served faithfully for yet these thirty years.

The second postoffice for Gruver was a little wooden building located east of Panhandle Lumber Company, which had been constructed originally for the WPA to process meats for the area and later remodeled to accommodate the Postoffice.

The third location was at the present site of the Hale Pharmacy, next to the theater, with the personnel and equipment making still another move to the Kelly Garrett Building next to the Cafe at the south end of Main Street where the

Postoffice held business as usual in one half of the building while the other half was occupied by a beauty shop.

The last move was into a new building built by the Gruver Masonic Order and dedicated in 1950 with the first floor converted to a social first floor converted to a social air-conditioned modern day dispensary of stamps, parcel post, mail, and friendly smiles from Postmaster Blanche and her assistants, Mrs. Mattie Layton, Mrs. Roy (Wilma) Byrd, and Mrs. Ed (Doris) Pinkerton.

Blanche stayed with the W. N. Fletchers at the back of their grocery store which they opened in 1928 where Heath's Grocery is now located. Her family further facilitated her entree into the business world with a Model-A Ford in which she commuted from the Jones ranch to town. Friends of Postmaster Taber are legion and many is the kind deed she has found time to do for all of the patrons of the Gruver Postoffice through the years and still continues to dispense friendliness along with the standard operating procedure.

Many have been the Gruver area residents who have assisted Blanche during the years, first of whom was Mrs. B. W. (Velma) Renner who worked in 1928, followed by Mrs. Harold (Margaret Gross) Orman now of Borger who served two years and Mrs. Day (Cuma Ayres) Reese, now of Dalhart.

Also dispensing friendliness with postal money orders have been Mrs. Gene

(Josephine Gross) Fletcher; Mrs. Charles (Geraldine) Parks now of Canyon; Mrs. Arnold (Juanita Wallin) Bayless; Mrs. Bob (Sis Hays) Stayton; Mrs. Lola (Ayles) Baskin, Mrs. Otho (Hazel) Brooks; Luella Browder Fox of Dennison, sister of Mrs. Elsa Mae Peady; and Mrs. Jack (Mary Alice) and Mrs. Jack (Mary Alice Hays) Thomas.

Many have been the changes in Gruver—in the Gruver Postoffice which started as a 4th Class Postoffice and is now officially rated as 2nd Class—in the complexion of Gruver town which started as a one-building townsite and is now rated as a 1st class city of the Texas Panhandle—during the past score and ten years but all for the better with Postmaster (Jones) Taber to be lauded for her 30 years of service with the Gruver Postoffice.

We are certain her motto must be 'The mail must go through—preferably with a 'Gruver' postmark on it!



One Score and Ten Years Later—Postmaster Blanche Jones Taber With Asistant Mattie Layton, Gruver Postoffice

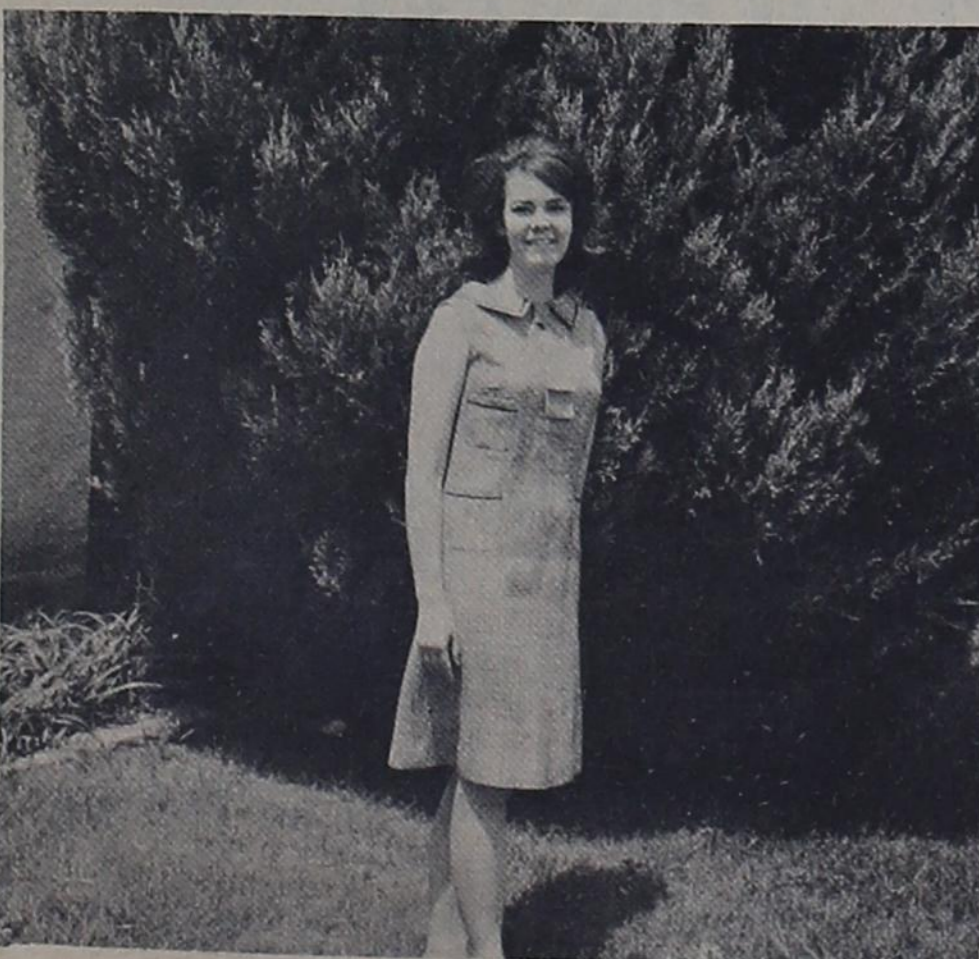

Wahoo, Senior Walleyes Zip-coded
Austin, Aug.--Man the ram-parts against those raging walleyes. Marion Toole, coordinator for inland fisheries for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department just hopes the tales roaring down from the northland will apply to the spunky game fish introduced in three large Texas lakes.

Toole specifically referred to the latest report on ramifications of the milky-eyed fish famed for its predatory ways, eating qualities and sporting traits, when trying to outduel a fisherman. An official North Dakota Game and Fish Department paper noted that a walleye tagged at Lake Ashtabula, north of Valley City in April 1964, was caught about 650 miles away in Lake Winnipeg, Manitoba.

The North Dakota agency said the three-pound, three-ounce prize caught in a commercial gill net, had made its way over at least 25 dams as it traveled from Lake Ashtabula down the Sheyenne River to the Red River and then north into Canada.

It was a record tour for a walleye tagged in North Dakota. Toole observed that it would take some overland antics for the new stock of walleyes to get around like that in Texas. However, the recent stocking of walleyes was made at Lake Meredith in the

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing Amendments to Section 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, and certain statutory state officers; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Section 22, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the state in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the state in which the state may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the state, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Section 23, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified; until his successor is qualified, receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the state during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

Sec. 5. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be construed so as to extend the term of office of any officeholder previously elected to a two-year term.

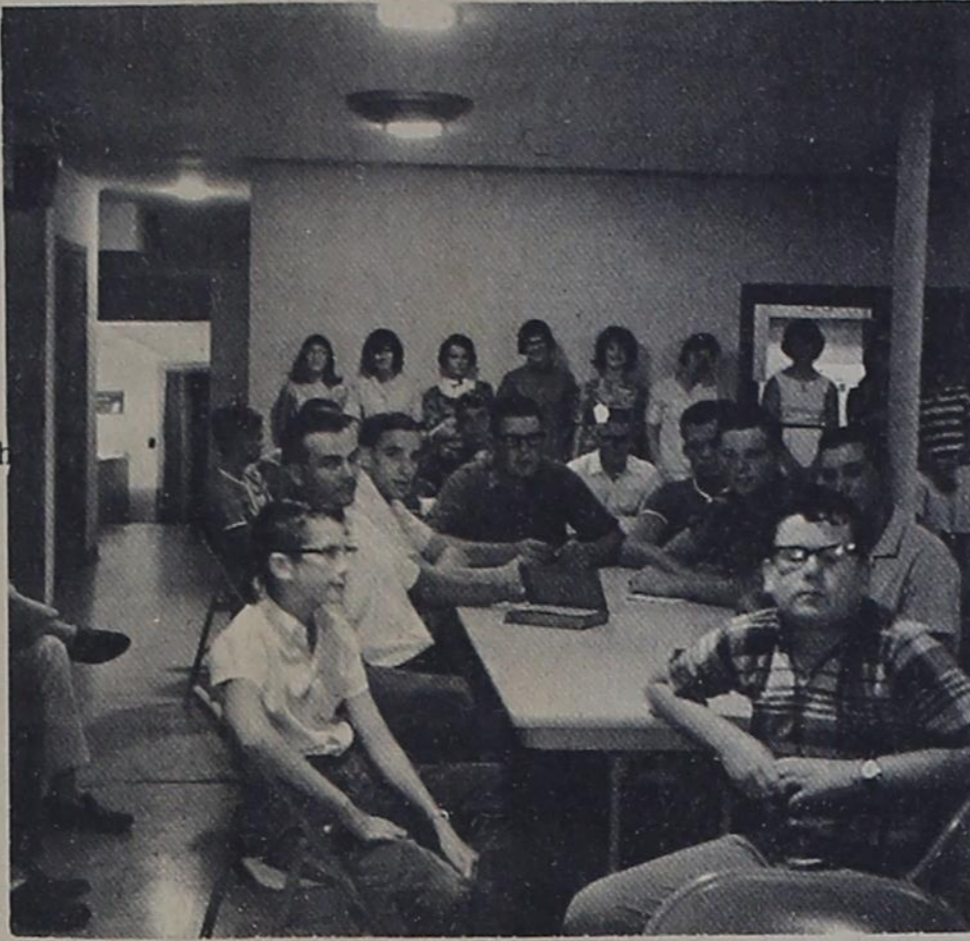

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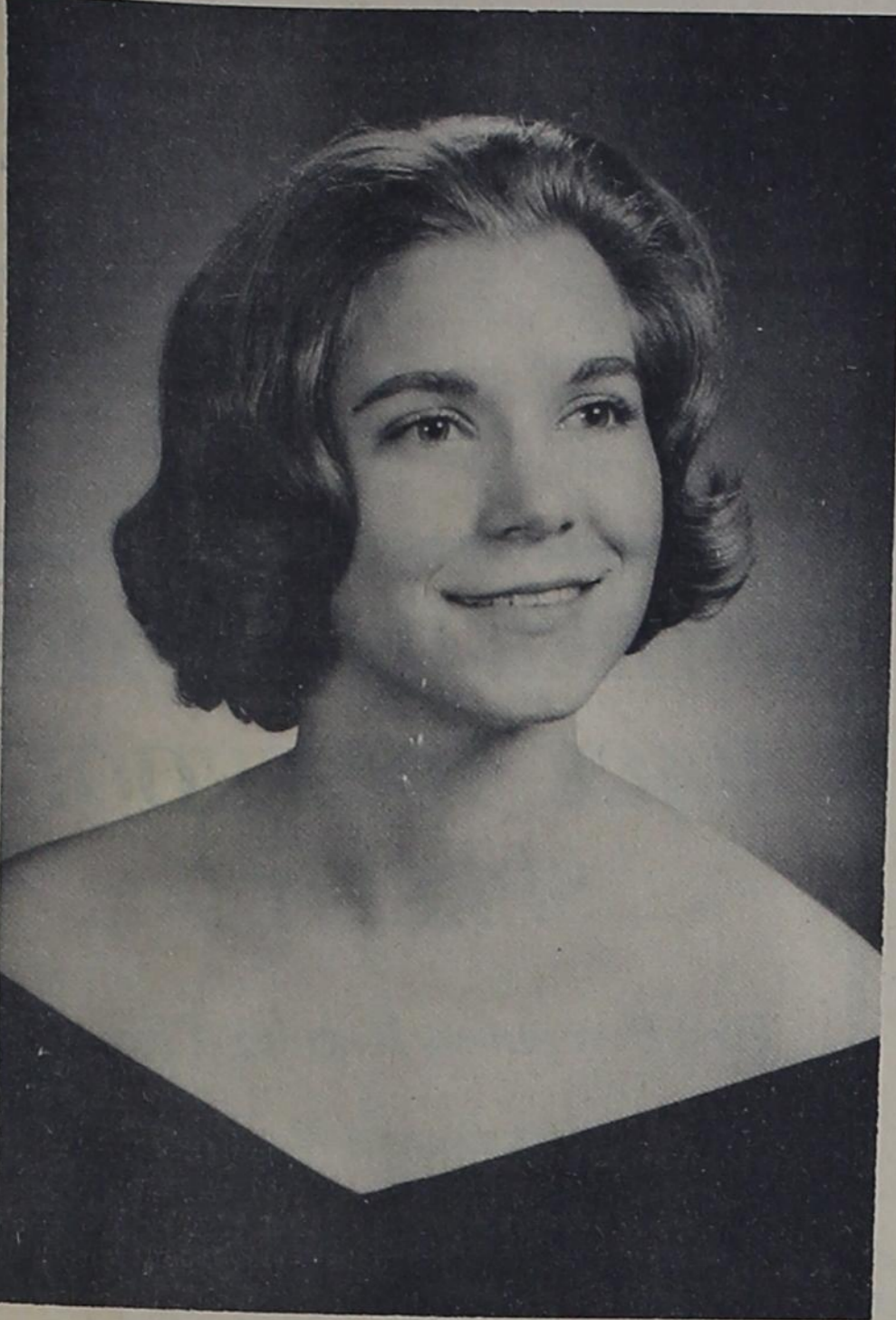

I looked at this small insect with my magnifying glass and compared it with the sorghum midge specimen I had and decided it was not the sorghum midge. If you find any insect that you need to find out what it is bring it in. If I cannot identify it, I will send it off for identification.

LITHIUM SALT OF 2,4-D
The Release of Lithate, a lithium salt of 2,4-D has raised questions concerning the use of this non-volatile form of 2,4-D. The material is non-volatile as advertised. It is 2,4-D and subject to state and federal regulations concerning the use of hormone herbicides. The volatility of 2,4-D amines is also very limited. Most instances of crop injury

from them is the result of drift from the sprayer rather than volatility. Spray of lithate will also drift, therefore, users are urged to observe the same precautions concerning spraying in windy weather, sprayer, pressure and nozzle tip size that have become standard practice for 2,4-D.

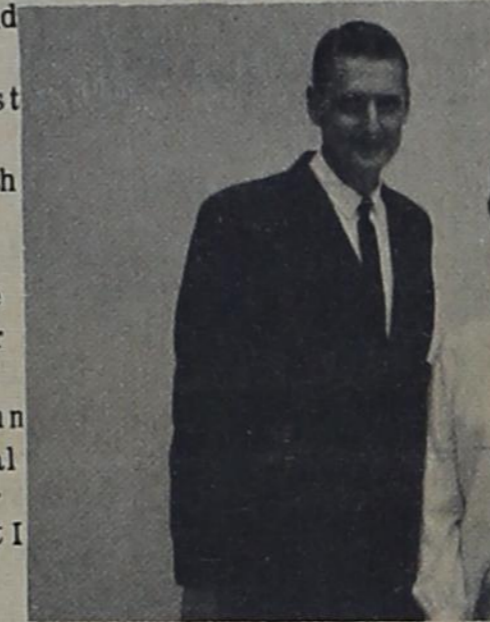
WEEDS ON INCREASE

In a recent survey of the 10 most common weeds on the experiment station now and in 1948, the Montana Experiment Station found that the list had changed completely. Not a single weed appears on both lists.

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Section 17, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning; providing for allocation of funds therefor; authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes and the pledging of allotted funds for the payment of same; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 17 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven Cents (7c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article III, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the continuing payments as provided under Section 51, Article III, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund as provided in Section 51b, Article III, of the Constitution.

"Also, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Ten Cents (10c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning provided that none of the proceeds of this tax shall be used for auxiliary enterprises; and the governing board of each such institution of higher learning is hereby authorized to pledge all any part of said funds allocated to such institution as

hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed four per cent (4%) per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise in not more than ten (10) years; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty Cents (30c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"The following state institutions then in existence shall be eligible to receive funds raised from said Ten Cent (10c) tax levy for the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, and for the succeeding ten-year period:

Arlington State College at Arlington
Texas Technological College at Lubbock
North Texas State University at Denton
Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont
Texas College of Arts and Industries at Kingsville
Texas Woman's University at Denton
Texas Southern University at Houston
Midwestern University at Wichita Falls
University of Houston at Houston
Pan American College at Edinburg
East Texas State College at Commerce
Sam Houston State Teachers College at Huntsville
Southwest Texas State College at San Marcos
West Texas State University at Canyon

Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches
Sul Ross State College at Alpine
Angelo State College at San Angelo.

"Eighty-five per cent (85%) of such funds shall be allocated by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas on June 1, 1966, and fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds shall be allocated by said Comptroller on June 1, 1972, based on the following determinations:

"(1) Ninety per cent (90%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to state institutions based on projected enrollment increases published by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System for fall 1966 to fall 1978.

"(2) Ten per cent (10%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966 shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on the number of additional square feet needed in educational and general facilities by such eligible state institution to meet the average square feet per full time equivalent student of all state senior institutions (currently numbering twenty-two).

"(3) All of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on determinations used in the June 1, 1966, allocations except that the allocations of fifty per cent (50%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on projected enrollment increases for fall 1972 to fall 1978, and fifty per cent (50%) of such funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on the need for additional square feet of educational and general facilities.

"Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall reallocate eighty-five per cent (85%) of the funds to be derived from said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period and not later than June first of the sixth year of each succeeding ten-year period said Comptroller shall reallocate fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds to the eligible state institutions then in existence based on determinations for the said ten-year period that are similar to the determinations used in allocating funds during the two-year period beginning January 1, 1966, except that enrollment projections for succeeding ten-year periods will be from the fall semester of the first year to the fall

semester of the tenth year. All such designated institutions of higher learning shall not thereafter receive any general revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Ten Cent (10c) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue Funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this Amendment, and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. This Amendment shall be self-enacting. It shall become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede and repeal the former provisions of this Section; provided further, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any state institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this Amendment but such notes or bonds shall be paid, both as to principal and interest, from the fund as allocated to any such institution.

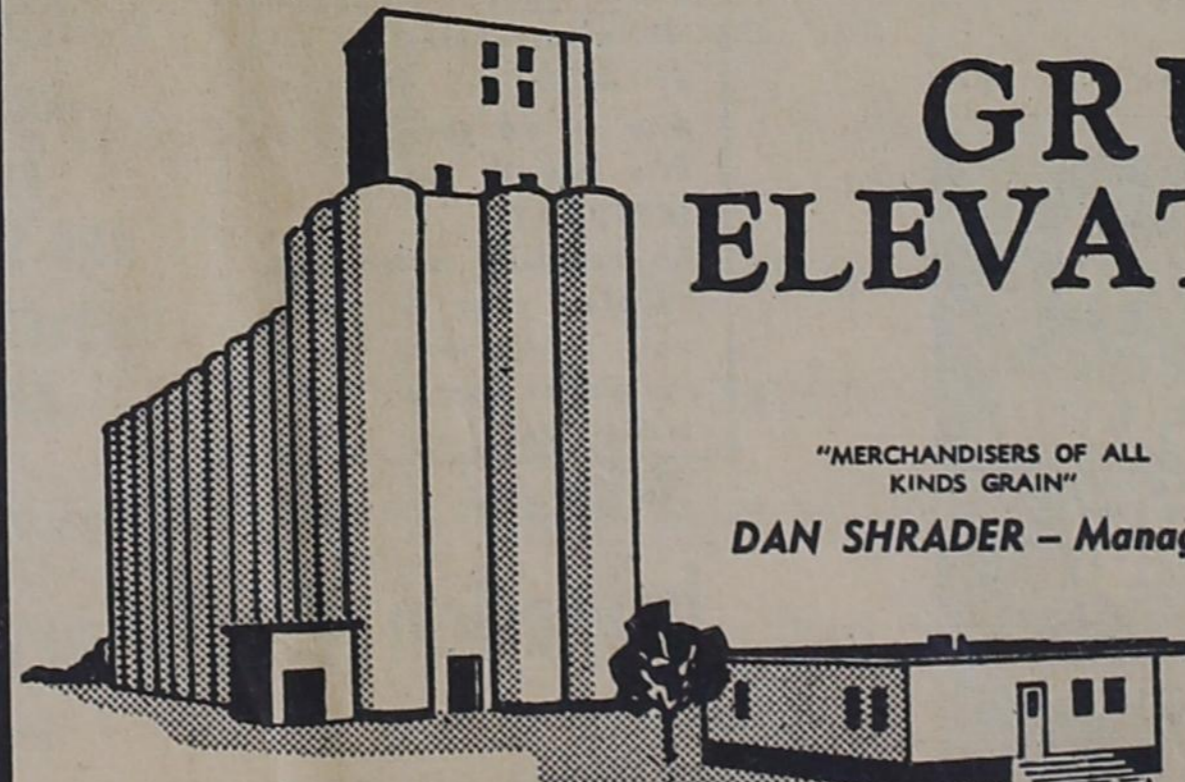
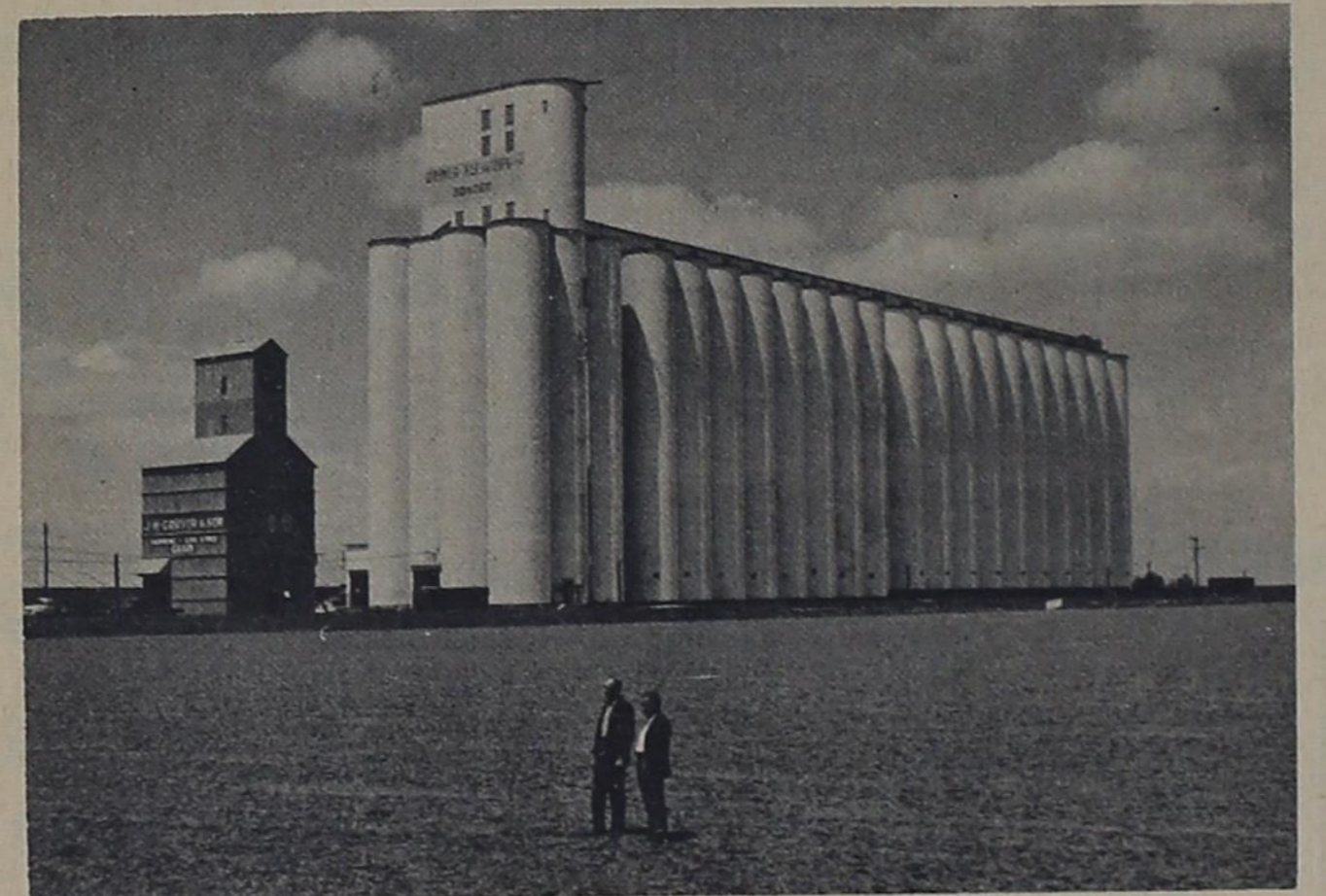
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an Amendment to Section 24, Article III and Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to allow an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and increasing the per diem allowance of Members of the Legisla- ture. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature. All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the one hundred and forty (140) days of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This Amend-

ment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the General Appropria- tions Bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1967, for the salaries of the Lieuten- ant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation. "In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of Government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances pre- pared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or here- after to be established; no Member to be entitled to mile- age for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Ses- sion." Sec. 2. That Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Gov- ernor, the Lieutenant Govern- or should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be unable to serve; or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Gov- ernment until he shall be suc- ceeded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall, while he acts as President of the Senate, receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature and the same mileage which shall be al- lowed to the Members of the Senate, and no more; and dur-

The President, for the time being, of the Senate, shall, during the time he administers the Government, receive in like manner the same compensa- tion, which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office." Sec. 3. The foregoing Con- stitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives and allowing a per diem for Members of the Legislature not to exceed Twenty Dol- lars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Session and 30 days of each Special Session." "AGAINST the Constitu- tional Amendment allowing an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieuten- ant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives and allow- ing a per diem for Mem- bers of the Legislature not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Ses- sion and 30 days of each Special Session." Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the neces- sary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Con- stitution and laws of this State.
